\$1.75 of City Tax Rate Allocated to Debt Service

Most of the wartime propaganda fed to Americans has foreign origin but much of the propaganda with which citizens must contend has its origin right here in the United States. That kind is the most dangerous.

**DURING** a period when the majority of the people are particularly anxious to remain neutral, decidedly partisan bulletins are being issued by national groups, frequently supported by prominent persons. Speeches are made and petitions are signed and resolutions are passed. Influenced by certain apparent objective of the organization, many people are persuaded to align themselves with such groups and unwittingly lend their support to more subtle purposes.

Such organizations are run by Americans and composed of Americans. They are not consciously the pawns of any other government. They operate freely and openly under the prerogative of free speech, free press and free assembly. These are their rights; and to remove them would be unjust and undemocratic.

**FOREIGN** agents disseminating propaganda in the United States are now required to register with the secretary of state. In this respect, at least, they are labeled. American citizens are under no such compulsion as long as they are not in the employ of other nations. They are free to operate in any manner they see fit as long as their activities are not treasonable.

Thus, it is possible for American citizens to play directly into the hands of foreign governments with the widest possible liberty. It is true that many groups whose actions today fall into the category of propaganda are not desirous of leading America into war. But their unneutral tendencies, their efforts to support one side against the other, are not helping this country to emphasize its disdain for conflict and its determination not to become involved.

## Loan Program On Cotton Is Announced

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—**The agriculture department inaugurated a new loan program on cotton today in a move expected by crop control officials to result in improved prices for the south's big cash crop later in the season.

Producers may place 1939-grown cotton under government loans at a base rate equivalent to 8.3 cents a pound for middling 7-8 inch cotton, gross weight basis, or 8.7 cents on a net weight basis, subject to differentials for location of its storage.

The loan rate is slightly below the current price of about 9 cents a pound.

Cotton stored under loan at or near central markets or ports will be eligible for higher rates than that stored at remote points. Thus, on a net weight basis (bales weighing about 478 pounds) cotton stored in western Texas and in New Mexico will be eligible for the minimum rate of 8.7 cents, while that stored at some points in North Carolina and Virginia—near textile mills—will be eligible for a maximum rate of 9.3 cents. The rates of all Gulf of Mexico and California ports will be 9.2 cents. Inasmuch as this year's crop

of about 11,900,000 bales is not expected to meet domestic and export needs of the season, a shortage of "free" cotton—cotton not tied up in government loans—is expected to develop next spring and summer. Any of this year's cotton put under loan would tend, officials said, to hasten arrival of that period of shortage.

Officials said that such a shortage of free cotton should tend to boost prices to a point where it would be profitable for growers to take cotton out of loan and sell it.

Although cotton prices are higher than a year ago, officials explain that the "fair" or "parity" price is about 16 cents a pound.

The new loan program was announced at a time when more than 19,100,000 bales of surplus cotton is tied up under previous loan programs. Only cooperating cotton producers who have not knowingly planted or permitted the planting of cotton in 1939 in excess of their AAA cotton acreage allotment will be eligible for the full loan rate. Non-cooperators will be eligible to receive a loan at 60 percent of the rate applicable to co-operative producers and only on that part of their production in excess of their farm marketing quotas.

Cotton offered for loan will be subject to a schedule giving premiums and discounts for grade

and staples above and below middling 7-8 inch cotton. This schedule will be announced later.

This is the first time provision was made for location differentials.

"The recognition of the existing differences in market values attributable to location in no way indicates approval by the department of agriculture of the freight rates prevailing in the various parts of the cotton producing area," the loan announcement said. "A study of the freight rate structure on cotton is now being made by the department to determine if actions should be taken to secure adjustments."

The department said past experiences with cotton loans indicated that failure to take location differentials into account interfered with the "orderly movement" of cotton to market. It said that under a flat loan, cotton in areas removed from the mills and ports had tended to remain under loan.

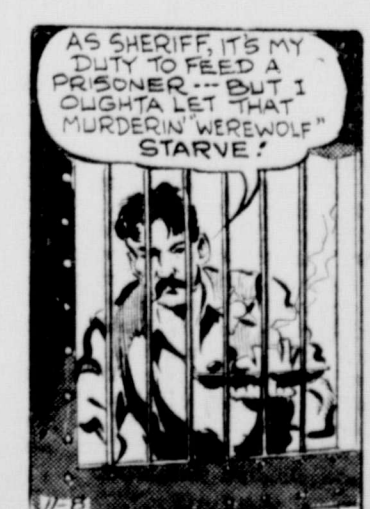

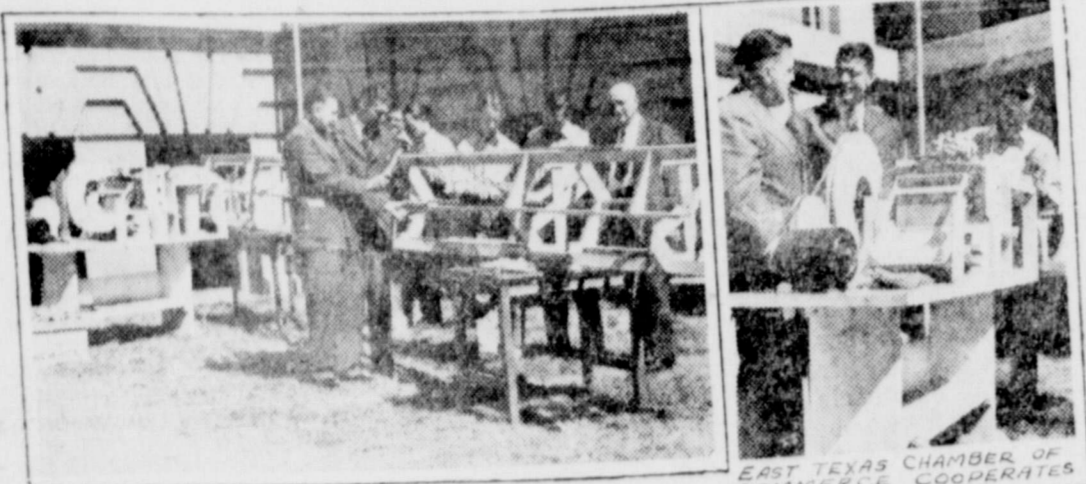

### Dehydration Plant Being Built at School

DENTON, Nov. 8.—Students are busy these fall days in the chemurgic laboratories at the North Texas State Teachers college building a sweet potato dehydration pilot plant which will realize a dream long held by East Texas chamber of commerce officials.

The plant, which is to have a maximum capacity of two tons of dehydrated potatoes a day, is being installed in the basement of the science building at the college and is to be operated on an experimental basis under the direction of Gilbert Wilson, instructor in chemurgy.

A big 35-foot dryer with a 26-foot drum has already been completed, and is ready for operation. Framework for the dryer is shown at the upper left as it was inspected during a recent trip to NTSTC campus by Elmore R. Torn, agricultural and forestry director of the East Texas chamber of commerce. Gilbert Wilson is next to Torn, and W. N. Masters, head of the NTSTC chemistry staff, is at the right.

In the picture at the upper right, Torn and Wilson take another look at the "Wilson Press," which was built by Wilson and others when the young scientist was instructor in science at White Oak high school. This work was begun last spring by Wilson as chairman of the sweet potato starch section of the chemurgic division of ETCC, of which Victor H. Schoffelmayer is chairman.

Principal difficulty in the dehydration problem was an efficient sweet potato press which would free the sweet potato from the necessary water soluble in order to obtain a chemically stable final dehydration product. This press is believed to have solved the difficulty and to have thus linked the sweet potato and starch industries, enabling the latter to operate on a 12-month basis.

Other equipment to be constructed yet are a pilot plant press, chemical mixers, and a grinder, all of size proportionate to the dryer. All machines are being built on the Teachers college campus especially for sweet potato dehydration processes.

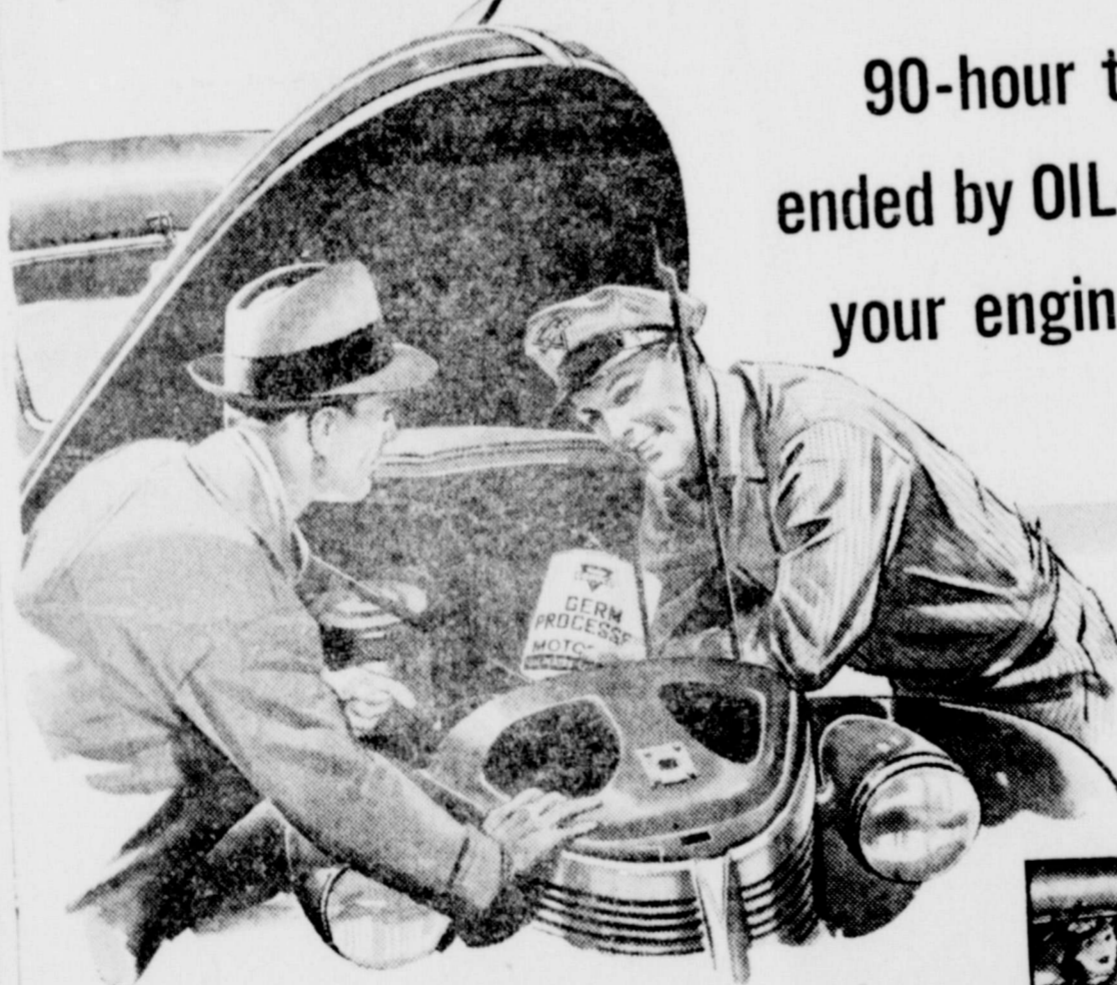

resolution apportion the taxes of the said City of Cisco levied and assessed against all taxable property located in said City of Cisco for the year 1939 so that the sum of \$1.75 levied against each \$100.00 of assessed value of said property be collected and paid into the interest and sinking fund of said city—the same to be retained therein subject to the order heretofore entered herein and such orders as may be hereafter entered herein; and that all further relief sought by plaintiff and intervenors herein, with to the amount of the taxes levied, assessed and collected the portion of such taxes to be held in abeyance, and the dictation over the parties, subject matter involved be retained pending the orders and judgment of the court.
