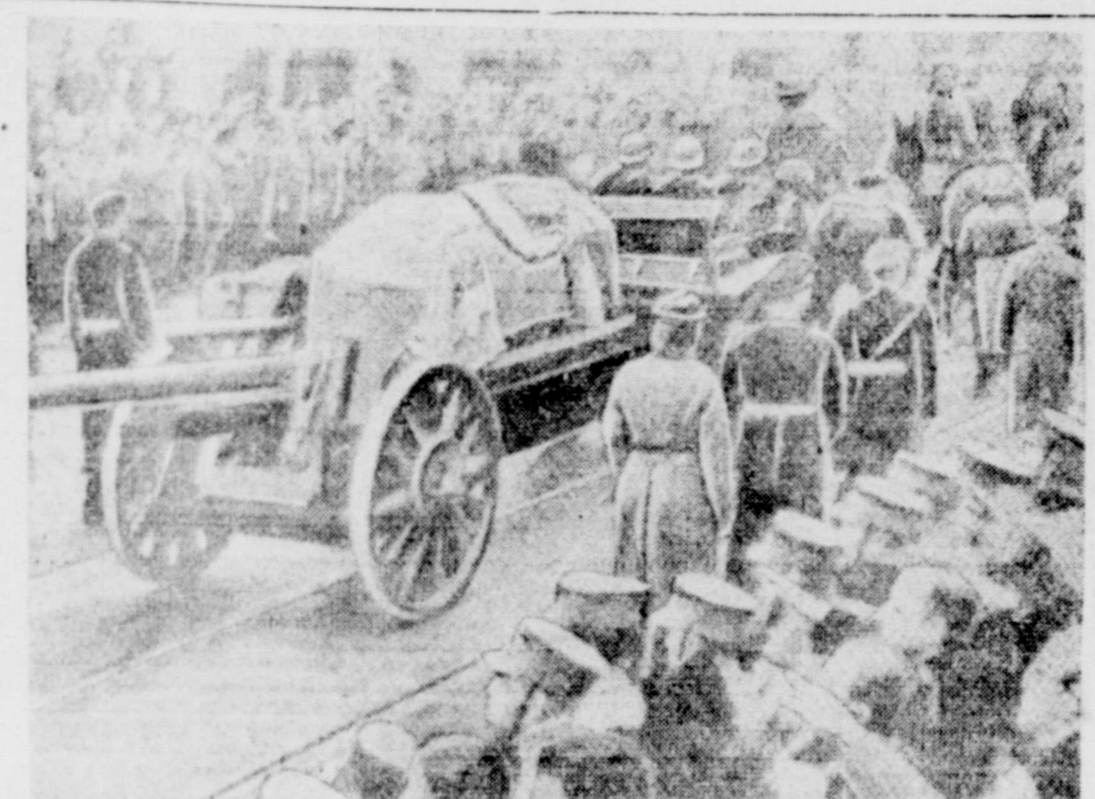

### O'Daniel Gives up Plan for State's Financing Agency

On Trial

FORT WORTH, Nov. 19 (AP)—Governor-elect O'Daniel said today that he had given up his plans for a state financing agency to promote the industrialization of Texas in favor of a tie-up with the Federal Reconstruction Finance corporation. He said, "I proposed the state agency, hoping it would be established by Texas business men. I have found, however, my program for industrialization can be carried out with the aid of the RFC. More money will be available, and it will be unnecessary to delay action."

### Tieup with RFC Is Favored for Industry Program

The governor-elect, who returned Friday from a tour of West Texas, said, "I have asked each community to name a committee to study industrial conditions in that community and to work toward obtaining industries needed."

### Navy Awards Three Battleship Contracts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—The navy department awarded contracts today for construction of three battleships at an expected cost of over \$150,000,000. Two will be built in private shipyards, and the third at the Norfolk navy yard.

### CHARGES ARE DUE TODAY IN PRETZ DEATH

#### Youth Admits Holding Weapon Which Killed Mother

County Attorney F. E. Mitchell of Callahan county, in a telephone conversation with the Cisco Daily Press last night, said that charges of murder would be filed Sunday in connection with the fatal shooting at Baird Wednesday evening of Mrs. Annie Pretz, widow. Mrs. Pretz died from the effects of a single gunshot wound in the back of her head while standing at her kitchen sink where she had just finished washing supper dishes at 7:30 o'clock.

Justice of the Peace G. H. Corn returned an inquest verdict late Saturday, finding that Mrs. Pretz had come to her death "from a gunshot wound inflicted by a 22 caliber rifle in the hands of Floyd Pretz."

Pretz, younger of two sons of the slain woman, was being held in custody in Baird county jail. No charges had been filed Saturday evening. The 20-year-old youth, employed as a linotype operator at the Cisco Daily Press in Cisco for a year and previously for several months by the Cisco Daily News, first had told authorities, County Attorney Mitchell said, that his mother had picked up the weapon when it accidentally discharged, the bullet striking her in the right portion of the head and killing her instantly.

### Called to Courthouse

An inquest was held in the kitchen of the Pretz home and Friday afternoon Floyd Pretz was summoned to the courthouse for a conference with the officers. He was questioned at length and in a statement to County Attorney Mitchell admitted that he was holding the gun at the time it was discharged. He told investigators, the county attorney said, that he had picked up the borrowed weapon to return it to its owner and, thinking the gun not loaded, was manipulating the pump action when it accidentally discharged, the bullet striking his mother in the back of the head.

He was remanded to custody of the sheriff pending further investigation. No formal request for bail had been made Saturday afternoon. County Atty. Mitchell denied positively that any statement other than that reported above had been made.

Mrs. Pretz died instantly. When the shot was fired young Pretz ran to the room occupied by Mrs. Lucile Hall, one of two boarders, and summoned her to the kitchen where his mother lay. The rifle had fallen to the floor. Mrs. Hall ran to the kitchen door, looked in,

### Jap Advance Is Halted by Chinese

#### FDR Says US Has Ample Cause to Be Thankful

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt, in his annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation today, said the nation had "ample cause to be thankful" for peace and other blessings.

"We have lived in peace and understanding with our neighbors, and seen the world escape from the impending disaster of a general war, adding, "we have cherished and preserved our democracy."

Such progress was indicated by the fact Japan replaced her South China commander after the Japanese failed to advance more than 36 miles northward in the four weeks since Canton's capture Oct. 22.

The Japanese admitted they had evacuated Samsu, 26 miles west of Canton, and the Japanese military spokesman likened fighting there to the sea-saw fighting at Taichingwang in Central China last April.

The British Yangtze river patrol above Hankow reported nine Japanese bombers accompanied by four pursuit planes heavily bombed Ichang, 186 air miles of Hankow, Saturday.

The Duke of Kent entered Cyril Day, 10, in the orphanage here. The boy's father died after a fall while decorating his store to welcome the Duke to Needham Market, Suffolk.

### Funeral Here for Mother of Two Cisco Men

Funeral services for Mrs. J. O. Jackson, mother of Rochelle Daniel and Jack Daniel of Cisco, who died at Knox City Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, were to be held from the First Christian church here this afternoon. The body arrived last night and is at the Green Funeral home.

Mrs. Jackson's death followed a sudden illness which she contracted Friday afternoon. She was removed at once to a hospital at Knox City.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed Saturday evening, the details awaiting arrival of members of the family. Mr. and Mrs. Rochelle Daniel were at Alpine on a hunting trip when the illness occurred.

Mrs. Jackson was the former Mrs. Artie Daniel of Cisco. Her first husband died more than 10 years ago. She was married about a year ago to Mr. J. O. Jackson, who survives her. Children who survive are a daughter, Mrs. Marie Bell of Archer City, and three sons, Rochelle and Jack Daniel of Cisco and Garth Daniel of Austin. Two grand children, Sterling and Beverly Bell, and the following brothers and sisters also survive: Mrs. Mattie Moulton and Mrs. Mammie Anderson of McKinney; Mrs. Alex Ward of Cisco, and Guy Dabney of Sweetwater.

### Jehovah Ordered Erased From German Churches

BERLIN, Nov. 19 (AP)—The name of Jehovah was ordered erased from Protestant churches throughout Nazi Germany today by Friedrich Werner, president of the supreme Evangelical church council. The order said the name of God of Israel must be obliterated wherever displayed in a Protestant church. The names of Jewish prophets—all prophets of the Old Testament—also were ordered erased.

### ANOTHER IS MISSING; TWO ARE INJURED

#### Plane Plows Through Wooded Georgia Section, Burns

LaGRANGE, Ga., Nov. 19 (AP)—Five army fliers were killed, two severely injured and one unaccounted for today after an army bombing plane crashed and burned in an isolated woods seven miles northeast of here. The ship, crashing in a heavy rain, plowed a path of one hundred yards through a stand of large pines. Known survivors were identified at a hospital here as Second Lieutenant John Madre and Private Joseph Nanavtovich, attached to Mitchell field. Nanavtovich's condition was described as serious. Madre was given a chance to recover. None of the dead were identified immediately.

Officers of Maxwell Field, Alabama, said that Corporal Gallo-way, assigned to the third squadron, of Dallas, Texas, was among those aboard the plane.

Mitchell field officers said the army bomber was on a routine flight to Montgomery, Ala. Four bodies were brought to LaGrange after rescue parties worked several hours to reach the crash scene over a muddy dirt highway and through a two-mile lane that was little more than wheel tracks. A fifth body was found at the wreck.

The ship crashed in a heavy rain, which was measured at the LaGrange weather station at 1.20 inches in a few hours Friday night. Apparently the pilot had turned off his course for Maxwell Field and was trying to make an emergency landing field near here.

The Lobo forward wall composed of Marcel Harrison, R. D. Donham, Walter King, Robert Cone, Troy Stewart, Rex Schaubert, Parks Bailey Ray, Harrison, and Walter Preston played rugged defensive football throughout the contest and was in the last week keeping close rein on the Breckenridge offensive, considered by many to be the most potent in the state.

Robert Cone, Lobo guard, turned in the finest performance of his career, proving a stumbling block to Big Bill Ramsey time and again, although Marcel Harrison, Pol-

lard, Donham, Preston, and the remaining linemen were also there in the collective Buckaroo defense. Marcel is considered by many to be one of the finest ends in this section and is a leading candidate for all-district honors.

The backfield, composed of Odell Harrison, co-captain Bill Latch, Coy Warren, Chesley Tipton, and Ramon Reames also played well on offense and at times outshined the front line. Odell Harrison and Bill Latch, playing their last game for the Black and Gold, performed beautifully. These boys, along with the others who finished, fought valiantly with true Lobo fury and will certainly be missed in seasons to come.

Warren played brilliant offensive football and remained a constant scoring threat until the final gun with his accurate passes and quick thrusts at the Buckaroo line. Tipton and Reames were also outstanding in the punting and defensive department. They are fine prospects for the 1939 Lobo eleven and should form the nucleus of that team.

### Highlights of the Game

Opening the game the Lobos kicked off to Breckenridge against the wind, the Buckaroos marching to the Cisco 10 where Tipton intercepted one of Ramsey's aerials. Play then saw-sawed for several minutes until the Bucks with fourth down facing them and almost five yards to go gained a five yard advance when the over-eager Cisco team was offside. Two plays carried to the Lobo 34 from where Ramsey broke over his own right tackle and outran the Cisco secondary to the goal line. Ramsey's first attempt from placement was wide but here another offside penalty gave him another try and his kick was good this time making the score 7-0 in favor of Breckenridge.

The game then reverted to a defensive battle from then on through the third quarter with Breckenridge dominating play. Several times Coy Warren and Odell Harrison nearly broke into

the open but were nailed by the last defender.

With the strong wind at their backs during the fourth quarter, however, the Buckaroos proved too much for the weary Lobos and, aided by a penalty, scored a touchdown on a lateral pass, Ramsey to Hamlin, from the Lobo four yard marker. Ramsey's attempt at conversion from placement was good and the count stood 14-0 in favor of Breckenridge. Shortly afterward the game ended with the score unchanged.

## With Our WILD LIFE

### Migratory Waterfowl Regulations

Under new federal migratory waterfowl regulations announced recently Texas duck hunters will have a 45-day open season compared to a 30-day open season in 1937, and in addition may shoot a limited number of species hitherto protected. The open season on ducks, geese, Wilson's snipe and coot is from November 15 at 7 a. m. to 4 p. m. on December 29. Shooting hours each day are from 7 a. m. to 4 p. m.

### Hunting Methods

Hunters may shoot ducks and geese and other waterfowl in season with a shotgun only, not larger than a No. 10 gauge, fired from the shoulder; a dog, a blind or floating device other than a sink box, may be used. The following are not permitted: shooting from an automobile, airplane, motor boat, power boat of any kind, sail boat or any boat or device under tow. Sinkboxes (battery) are not permitted. One may not shoot waterfowl with a gun that is automatic or repeating shot gun that are capable of holding more than three shells, including the chamber and magazine combined. Live ducks or geese decoys are prohibited. It will be against the law to place any feed, grains, such as wheat, oats, corn or like substance out for the purpose of attracting the birds regardless of the distance between the shooter and the feed.

### Daily Bag Limits and Possession Limits

One may kill ten ducks in the aggregate of all species, except that he must not have in his daily bag limit more than three of any one or three in the aggregate of canvass backs, redheads, buffleheads, or ruddy ducks. Geese, including brant, five in the aggregate of all species, except no open season on snow geese, Ross' geese, wood ducks, cranes, swans, brant

and all shore birds. Not more than two days' bag limit of ducks, geese, including brant, and one day's limit of other migratory game birds may be possessed at one time. Ducks and geese may not be kept on cold storage more than ten days after the season closes. All other migratory birds'

storage rules are the same as on ducks and geese.

### Federal Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp

It is unlawful in the United States for a person over the age of 16 years to take ducks, geese or brant unless he carries on his person an unexpired federal migratory-bird hunting stamp, validated by his signature written in ink across the face. These stamps cost \$1 and are issued by postmasters, not by state game wardens. These stamps are not valid after June 30 following the date of issue.

### Dove Season

Dove season in this section of Texas closes at sunset on November 15. One may not keep doves on cold storage more than 10 days after the season closes.

### Quail Season

Quail season does not open in Texas until December 1. Many think that quail season opens on November 15 at the time when deer and turkey season open, but it does not.

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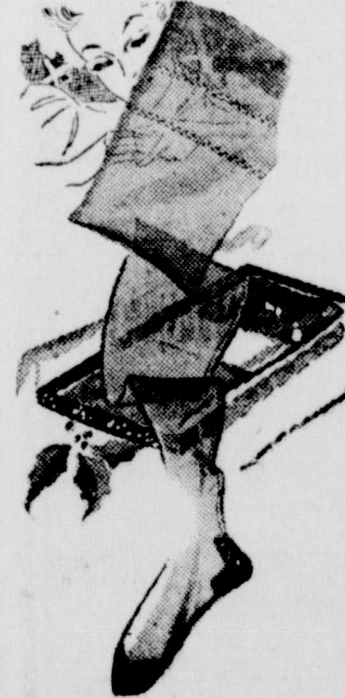

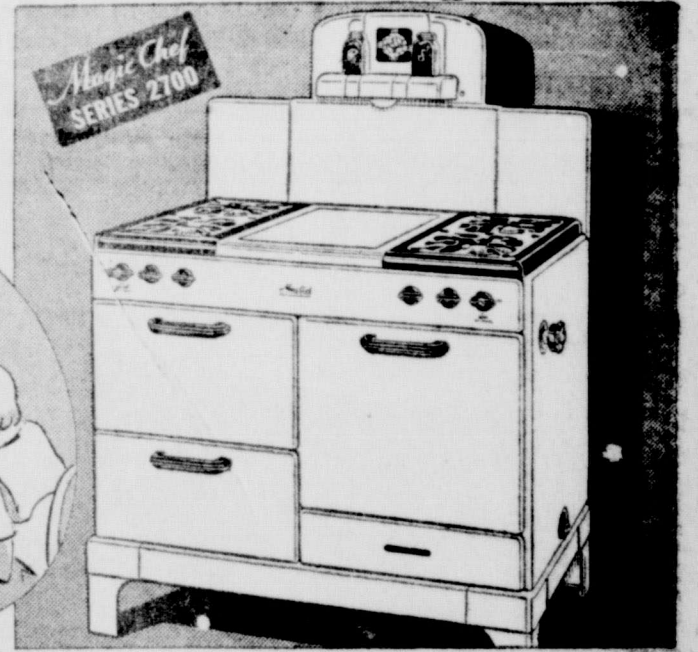

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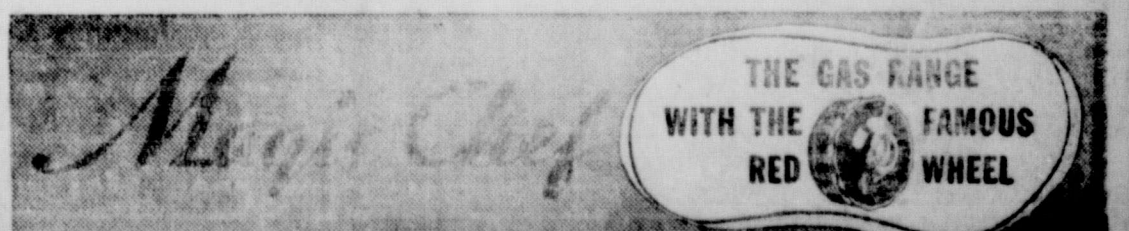

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### Eastland County Votes Only 2,400 In Election

Complete and official returns from the recent general election available Thursday for the first time, reveal that the Eastland county vote was only approximately 2,400.

The number of votes in this year's general election was in sharp contrast to the approximate 5,000 cast two years ago. But that was a year for naming of presidential electors.

Like the rest of Texas, the vote in the county of parties other than democrats was negligible.
