



Ecuador Still Argues Over Its Boundaries

OLD country is picturesque Ecnador. It was old even when the Spaniards took possession and warred on the Incas in 1534. Ecua dor became a republic in 1827 after the battle of Pichincha and its history has been stormy even for a Latin-American country; stormy, in fact, that the nation still without definitely determined boundaries.

Ecuador, lying on the Pacific coast of South America, extends from about 100 miles north of the equator to 400 miles south of it It is bounded by Colombia on the north and Peru on the south. The boundary on the east is something else again for Brazil, Colombia and Peru all claim certain lines which Ecuador does not acknowl-

So the maps show "areas in dispute" and the controversy rages over the years. But boundary lines or not, Ecuador boasts some of the most beautiful scenery in the world, and all within definitesettled limits.

There is, for instance, the rail line from Guayaquil, the "Pearl of the Pacific," to Quito, capital. and once the center of the great Inca civilization before the raiding Spaniards came.
