## **Road Continues** to Coleman Via Cottonwood

Discussion of the proposed Cisco - Cross Plains - Coleman highway teday had disclosed that there already exists a state highway designation between Cisco and Coleman via Scranton.

The highway, bonds of which are included in those which the state has assumed from the county, has been a sort of "orphan" since its designation in the first year of the state highway commission during the Ferguson adminis-




