There must be a reason, but I don't know what it could be, for the difference in voting opinions of wheat and cotton farmers in regards to production quotas. Wheat farmers rejected wheat quotas in the last referendum while cotton farmers always give a preponderent majority in favor for cotton quotas. The history of farming, so far as the so-called basic commodities are concerned, is identical economically. When cotton was selling for five cents a pound wheat was going at twenty-five cents a bushel, certainly this is not a situation that is easy to forget. For the first time in history a government program was evolved to give the agricultural industry some semblance of economic stability, and from the beginning it has been left up to the tarmers to accept or reject production quotas.

It may be argued that wheat farmers are more independent, sometimes referred to as rugged individualism, than cotton farmers but it is doubtful that cotton farmers would be any more bankrupt than would wheat farmers if the price of commodities was allowed to drop to depression day levels. Cotton farmers passed the recent quota referendum by an overwhelming majority and by so doing protected their independence and enhanced their status in the nation's economic structure.

Put them in a compost pile, says Dr. Charles D. Welch, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extensive Service. Although it may be easier to burn them, the extra time required to put the leaves in a compost pile will return big dividends.

The compost can be used next year to increase organic natter in the soil or for mulching flowers, shrubs or vegetables. Organic matter increases the soil's ability to hold water and plant nutrents and makes the soil easier to work, explains Welch. Mulches are valuable for controlling soil temperature and conserving moisiure.

Making a compost pile is a simple operation. Scrap lumber or a few feet of net wire and four posts will take care of the enclosure, the chemist points out. Starting with a six-inch layer of leavesfourths cup of commercial fertilizer such as 12-12-12 in water and sprinkle the solution over the leaves. For each 50 square feet, spread about one pint of fertilizer over each six-inch layer.

Alternate layers should be added until the pile teaches the desired neight, suggests Welch. The top layer should be left somewhat sauvers and the sure of the care.



Pfeiffenberger, **Friend Of Cotton Industry Dies**

George William Pfeiffenberger, 56 year old Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc and one of cotton's greaest benefactors, died of cancer at 7:30 a. m. December 15 in St. Mary's Hospital, Lubbock. He underwent surgery on June 5 of this year and was readmitted to the hospital December 6. A resident of 2301 60 th Street, Lubbock, he is survived by his wife, Charlotte; a daughter, Ann, of Lubbock, and a son, Will, who is teaching physics in the U. S. Naval Graduate School Monterey, California.

Good healthy roses, planted properly, will thrive with minimum care. The most important consider ation is to keep them from drying out during the growing season.

Close observation will show when plants begin to grow well. If more than three or four roses are planted, do not beacome concerned if several do not break out and grow as rapidly as some of the others. Newly planted roses often begin growth at different rates. Give all plants sufficient time and water them at frequent intervals to keep the soil uniformly moist but not wet. Once all are established, those that were slow in starting will soon catch up.

After the plants have become

After the plants have become established, keep them well-water-ed or mulch them to a depth of two to three inches to prevent drying out. Follow a regular fertiliza gand spraying program to keep them healthy and productive.

THe simplest and best schedule to follow is to feed the plants about every 30 days with a complete, commercially prepared fertilizer, using it at the rate recommended by the manufacturer.

When explained fertilizer to poses

When applying fertilizer to roses follow these simple rules:

1. Wet down the soil the day before fertilizing to avoid burning the

roots.

2. Scatter the fertilizer over the root system area, keeping it at least four inches away from the plant stems. (If mulhing is not practiced, the soil can be loosely scratched before the fertilizer is applied. This must be done lightly and carefully to avoid minut to the nd carefully to avoid injury to the

3. Water the soil well after applying the fertilizer.

Use an all-purpose rose spray to control insects and diseases. Unless frequent rains make it imperative to spray more frequently, an application once a month is usually sufficient to keep roses in good conficient to keep roses in good condicient to keep roses in good condition. Through the effort of America Through the effort of American private enterprise we are taking the lead in linking the world more closely together. Our scientific genius made possible the communiduitins satellites now circling n space, provding reliable transoceanic relays for communications signals of every type. But as public attention has focused on the 'Comsat'' program, Americans have led similarly impressive developments in undersea cable communications.

posssible for Americans to speal directly by telephone to persons in England. In 1927, the Bell System arrectly by telephone to persons in England. In 1927, the Bell System had introduced rado-telephone service betwen New York and London but weather and atmospheric conditions occasionally barred intelligible transmissions. In 1956, the Bell System completed a submarine telephone cable across the Atlantic, and the cable made telephone calls between the United States and Great Britain as clear as those from across the street. Cables were laid later to Alaska, to Hawaii, to France, to Bermuda, to Puerto Rico. Recently a cable link was completed between this country and Japan.



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



The Texas Safety Association to-day issued its annual 'Accidental Death Alert' for the 1964 Christmas-New Year holiday period.

The 11-day alert begins at 12:01 a.m. Thursday, December 24, It coincides with the annual death watch of the Department of Public Safety.

In appealing to all citizens to be on the alert for hazards, TSA President Quincy V. Tuma of Houston, said it is estimated that 105 persons will be killed in traffic and 45 persons in other accidents.

'However, this tragic toll can be reduced if everyone will put out safety first—at home, at work or behind-the-wheel,' he added.

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
