Apparently, for the first time in memory, there has been enough friction develop between the various law enforcement agencies of the county to attract public attention. A meeting of concerned citizens was held last Friday as a result of the resgnation of the city chief of police. In his letter of resignation he said he was resigning because of non-cooperation from the Sheriff's department. Since this was the second time that a city police chief had resigned for that alleged reason, the public deemed some type of inquiry was needed.

As a result of a KDHN radio editorial the city and county governing bodies arranged for a joint meeting of those two bodies, in a public meeting, to discuss possible solutions of the problem. Whether the course of action adopted at that meeting will solve the problem remains to be seen. Regardless of the charges or counter-charges that may be made before the committee by the two law enforcement agencies, the public has the right to expect reasonably efficient law enforcement practices and shouldn't be satisfied with anything less.





Pork producers slate symposium

A pork symposium dealing with energy and efficiency in pork facilities will be conducted at West Texas State University's Activities Center Friday for area pork producers, sponsored by the Texas Pork Producers, regional associations of pork producers and WTSU.

Swine breeders are concerned about their facilities and use of fuel, according to Dr. Charles Smallwood, dean of the WTSU School of Agriculture.

The one-day program, planned with the assistance of the swine breeders organization in West Texas, will feature a variety of speakers from across the country.

Building and utilizing waste products will be the topic of the morning session, scheduled for 9 'a.m. Dr. Dwaine Bundey, Iowa State University agriculture engineer and swine building specialist, will discuss new developments in

building and remodeling. Marketing and production problems for producers will be the theme of the afternoon session. Dr. Fred Madden of the US Department of Agriculture Inspection Service and Dr. Tom Snodgrass of the Federal Department of Agriculture will speak.
