Is He Shielding Ransom Taxes?



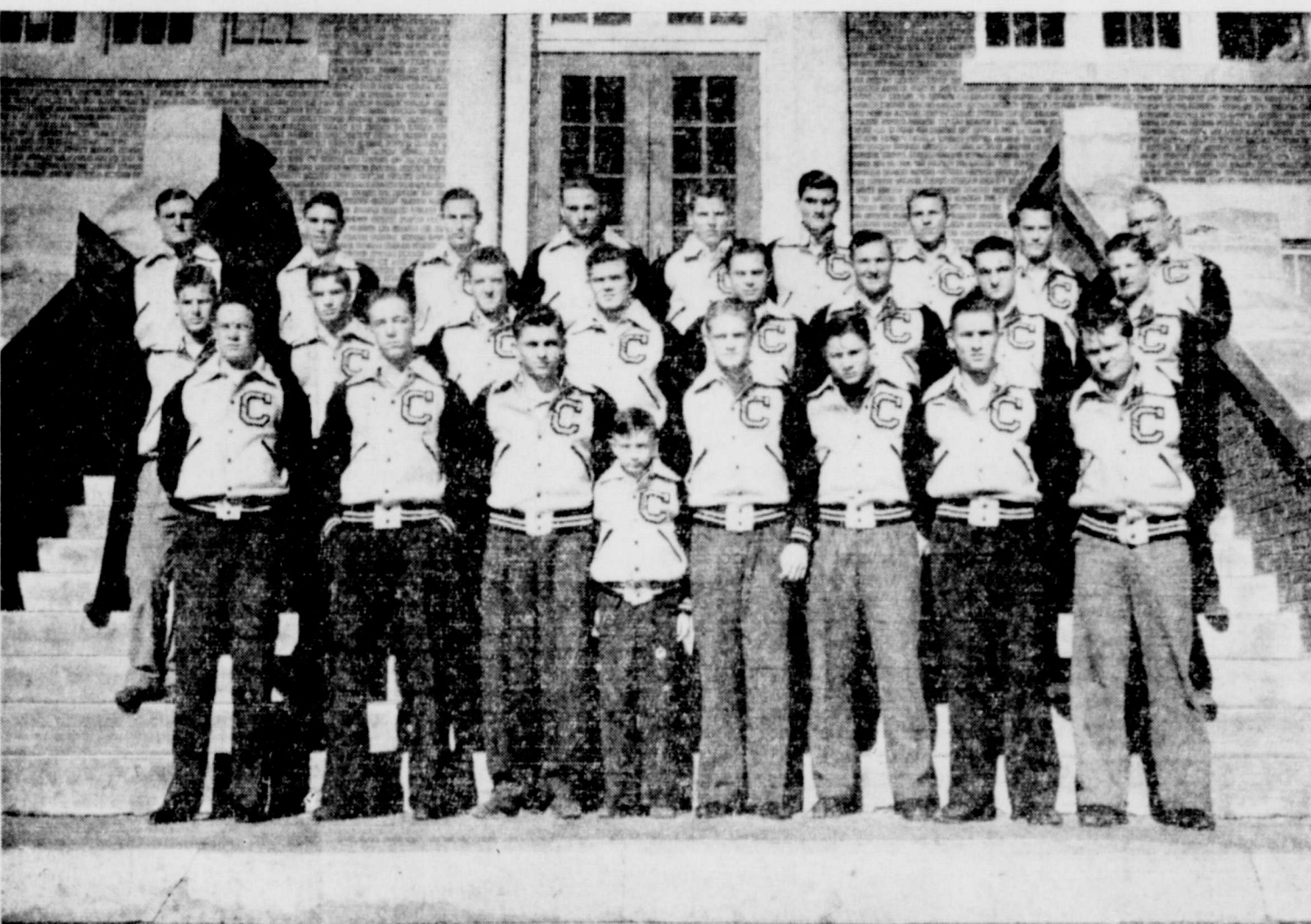

TWO CHARGED IN THEFTS OF POULTRY HERE

Big Haul of Chickens Is Made in Two Raids Here

Two Cleburne men face charges of felony theft of chickens in justice court here as the result of the loss of 73 hens belonging to Henry Kinard and Mrs. Oscar Comer in raids here a week ago. Mrs. Comer lost 44 Rhode Island Red hens and Mr. Kinard the remainder of the stolen fowls. The two men, Eugene Higgins and Orvil Davis, were arrested at Cleburne and returned to Cisco Wednesday by Chief of Police Perdue and Constable J. J. Honea. Charges were filed in Justice Wilson's court yesterday, and the men lodged in jail at Eastland.

AMERICANISM CAMPAIGN TO BE CONDUCTED

T. J. Fontaine Guest at Luncheon at Laguna Hotel

The junior chamber of commerce, State President T. L. Fontaine of Houston told the directors of the Cisco junior chamber at a luncheon today noon, is convinced that the most serious danger facing the country is a loss of the old American character. The organization is undertaking this year, principally in the southwest through a radio program, a campaign to sell Americanism to the young business man, he said. The program will be carried over the Texas State network of Elliott Roosevelt each Sunday afternoon from 2:30 to 3. The state president, making a swing through west Texas, was tendered a luncheon by the local organization on the mezzanine floor of the Laguna hotel attended by a dozen directors, headed by president Carlton Holder. Fontaine discussed the influence of current relief programs and pensions upon the American character and told the Cisco young business men that the Jaycee organization is much concerned for the burdens that will be placed upon the young business men as the business leaders of the future. He pointed out that there is grave danger that these relief projects carried on for long and to such a great degree would undermine the character of the citizenship to such a degree that incalculable harm will be done to the American ideal, not to speak of the tremendous tax burdens which will be placed on the country to pay for the programs.

BAIRD, Jan. 20.—The appeal case of the citizens' committee vs. The City of Baird, contesting a city election voting \$163,000 in bonds for a municipal electric light and power plant, comes up today at Eastland. In the trial court the city won and the plaintiffs appealed, charging certain citizens were denied suffrage because they did not possess city poll taxes.

Sugar Bowl Film Is Shown at Lobo Banquet

Cisco was the scene last night of the world's premier of a motion picture production whose cost ran into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. It was the complete film of the Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans on January 2 when Texas Christian university's mighty Horned Frogs defeated the Carnegie Tech Skibos 15-7 to definitely establish themselves as the No. 1 gridiron team of the nation. The price paid by the spectators, and all the expenses and investment which went into the development of the teams and all activities contributory to the final meeting of the two great elevens on the New Orleans gridiron for the game totaled a sum in excess of the price of production of many great feature films produced in Hollywood.

BERLIN, Jan. 20 (AP)—Fingerprint cards are the latest addition to the multitude of personal papers which the average German has to carry about with him, to show that he is not posing as somebody else. A law introducing the new identity card, known as the "Kennkarte," was made public last July.

Prime Minister's Son Unharmed in Bomb Blast

LONDON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Frank Chamberlain, only son of the British prime minister, escaped harm yesterday from a bomb blast apparently aimed at him in Ireland as authorities in Britain and northern Ireland drafted thousands of police reserves to combat terrorism attributed to the outlawed Irish republican army.

Expanding Public Domain May Solve Land Problems

JUST at the time when everybody was getting accustomed to the idea that "the public domain is exhausted," lo and behold the public domain starts growing again. Public ownership of land is gaining by leaps and bounds, not only as a result of widespread purchase by the federal and state governments, but by tax foreclosure. For example, in 1938 Oregon owned 1,714,349 acres of land, with another \$20,000,000 worth foreclosable because of tax delinquency.

ALMOST every state is faced with this problem in one degree or another. In little New Jersey nearly 900,000 acres of

rural land are tax delinquent, a survey shows. This state of things, regardless of whether it is a happy state or not, is a condition and not a theory. States and counties are being forced to take steps to find out what to do with this newly acquired land, the American Society of Planning Officials reports. In 29 states foreclosed or abandoned land reverts to the counties, and in 19 states it reverts to the state.

That makes necessary a different approach to the problem in almost every case, for while counties are closer in touch with the local problem of the use of their land, most of them do not have enough money or enough land to institute much of a program. Minnesota, Michigan, New York and Wisconsin classify the reverted lands as to whether it can produce anything, and whether it can be sold. Then they try to homestead, sell or exchange the land. Such lands as are useless for such purposes are usually turned into parks or game refuges. Exchange of land with the federal government so as to unite larger areas so they can be used for public or private purposes is being used.

THE United States, and the individual states are thus rapidly acquiring a new and larger public domain. The problem would seem to be to get to some of this land those farmers who no longer can find a place on developed lands, the migratory workers, the sharecroppers, and the dispossessed of the farm areas. Starting at scratch, with land which cost the governments nothing but the loss of tax revenues, it should be possible to get much of this land back into the hands of individual owners, thus accomplishing the double object of producing more taxes and giving farm families a new start. Homesteaders built the country in the first place—maybe a new generation of homesteaders can help to rebuild it.

Peter Denies His Lord

Text: Luke 22:31-34, 54-62

IT is a far cry from Peter on the Mount, sharing in the experience of the transfiguration, to Peter warming his hands beside the fire in the high priest's house where Jesus had been taken after His arrest, and denying vehemently when he was a disciple of Jesus or that he knew the man. Poor Peter! Jesus understood him far better than he understood himself. He had seen deeply into Peter's strength and weakness when He had said the memorable words, "Simon, Simon, Satan hath asked to have you, that he might sift you as wheat." Peter was indeed being sifted, but it was the chaff rather than the wheat that was most in evidence. But Jesus had prayed for Peter, and the denial was not the end. The real Peter was the wheat that was left after the chaff had been blown away.

And the third. But after the third denial, when the cock crew, Peter remembered the words of Jesus. Then it was that he came to himself and that the prayer of Jesus for him became efficacious, for he went out and wept bitterly in genuine and sincere repentance. Here is a thoroughly human story. Many of the bravest and best of men are like Peter, with their courage and their earnestness of purpose counter-balanced by deep temptations and real weaknesses, and with the capacity of falling just as they have the capacity of rising far above the level of men of lesser intensity and ability. The important thing to remember is that man's destiny is never determined by his sins, but only by the lack of will and the lack of self-recovery by which he allows his sins and misdeeds to overcome him. NOR is it a matter of self-will and self-discipline. It is the Peters—if they only knew it—who need the keeping power of God's grace. It is because a man's will is so strong that he is liable to put trust in himself, where he ought to be putting his trust in God and seeking the strength of the divine through prayer and communion, that he finds himself too late overcome by evil, or conquered by lack of watchfulness. It was not the weak but the strong that Jesus said, "Watch and pray lest ye enter into temptation."

Major Al Williams, aviation expert, writing in the Scripps-Howard papers, puts his finger on a very significant and serious fact in the current flow of rumors about armament plans which are being formed in Washington.

Aviation and national defense are highly professional subjects. Whether we need 2,000 new planes or 13,000 to defend us is a matter for the experts in military and naval science. As the government spends a vast sum of money on the navy and the army, one would suppose that our experts in military and naval aviation would be found there. 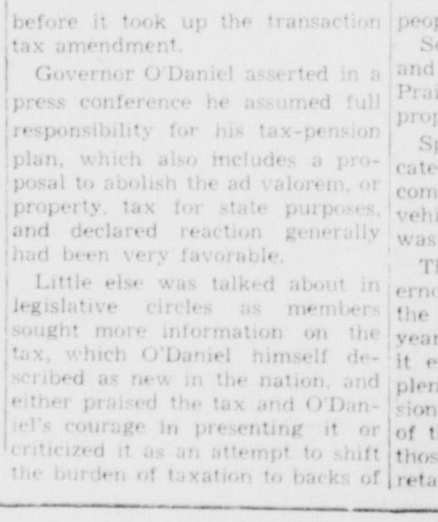
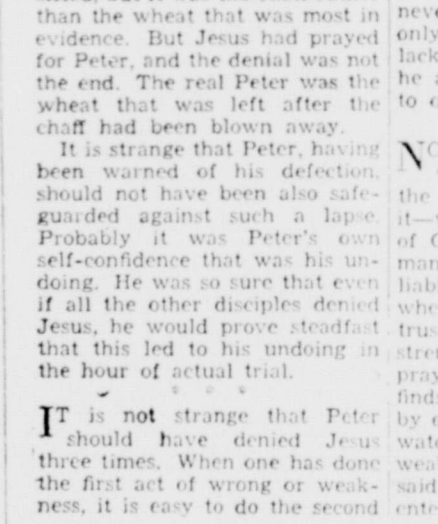
Storm Brews Over Governor's Tax Proposal

AUSTIN, Jan. 20 (AP)—A storm plainly was brewing in the legislature over the sensational proposal of Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel for a \$45,000,000 transaction tax to meet costs of old age assistance and other phases of Texas' social security program.

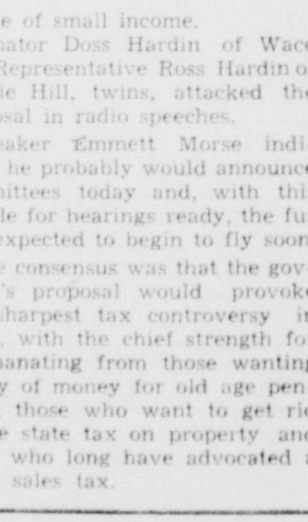
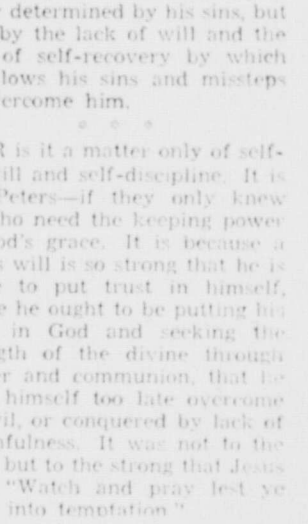
Developments in the wake of the governor's first message to the legislature, which recommended submission of a constitutional amendment imposing a 1.6 per cent tax on the money value of commercial dealings, with a few exceptions, as well as submission in the same amendment of a liberalized pension plan, included:

The house refused to act upon, except to send to a committee, a resolution asking the governor to permit the legislature to consider natural resources and other taxes personal property without asking anyone's advice. He can establish it without asking advice or authority. But if it were to be made an army or naval function, congress would have to approve it and appropriate the funds for it. And the less congress has to do with this and all other matters, apparently the better the administration likes it.

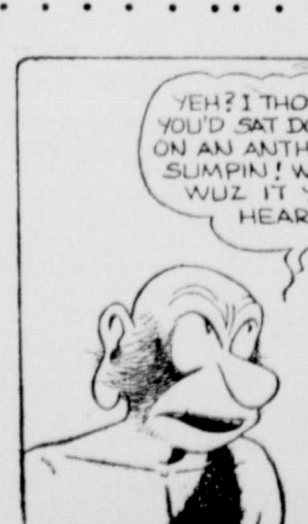

"Say my mother and my girl and I walk down the street. Who should walk where?"

Well, the answer to that is based on a single common-sense observation. The person in the middle is never left out of anything; therefore you walk on the outside, your mother in the middle and your girl—who ought to be smart enough to see the point—walks on the inside. It's still considered gallant for the man to walk nearest the street.

First Light

Another problem: "Last night when I sat down to dinner with my girl and another couple, both girls got out cigarettes at the same time. The other fellow didn't have matches or something—anyway, he didn't offer to light either cigarette. Now whose cigarette should I light first in a case like that?"

Answer: You always should be more attentive to the girl you're with than any other. That means lighting her cigarette first, helping her on or off with her coat first, or anything else. The exception is in case you have a mutual guest, when the guest's comfort comes first.

"I never know the ins and outs of getting to a seat in a theater," says another youth.

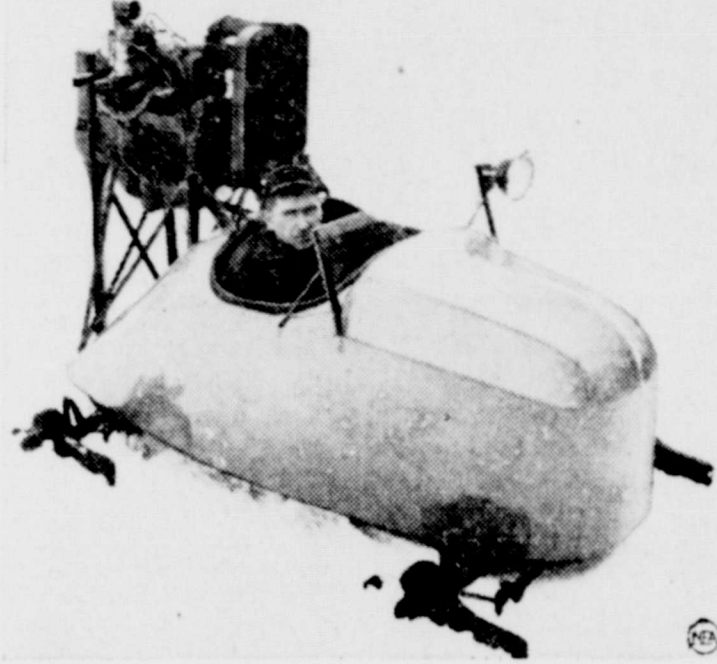
