Skipper of Columbus Says Crew Trained for Weeks

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (A) -The German liner Columbus was set afire and scuttled "under orders," her master, Capt. Wilhelm Daehne, declared on his arrival here last night with 578 rescued nazi sailors.

This was understood to mean the Columbus was sent to the bottom at the direction of Adolf Hitler, who had ordered similar destruction last Sunday of the German pocket battleship Graf Spee, whose commander committed suicide in Buenos Aires yes-
