





This is really a radical proposal, for it Entered as Second Class Matter December 11. would change the whole basis on which the people are counted in choosing their representatives in the national government. In practice, the effect of any such amendment is shown by Capper's estimate that New York would have four fewer representatives in congress if aliens were not counted as part of its population in figuring the number of congressmen to which the state is entitled.
