About the only thing it lacks is the sheep and goats. These can be secured. Not overnight. But in a program which within a few years would find the country well populated with livestock which would be a worthy and valuable complement to the beef cattle industry, a source of soil enrichment and of new in-

One method of encouraging this is to provide a place where interest may be aroused through exhibits and awards. Emphasis on the livestock will attract attention. The primary reason for a stock show is to encourage interest in stock raising and to encourage the production of better

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To have an effective show, there must be a home for it. cannot be a success if it itinerant, going from place to place and operating on borrowed equipment. It must be established in a say, just as a man to be the best kind of citizen must own soil or property fixed to soil.

There is only one way,

under the circumstances that exist, to secure a show ground. That is to start planning now, to secure from the city a suitable site, and to begin adding to the equipment as this can be obtained. Above all, the plans that are adopted should be plans for permanency. It seems to me that it should be possible to obtain suitable old buildings, unused now but of serr cable character, and move them to the site, adapting them to the requirements to be made of them. The cost should be slight. Perhaps some unexpected citizen, with an altruistic spot in a heart of supertwisted cord, would donate a structure of two for such purpose. Perhaps his example would be followed by another, likewise possessed of unexpected qualities. It is not altogether impossible that Cisco be blessed with this staunch type of citizen. (One must have a heart of super-twisted cord to acquire anything; a spot of altruism in order to give it

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
