

In alliance with the equallyfamous "Hinky Dink" Kenna, he ruled the first ward of Chicago for decades, delivering its votes with monotonous regularity and battening on the time-honored mainstays of her privilege, protection and perquisites. Natu rally enough, he was execrated by the good people who are pained by civic corruption and misrule; yet somehow he held his place to the end, and the periodic waves of refo never unseated him.

For the reformers seldom the Bathhouse Johns and the Hinky Dink Usually they look on such men as the cause the of corrupt government, whereas in reality gladly they are the symptoms of it. And it is that little fact which makes the career of a ma good like Coughlin worth study.


