County balks on jail contract

The Castro County Commissioners' Court Monday declined to approve the contract proposed by the City of Dimmitt for law-enforcement dispatching and jail service.

A new contract is needed because of some minor changes in the regulations of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards.

Under the old contractwhich has been in force since Jan. 18, 1977-the county furnishes radio dispatching service to the city police from midnight until 8 a.m. and allows the city to lodge Class C misdemeanor prisoners in the county jail. In exchange for these services, the city pays the salary of the night dispatcher and reimburses the county for the cost of meals and medical care for city prisoners.

The new contract proposed by the city would provide that city prisoners be booked into the county jail by members of the sheriff's department rather than city police, since sheriff's officers are certified jailers, as required by the revised regulations. Also, the county would provide the city with dispatching service from 5 p.m., when the city hall would continue to pay for a of city prisoners' meals and

medical care. The renegotiation of the contract prompted an extraordinary response on the part of county officials. Sheriff Granville Martin and his two attorneys, Frank Gaston and Keith Lemons of Plainview, were present at Monday's commission meeting and objected to many phrases of the contract, asking for technical definitions of almost every word and a detailed spelling out of the exact moment when responsibility for a prisoner passes from the city police to the county sheriff's office.

School board tackles priorities

Three new aldermen were sworn in last Thursday to serve on

Doug Lapins, Wayne Collins and Roy Lilley joined Mayor Elmer Youts and Aldermen Chet Braafladt and J. R. Brown on the six-man board following their election Nov. 6.

The first official act of the new board was to approve the proposed contract with the county for dispatcher service and use of the county jail for city Class C misdemeanor prisoners. There are only two changes in the city's proposed new contract:

-Dispatcher service to be provided by the county from 5 p.m. until 8 a.m. instead of midnight to 8 a.m. as under the current contract.

-City prisoners brought to the county jail will be booked and locked up by members of the sheriff's department, who are all certified jailers.

The changes are necessary to meet new requirements of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards.

The contract has been submitted to the county commissioners' court for its approval.

Coach Joe Lombard and the Swiftettes are aiming for their fourth consecutive state title this year, and the Swifts, coached again by Bud Birks, want to better their regional semi-final record.

After the Adrian game this weekend, the Swifts and Swiftettes will be in Bovina Monday, then will entertain Cotton Center at Nazareth Nov. 27.

Meanwhile, the Swifettes and Bobbies have been picked to give demonstrations in the Wayland Flying Queens Clinic Saturday, and will also play in the Queens Classic at Plainview.



Swifts rip Happy, 37-6

Hugh Wilhelm intercepted two passes to set up the first two Nazareth scores, then added the final touchdown himself as the Nazareth Swifts destroyed the Happy Cowboys, 37-6, at Swift Field Thursday night.

The Swifts ended the season at 6-3-1 and 3-1-1 in district, while the Cowboys finished 1-9 and 1-4 in district. It was the Cowboys' third consecutive loss.

Wilhelm made his first interception ironically on the first play of the game. He returned his sixth interception of the season to the Happy 25. Five plays later, Bryan Huseman scored his 13th touchdown of the year from a yard out. He added the PAT, and the Swifts led 7-0.



A great deal of research has been done on solar-powered plants but not much has been done on the concept of adding solar units to existing plants. This study will determine the engineering and economic factors of repowering an electric plant-if it can be done on a large scale and if it would be more economical than building new solar In recent years, as the

search for alternatives became more intense, Southwestern Public Service began to assess options that might have practical utility application. Solar power was one of the alternatives selected for consideration.

The company's involvement began with a data collection and literature review program of the latest developments in solar energy.

Southwestern's second solar project involved participation in a general atomic study of a 100-MW line focus solar central power system. This study in cooperation with DOE was completed Oct. 1, and a final report from DOE is expected soon. Six utility-industrial groups,

including SPS and GE, were chosen by the DOE to develop designs for combining a solar

The steam turbine would, however, be capable of using natural gas or a combination of natural gas and solar power. The solar portion of the plant would consist of a mirror field, a central receiver mounted on top of a 300-foot tower, a liquid sodium heat transfer system and three steam generators. The mirror field would include approximately 5,000 steerable suntracking mirrors called helio-

stats, occupying 276 acres. The central receiver of the system will be cooled by constantly flowing liquid sodium, which will maintain a constant temperature. GE has been interested in the use of liquid sodium for many years and has found it to be a highly efficient source.

The liquid sodium as a heat transfer agent, could be a major area of consideration by the DOE when it begins reviewing the repowering proposals. Similar plants designs are expected to use water, molton salts and gases as cooling agents.

Other factors DOE will be considering are efficiency, price and geographical location, for amounts of sunshine.

Veterans Day, Nov. 11, has come and gone for this year. We did have some local activities on Sunday in Dimmitt. After flag raising at the VFW Post, the VFW and AMVETS were hosts to a breakfast at the Colonial Inn. Both had goodly attendances, but there could be more, and memberships help keep alive the veteran benefits rightly deserved by those in the services. We have two other American Legion Posts in the county which are active-one at Hart and one at Nazareth. While to my knowledge we do not have a DAV Post in the county, the Disabled American Veterans do have mem-

bers in Castro County. Our office will be open Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays with other times by appointment to assist those VA pensioners who want to get assistance with their Annual Income Questionnaire cards. All must be in before Dec. 31 or there will be no check to recipients on Feb. 1.

A recent increase of nearly 10 percent in some Veterans Administration pension rates may prompt some veterans to take another look at the "improved" VA pension plan passed last year by Congress.

The rate increase under the newest VA pension program is tied directly to increases in Social Security payments. The latter were raised 9.9 percent as of June 1, 1979.

Nearly 432,000 veterans have asked the VA to switch their pensions to the "improved" plan.

The improved plan offers substantially higher pension rates than the old program, but changes in some income counted under the new plan may make it advisable for certain veterans to remain under their current plan.

VA pensions are based on income and go to eligible wartime veterans who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not traceable to their service, and who are in financial need.

Pensions are also paid to

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certain needy survivors of wartime veterans. Under the new pension rates, a single veteran may receive a maximum pension of \$3,902 a year, up from \$2,364. Because certain income that is ignored under the old plan is counted in computing eligibility for the improved plan, some veterans will be better off not to switch plans.
