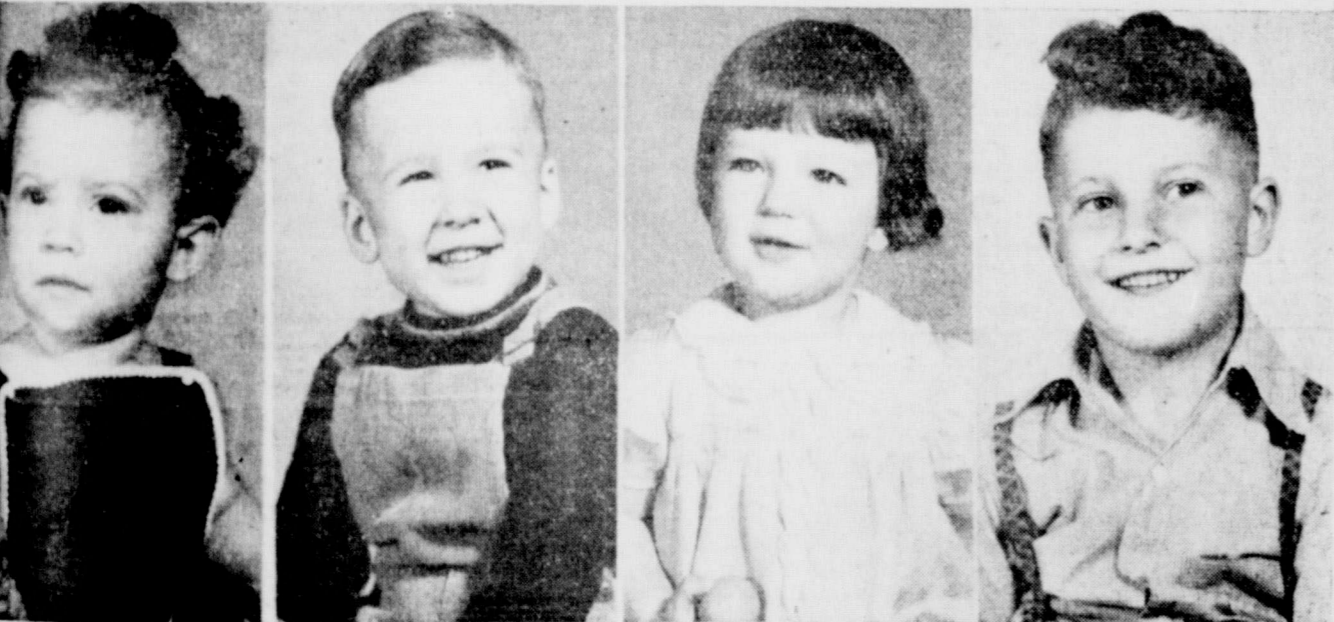

DOUBLE HEART RANCH TO SEND RODEO STOCK

Advertising Tour of Section Gets Under Way Today

Twice postponed because of inclement weather, the stock show-rodeo tour of Eastland county and adjoining territory got under way from the high school at noon today. Members of the Lobo band accompanied the trippers, most of whom were members of the junior chamber of commerce which sponsored the tour and is sponsoring the two-day rodeo Friday night and Saturday afternoon. The livestock show, annual Eastland county event, is sponsored by the senior chamber which assisted the Jaycees in their trip.

The rodeo will be held at the Lions club ball park, with the first performance scheduled at 7:30 Friday evening and the second at 2:30 Saturday.

Thrills for the customers were assured when Carlton Holder, president of the Jaycees, announced today that the Double Heart ranch, near Sweetwater, had contracted to send a string of bucking broncs and wild Brahma steers to the show. Professional handlers will accompany the stock to serve as pickup men and so forth. Among the famous buckers to be sent by the ranch are "Hell Do," "Dynamite," "Grey Squirrel," and "W. Lee O'Daniel." "Deer Face," notorious Brahma steer, with a head like a deer, and which has never been ridden, will also be brought to Cisco for the two performances.

Tickets Sell Well

Tickets for the rodeo were reported going fast today. T. G. Caudle, who is also general superintendent of the stock show, is in charge of the sales. School children may secure tickets for 15 cents before Friday after which time the price will be 25 cents to all. All profits will go to the local FFA chapter, it was explained.

The stock show, which will be held at the Nance Motor company's used car lot, will be judged by J. H. Taylor of Dublin and Mr. Edmondson of May, the former judging Jerseys and hogs and the latter beef cattle and sheep.

Awards will be confined to entries of pure bred stock by FFA chapter members and 4-H club boys, but numbers of commercial breeders have asked for exhibit space. The number of entries already promises to exceed those of any previous show. Between 20 and 25 dairy cattle exhibits of club boys, that many and more of beef cattle, large numbers of hogs, sheep and goats and other livestock entries are expected, Mr. Caudle said.

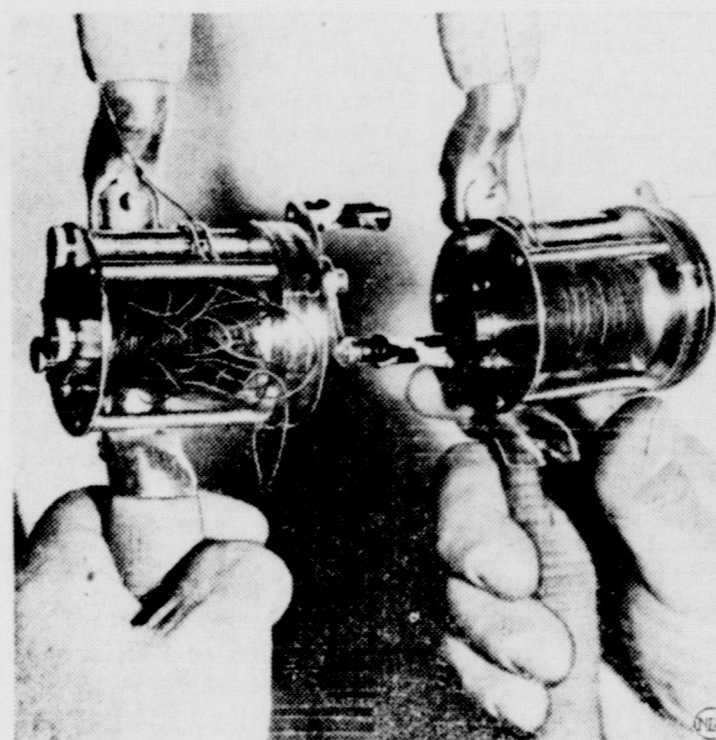

80 Italians and Four French Said to Have Been Killed

PARIS, Feb. 22 (AP).—Reports persisted here today of a clash between French and Italian troops in the Tunisian boundary.

The foreign office said it could not confirm them but it did not issue an immediate denial.

The clash was said to have occurred Friday when Italian troops penetrated French territory.

Reports said that the Italians were driven back with 80 killed. The French were reported to have lost four killed.

AMONG the gravest necessities of government at the moment is the finding of a successor to Justice Brandeis on the U. S. supreme court who can approximately fill his shoes.

In integrity, in steadfast adherence to fundamental principles, Justice Brandeis has stood for more than 20 years like a great lighthouse unmoved by the currents and tides of American life which swirled about his feet.

University Fights Public Schools for Oil Riches

AUSTIN, Feb. 22—The rich and powerful State University—these are the principals in a battle now raging for ownership of a tract of land which has produced millions of dollars in oil.

Arrayed with the university are numerous oil companies while, on the side of the public schools, is R. L. York, well known West Texas rancher.

the current of American legal thought has passed alternately to the right and left of Brandeis' position, which has always remained grounded unshakably on the rock of the constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

Today it is interesting to note the comment on his passing from the active judicial scene, because some of the keenest and most obviously sincere regrets are being expressed in conservative quarters.

Yet when Brandeis was nominated to the court by Woodrow Wilson, a tremendous hue and cry went up from almost the same quarters which are now eulogizing his career. Six former presidents of the American Bar association objected.

Yet today, many of the same elements which fought him 20 years ago now realize his greatness and lament his retirement.

Because Brandeis, with incorruptible and immovable firmness, has stood by his guns. Disturbance of great concentrations of power in the business world at the time of his appointment (and thus a "radical" in terms of 1916) Brandeis was equally distrustful of great concentrations of power in the governmental world in 1936 (and thus almost a conservative in terms of 1936).

His uncompromising stand for the personal liberty and dignity of the individual was a place of appeal for workingmen in 1916 against great business combinations which submerged them. Today the same regard for personal rights is a place of refuge for business men who feel submerged in swelling governmental power.

Brandeis once said: "An intolerant majority, swayed by passion or fear, may be prone in the future, as it has often been in the past, to stamp as disloyal opinions with which it differs."

One justice for all men, rich or poor—that stamps the great judge. Justice Brandeis has been a great judge, and the good wishes of many who once hated and feared him follow him into whatever fields of activity he chooses for his remaining years.

Choosing Brandeis was one of Woodrow Wilson's best public acts. To choose a worthy successor is one of Franklin Roosevelt's most pressing duties.

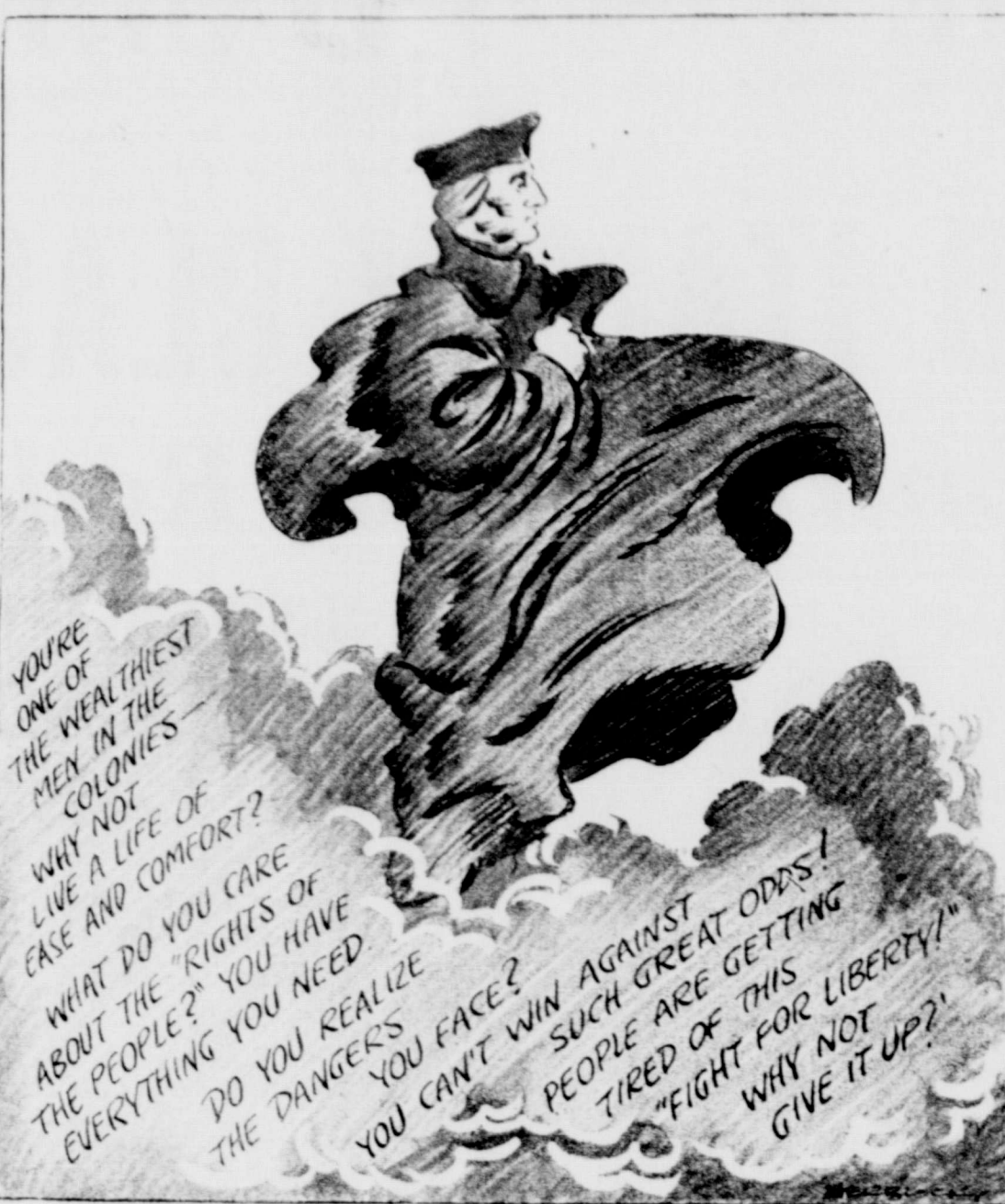
In the fall of 1937, Commissioner McDonald was holding an open hearing when a representative of the State suggested the proceedings stop and he would file a stakeholder's suit in Ector County.

The constituted authorities have not hesitated to sue for the schools when an individual citizen has occupied an alleged vacancy for many years but, if there is a question as to whether the University or the public schools own a piece of land, the University is always favored—about the only exception being the action of Bill McDonald

in awarding the vacancy to York (and thereby favoring the claim of the schools) after York felt that the agreement had not been lived up to and renewed his fight. Following the award, York filed a suit against the oil companies in Ector County where the land is.

And so on one side we have the University, one of the richest institutions of higher learning in the world, paying its football coach \$15,000 a year and with 11,000 students; on the other side are the public schools with 50,000 teachers, some paid as little as \$65 a month, and with 1,500,000 students attending schools—in some in-

Export-Import Bank Bill Passes House

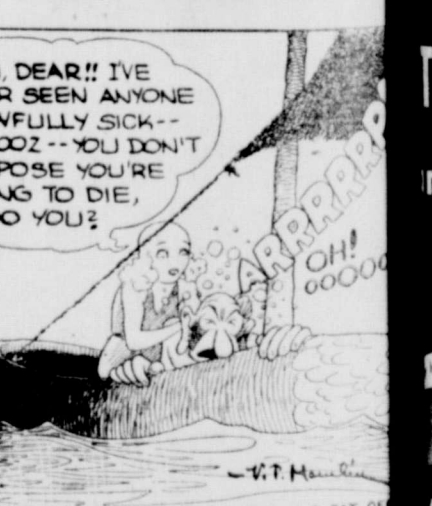
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22

A bill to continue the export-import bank for two years emerged unscathed from a rough and tumble, partisan scrap in the house Tuesday and was dispatched to the senate by a vote of 280 to 77.

Feb. 22 (AP)—The House today approved a bill that would give the federal government a share in the profits of every corporation that has a net worth of more than \$1,000,000.

The bill, which was introduced by Rep. W. S. Morrison of Ohio, would require corporations to file with the Treasury Department a statement of their assets and liabilities. The bill also would require the government to have a share in the profits of every corporation that has a net worth of more than \$1,000,000.

The bill is expected to pass the House in the next few days. It is one of the most important pieces of legislation that has been introduced in the House since the beginning of the year.



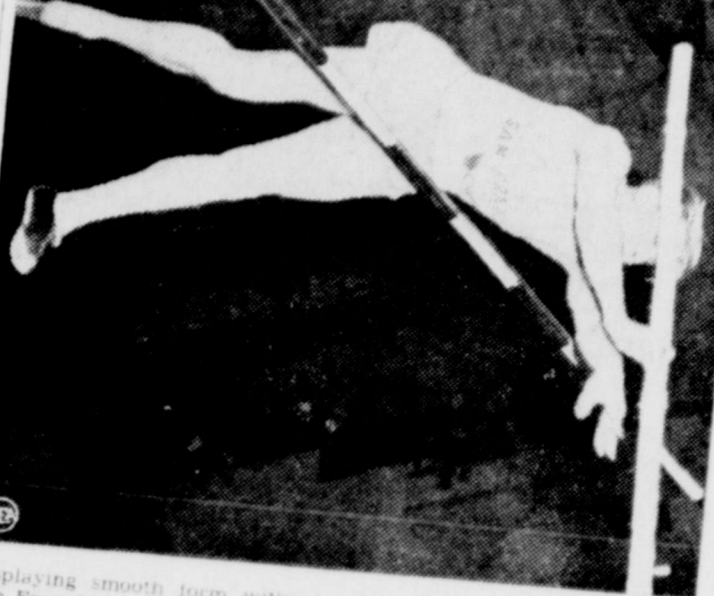
Three Years Are Required to Train Air Pilot

HELENA, Mont., Feb. 22.—It takes three years to make a first class airplane pilot out of a young, eager, teen age civilian student.

That's what they tell you in the flying cadet department at Helena high school where President Roosevelt's plan to train young flyers as "insurance" for the army air corps in case of war was anticipated by eight years.

The Helena school began training pilots in 1931, now it turns them out at the rate of 30 a year. Half have the 200 hours of flying experience necessary to obtain a commercial flyers' license; the others can qualify for private pilot's licenses.

3,000 People Head for Hills As Man-Made Lake Covers Valley

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 22.—Three thousand persons are about to see their homes, farms and disappear under a vast man-made lake.

They are dwellers in the great Columbia river canyon, which is slowly being flooded as water dams back up behind the Grand Coulee.

The dam is not completed, but rises higher and higher the lake behind it grows. Eventually the long and one to six miles wide, a total of 89,000 acres.

Surveys have fixed the water level at 1,310 feet above the sea, and that figure is the chief topic of conversation along the river.

If you're "below 1,310," the government has been around trying to buy your land and buildings, because they'll soon be under water. If you're "above 1,310," you stay where you are but can soon look forward to having a great lake in your front yard.

Costly To Uncle Sam

PENSACOLA, Fla., Feb. 22 (AP)—Two deaths and eight crushed naval planes were eight crushed day to a gulf-born fog which swiftly blacked out landing fields and broke up a routine, 12-ship training flight Monday night.

Nearly back to the naval training base here when the shroud enveloped them, three instructors, out of the gray blanket and landed safely in southern Alabama. One student flyer in his single-seater followed them to safety. A passenger flew with each of the instructors.

The other eight, flying planes without radio and apparently unable to keep in sight of the leaders, flew along divergent courses until their gasoline supplies failed. Then the planes plummeted to earth, two carrying their pilots to death, while the other six men parachuted.

\$150,000 Loss

The eight training planes, all smashed beyond redemption, were valued at "18,000 or more" apiece, making the monetary loss to the navy in the neighborhood of \$150,000. This blow came while a defense program weighing a expenditure of \$6,000,000 on the naval base here and purchase of many more planes.

Lieutenant Presser of Rio de Janeiro, a Brazilian navy officer, receiving instructions here, and Lieutenant Ostergren were the flyers who rode their planes to death. Presser managed to bring his plane down to Corry field here, but it crashed and burned. Ostergren fell near McDavid, Fla.

Ecuador Still Argues Over Its Boundaries

OLD country is picturesque Ecuador. It was old even when the Spaniards took possession and warred on the Incas in 1534. Ecuador became a republic in 1822 after the battle of Pichincha and its history has been stormy ever for a Latin-American country; so stormy, in fact, that the nation is still without definitely determined boundaries.

Ecuador, lying on the Pacific coast of South America, extends from about 100 miles north of the equator to 400 miles south of it. It is bounded by Colombia on the north and Peru on the south. The boundary on the east is something else again for Brazil, Colombia and Peru all claim certain lines which Ecuador does not acknowledge.

So the maps show "areas in dispute" and the controversy rages over the years. But boundary lines or not, Ecuador boasts some of the most beautiful scenery in the world, and all within definitely settled limits.

There is, for instance, the rail line from Guayaquil, the "Pearl of the Pacific," to Quito, capital, and once the center of the great Inca civilization before the raiding Spaniards came. This road is one of the most spectacular engineering feats in the world. At Nariz del Diablo (Devil's nose) a mountain blocks the railway and the train is forced to climb 2900 feet in five minutes along a daring zig-zag course cut from sheer granite.

Ecuador estimates its definite area at 276,000 square miles. Its population is roughly 2,756,000. It is a nation of vast potential wealth which may some day place it among the leading countries of the western hemisphere. A map of Ecuador is shown above on a current stamp of the country. 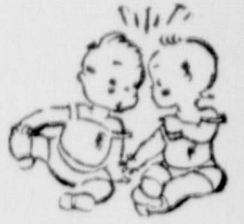

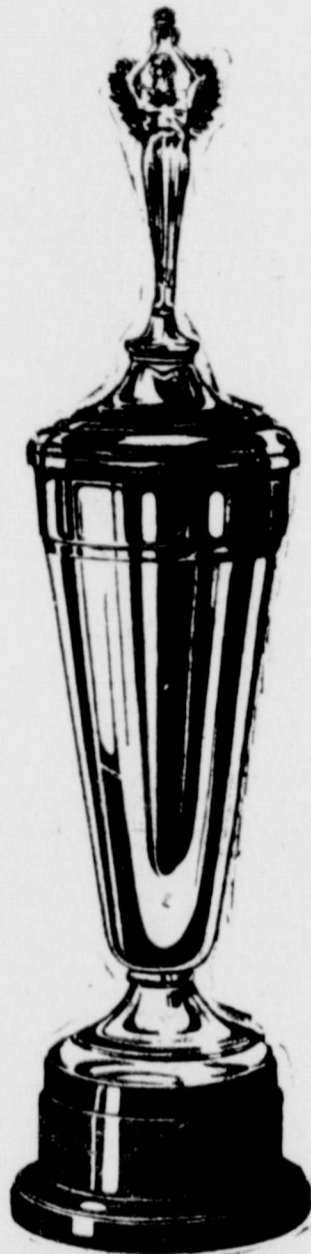

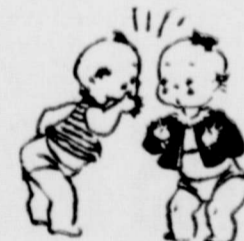
