

Despite efforts from time to time

Despite enors from time to time to set up a new method of marking time, the Gregorian calendar, in-stituted by Pope Gregory in the year 1582 appears unlikely to be replaced for some time to come ... probably until at least 2500 A. D. Mathematicians guarantee that the calendar will be accurate until that time.

The Gregorian calendar still doesn't please everybody. But this is not unusual. People like to be fussy about time. Once a year in inany areas of the United States there is the annual squabble about the use of "daylight saving time". Periodically, residents in one area who live in the edge of another time zone attempt to get the zones thanged. Kentucky, for example, was the scene of such activity re-ently when residents of several titles of that state, timing of switch-ng each summer to "daylight sav-ng time" attempted to get the locks moved up an hour all year zone eached further westward. Our current method of keeping

Our current method of keeping time takes into consideration the solar year which actually consists of 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes, and 46 seconds. Because of the

and 46 seconds. Because of the extra hours, minutes and seconds, it is required that the Gregorian calendar contain a well-ordered system of Leap Years to keep the calendar and the solar equinoxes

ongruent.

In all probability you will have completed your Christmas shop ping by the time you read this article, but you might put some of its suggestions to work next year. Did you prepare a holiday shop

ping budget? Did you stick to it? Many people claim that Christ-mas is too commercial. This, of course, is not necessarily true. But every year millions of people, filled with the holiday spirit of giving, spend far more money for gifts for friends and relatives than

they can actually afford. It's wise, therefore, to prepare a gift list well in advance of Christmas and really balance it against your budget. This way you can determine how much you can spend for individual gifts without taxing your savings or putting a burden on your future income.

Gifts that you make yourself are always appreciated because they are gifts of your time and effort. It is proper that the spirit of giving should be a part of Christ-mas, but giving should be within the means to give. It is the gift that is important and not what it cost. You can easily force spring flowering bulbs to get continuous bloom throughout the holiday sea-son and late winter.

Many people are embarrassed when the holiday is over because they find they have given someone what they consider a "small" gift while they may have received something very costly.

Be wise and have a really happy Christmas in the future. Buy with-in your means and there will be no thought of those New Year bills nagging at you during the holiday.

son and late winter. Narcissi, hyacinths, tulips and crocuses can be potted for flower-ing. Use only bulbs of best quality. Set them in shallow pots contain-ing soil with good water-holding capacity and drainage. A satisfac-tory soil mixture is three parts good garden loam, one part organic matter and two parts sand. Fill the bot with soil to one-half inch be-low the rim, leaving the tips of bulbs barely exposed. Plant hyacinths and narcissi as Joseph Proved Plant hyacinths and narcissi as close together as you can. For tu-lips, plant five or six bulbs in a five-inch pot. His Great Love Place the pots in a cool place at 40-50 degrees. The soil must be moist while in storage. When the roots are well developed, bring the pots into a warm room for forcing. He also commented that "The value of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation cannot be over emphasized. house. Holly, pine and hemlock can withstand heavy pruning. Every second or third branch of a pine, hemlock or spruce can be re-moved if the tree has not been

moved if the tree has not been thinned for some time. Some-times a rather long "inside" branch of holly, fir or pine that does little for a tree's appear-ance can be removed. Yew lends itself to artful dec-orations. Andromeda, magnolia, euonymus, puracantha, coton-easter, ivy and abelia will pro-vide a variety of Yule greens. Boxwood is excellent, but should be snipned gently.


