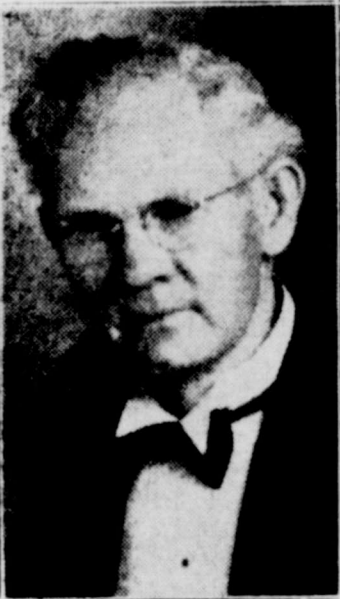

### HEAVY CORPUS TEAM CRUSHES LOBO ELEVEN

Approximately 6,500 fans saw the Corpus Christi Buccaneer team, and 1938 state champs hand the Cisco Lobos a thorough trouncing on Clarke field, with the final whistle finding the score 32-0 in favor of the Buccaneers. The Corpus Christi team outweighed the locals a total of 343 pounds, or an average of 31 pounds per man. The weight advantage proved too much for the Pettymen, who only threatened the Bucs goal once, that early in the second quarter.

The game was hardly underway, when Hall who played the outstanding game of the night, placed the ball on the Lobo five yard line, with a series of line crashes, and an off tackle plunge rang up the first tally of the game. Five plays later, Haas scored from the Lobo 42-yard line, making the score 14-0 in the first five minutes of play. The next touchdown came early in the second quarter when Hall again broke loose on the Cisco 35 to place the ball in scoring position, and then carried it on an end run for another counter.

On the kickoff to Cisco, Warren playing quarterback for the locals picked up the ball on his own goal line, and behind beautiful blocking, he reversed his field twice, and when he was finally brought down, he was on the Bucs 48-yard line. From there, the Lobos picked up three consecutive first downs, but when they got to the seven-yard line, their light line was unable to penetrate the bulk of manpower—the Buc-

### CONTEST NOT TO SUSPEND VOTE EFFECT

### Suit Attacking Vote Validity Filed In 88th Court

This is the last week in which beer may be legally sold in Eastland county, as a result of the election held on October 7.

Filing of a suit attacking validity of the election, in which sale of four per cent beer in Eastland county was outlawed, will not suspend enforcement of the result of the election, County Judge W. S. Adamson told the Cisco Daily Press Saturday.

The election, officially canvassed and declared on October 12, will take effect at midnight on Saturday, November 11.

The suit, filed in 88th district court Friday cannot be heard until the January term of the court, attaches of the district clerk's office said. They pointed out that the suit, which names the county judge, county commissioners and district attorney as defendants in behalf of the county, was filed too late to permit service upon the defendants at least 10 days before the opening of the next term of the court.

However, Judge Adamson said that this was not certain, since a special law governs election contests and that some special provision may exist which will allow the contest to be heard in the next term.

At any rate, he said, the local option law is plain upon the point that no contest can suspend the functioning of the law until the contest is heard and that the county would be legally dry after midnight next Saturday.

Whether or not an injunction is contemplated is not known.

### String Instrument Classes Organized

Organization of classes for instruction in string instrument music was begun under the supervision of the Recreation department in Cisco last week.

The groups are scheduled to meet on Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays from 4 until 5 p. m. in the basement of the First Methodist church. All children of grammar school age are eligible for instruction with this group. No charges for participants will be made, but each individual is requested to supply their own stringed instrument.

Additional information may be secured from members of the local recreation staff, or by attending the instruction period on Monday afternoon, November 6 at 4 o'clock, it was announced today.

### FUNERAL HELD SATURDAY FOR J. W. JOHNSON

Funeral services for James William Johnson, 11, father of Mrs. W. W. Manning, who died at the home of his daughter here Friday morning, were held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at Levita, Texas, in Coryell county. Mr. Johnson, a Confederate veteran, was born at Fayetteville, Ark., in June, 1848. He was educated in Arkansas and enrolled in the Confederate army from that state.

In 1872 he was married to Miss Lucinda Elean Burner, who died 13 years ago. Four children, all surviving, were born. They are Mrs. Manning of Cisco, J. E. Johnson of Riverside, Calif.; Mrs. J. H. Vannoy of Gatesville, and Mrs. H. S. Holtzclaw of Copperas Cove.

Besides the children survivors are 22 grandchildren and 33 great grandchildren.

Mr. Johnson came to Texas in an ox wagon in 1874, and played a great part in the development of the state during the pioneer days. He was a successful building contractor, farmer and merchant and was well known for his charitable deeds. Mr. Johnson had been a Mason more than 50 years.

During the last four years he has made his home with his eldest daughter, Mrs. W. W. Manning of this city.

### New IPA Head to Talk To Ass'n on December 11

ABILENE, Nov. 4.—Frank Buttram, Oklahoma City, new president of the Independent Petroleum association of America, will be the feature speaker at the 8th annual meeting of the West-Central Texas oil and gas association on December 11 in Mineral Wells, according to an announcement today by A. J. Frazier of this city, president of the regional petroleum association.

In coming to Mineral Wells for the last meeting of the West-Central Texas Oil & Gas association, Mr. Buttram will be making his first official appearance in the mid-continent area as head of the Independent Petroleum Association of America since his election to that office at the recent convention in Fort Worth.

Mr. Buttram has been asked to select his own subject for his address at the forthcoming gathering of the independents of this area. He has not advised what he will talk about, but Mr. Frazier declares that those who attend the meeting can rest assured that Mr. Buttram will talk about things of definite and important concern to all of those who are interested in or affected by the development of petroleum, not only in the West-Central Texas district, but in all of this part of the United States.

Judge J. C. Hunter of Abilene, immediate past president of the West-Central Texas Oil and Gas association, and who is now serving his first year as president of the General Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association, will also be on the program with Mr. Buttram. At a recent meeting of the executive committee of the association, where plans for the annual get-together were discussed, there was a unanimous demand on the part of the members of the committee for Judge Hunter to take a place on the program of the annual banquet, which will be the featured program of the meeting in Mineral Wells.

### Master of Ceremonies

J. D. Sanderfer, Jr., Breckenridge, first president of the association, has been named by President Frazier to act as master of ceremonies at the banquet. An open forum meeting, to which all oil operators, producers and business and professional people who are interested in the future of the petroleum industry in this part of the country, are invited, will be held during the afternoon as another one of the features of the annual meeting. Mr. Frazier said. This afternoon session will be devoted strictly to discussion of problems that are of immediate and direct concern to the industry. Such items as local, state and federal taxation, state and federal regulations, wage and hour rules, compensation and the importance of the oil industry and its operations to the public generally will be among the subjects to be discussed during this session of the meeting. Harold G. Neely, Fort Worth, is to be chairman of this meeting.

A business session of the 65 members of the board of directors of the organization will be held at noon, according to the program that has been announced by President Frazier. The meetings will all be held at the Baker hotel in Mineral Wells.

### Recapture Of Flint May Be Tried By Nazis

BERLIN, Nov. 4 (AP)—Germany, angered over the Norwegian action in internment of the German prize crew of the captured ship, City of Flint, and releasing the vessel to its American crew, Saturday sharply protested the action to Norway and demanded immediate release of the Nazi crew. There was strong hints that Germany might attempt to retake the ship when she leaves Norwegian waters.

Norwegian officials Saturday announced internment of the German prize crew which brought the captured freighter into the harbor at Haugesund, on the western Norwegian coast, Friday.

The Norwegian admiralty announced the ship, en route from Murmansk, Russia, to Hamburg, Germany, anchored at the Norwegian port without "valid reason," and that it was decided to intern the German crew and that the vessel should be "given free."

This meant, one usually well-informed Norwegian source said, that the City of Flint, a prisoner of the Germans and an object of diplomatic action since she was seized by the German pocket battleship Deutschland on October 9, was free to sail away whenever she wished.

This source added that the freighter may already have sailed away—once more in charge of her American crew.

The freighter, first carried to Murmansk by the Nazi prize crew after her capture in the Atlantic with what the Germans said was a contraband cargo, reached Haugesund at 5 p. m. (10 p. m. CST) yesterday.

There were reports that the ship

### BUREAU WILL STUDY STATE CONSUMPTION

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—Searching for a foothold for new industries and a wedge for more employment, the University of Texas bureau of business research next week will begin matching its current surveys of Texas production with a new service—detailed reports on the state's consumption.

Already at work in New Braunfels, Marshall and Brownwood, bureau statisticians plan Monday to launch a study of the state consumer to learn exactly where his dollar goes, what it buys and how much goods or services he uses. Dr. F. A. Buechel, bureau assistant director, explained.

To arrive at the statewide picture—a job Dr. Buechel estimates will be "fairly under way" by the end of the year—the Austin consumer-budget surveys are to be followed by similar soundings in each representative section of the state.

"Complete range of the consumer's dollar is to be completely surveyed — from his expenditures on food and household appliances to his outlay for taxes and insurance," Dr. Buechel said.

"Heretofore," he added, "the bureau has shown pretty completely what Texas industry and business has produced and marketed. The new survey, however, gets over on the consumer's side of the fence, measuring the extent of the available market by showing what and how much he uses."

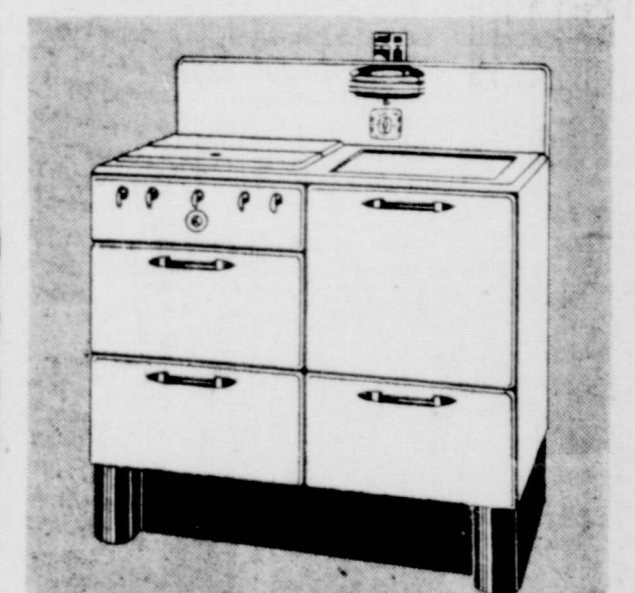

### Electric Power Use Gains 10.4 Per Cent

AUSTIN, Nov. 4 (Sp.)—Electric power consumption during September in Texas climbed 10.4 per cent over September, 1933, fourteen power companies have reported to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Total consumption in September was 260,041,000 kilowatt hours, compared to 237,557,000 k. w. h. in August.

Commercial consumption rose 12.3 per cent over September last year, industrial 10.2 per cent and residential 11.8 per cent.

For the first nine months of this year total consumption gained 7.3 per cent over January-September, 1933; commercial 10.7 per cent, industrial 5.4 per cent and residential 11.5 per cent.

"As there was no valid reason for calling at the Norwegian port, authorities decided the ship should be given free and the German prize crew interned."

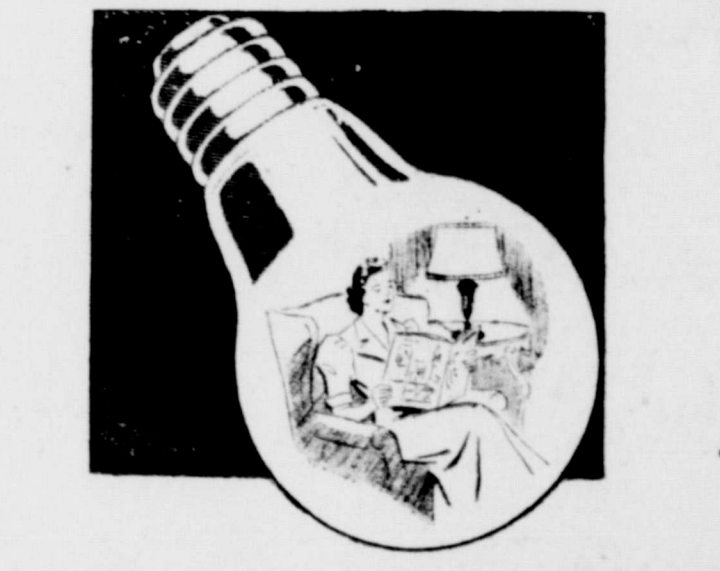
