Boyce Tate will be the alternate for the boys and Miss Mary Lynn Hendrix and Miss Linda Hance will be the alternates for the girls.

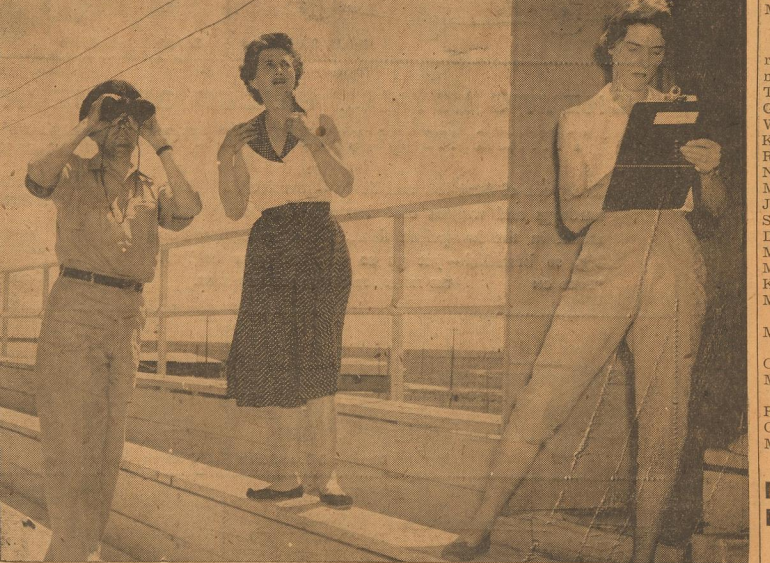

## \$1,500 Reached In Drive For Scholarship Loan Fund

Castro County citizens have pledged or actually contributed \$1,505.50 in preliminary contribution solicitations toward setting up a JayCee-sponsored county scholarship fund.

The announcement came this week from Bill Reisdorph, who, with JayCee Calvin Lippard, is directing the project. This amount more or less guarantees the first year of education for two students who can do some part-time work.

This money will be a loan fund. College students from Castro County who do not have money available for their education may borrow from this scholarship fund enough to pay all or part of their education with the understanding they will repay the no interest loan after they graduate at their convenience.

The money will be set up as a perpetual trust fund, to be administered over the years.

According to Reisdorph, several students from all three county school systems have said they would like to apply if the fund is

made available. Preference will be based on college aptitude tests given applicants.

This week brought the first positive indication that the program will be carried out. While only a relative few persons were contacted by the JayCee Committee, the goal set for going ahead with the plan was quickly exceeded.

This is the first time that capable Castro County students whose parents cannot send them to college have the opportunity of using a "loan" scholarship. It is also unique that high school grades are not a major criteria for selection.

The loan fund is available only to high school graduating seniors. The only exception made thus far is when a senior boy elects to take his six months of reserve military training before entering college.

The JayCees hope eventually that enough money will be in the fund that any student graduating from a Castro County High School will

have it available if he or she needs it.

Anyone wishing to add to this scholarship loan fund may do so by contacting any member of the Dimmitt JayCees or mailing or leaving a check or draft at the Castro County News. If mailed, a notation should be made on the check that it is for the JayCee Scholarship Loan Fund.

## Seven File for Three Offices In County Politics

Monday was the deadline for filing as a candidate in the Democratic primary July 26th.

Thus the county political picture cleared with competition in three major county races.

In the race for county judge will be incumbent Robert Estes and former Dimmitt store owner Raymond Wilson.

Three persons have filed for the County and District Clerk's job. They are incumbent Neva Lois Hastings, Mrs. R. B. Boren and Zonelle Maples.

John C. Stork, a candidate for re-election as Commissioner, Precinct 4, has Andrew Acker as his opponent.

Noble Armstrong, candidate for Commissioner of Precinct 2, and Faye E. Holland, candidate for County Treasurer, are both unopposed in their bid for re-election.

For State Senator, 30th Senatorial District, are Andy Rogers (seeking re-election), of Childress; Karl L. Lovelady of Muleshoe; and Leroy Saul of Kress.

Also on the ballot will be Harold M. LaFont for re-election as District Judge; and Jesse M. Osborn for re-election as State Representative, 96th District; and Walter Rogers for re-election as representative from the 18th District.

Two men are in the race for the Democratic nomination for State Senator. They are present Senator Ralph Yarborough and William Blakely. Yarborough will be backed by the liberal wing of the Democratic party and Blakely will be the conservatives' candidate.

In the governor's race, six men had filed Monday. They are incumbent Price Daniel, the conservative candidate; Senator Henry B. Gonzalez, former governor and senator W. Lee O'Daniel; Alvis Vandygriff, lawyer and veteran state worker; Don Booker, Orange insurance man, and Joe Irwin, Dallas insurance man.

Politically, Daniel and O'Daniel are associated with the conservative element of the party in Texas. Gonzalez, filibustering Senator foe of segregation bills and champion of state minorities, carries the liberal tag, although he has been known to deny it. The other candidates for governor are in their first race and their political views are not known. The liberal wing of the party does not have what would be considered a strong candidate for the office. Most of the liberal force is expected to be expended in the Senatorial race between Yarborough and Blakely.

## County School Programs Adequate But Unimpressive Says Committee

Castro County schools easily meet minimum state requirements, but there is considerable room for improvement, was the general attitude of the local School Program report of the Hale-Aikin Committee of Twenty-four.

The need for additions to the school program is not attributed to administrative procedure but more to the smallness of the school systems involved. Every improvement called for is found automatically in large schools in metropolitan cities, but would entail considerable additional cost if added to the three school systems in Castro County.

The committee found that to offer additional courses would require an increased teacher allotment and more special education teachers. Some inconveniences they feel, cannot be economically resolved. For instance, combined grades exist in Nazareth (3rd and 4th, 4th and 5th, and 6th and 7th) and in the colored schools in Hart and Nazareth. "Enrollment does not justify more teachers," the committee felt.

"The weakest areas in Castro County are arts and crafts, music and physical education. There is over-stressing of (team sports) and too little physics and health education," the Committee said. Elementary science is taught in only one school of the county.

The committee felt that the school systems are doing as good a job as possible in most areas.

Testing and guidance is carried out presently as an integrated program only at Dimmitt High School. Achievement tests are used in all elementary schools but mental, aptitude, interests and vocational preference tests are given only in Dimmitt. A full time counseling service will not be available until next year in Dimmitt, so the committee, at the time of the study, rated the county as poor in the guidance program.

"Although some group and individual counseling is done, we think from a county-wide standpoint, it is inadequate," the committee said. To remedy this situation, additional counseling allotments were urged.

The Committee on Program felt that the vocational agriculture and home economics programs in the county were adequate but that is the extent of vocational training.

County-wide, the committee felt that handicapped children were not adequately cared for due to a lack of trained personnel in that field. The group also felt that very little was done for gifted children. "The State should provide allotments (teachers) for them. Counselors and teachers should find the students. Students should be guided into fields they should be in," the committee said.

One problem found in Castro County schools was the confinement of school principals. "The administrative staff is not adequate," they said. "There are no assistants to the principals in this county. We believe that secretarial help should be provided to take care of routine clerical problems to allow principals freedom to get better job done."

As to health services, the committee felt that the county was very low in this department as well as in elementary library facilities.

It also found that education films and tape recordings were little used in the county. Transportation services could stand improvements, and meals and their cost were satisfactory but a menu should be posted and published.

In general, the committee felt that more improvements could be made in every school system in the county, but it would take increased expenditures so far as program is concerned.

This is the final of four reports presented by the Castro County Hale-Aikin Committee of Twenty-four, which was organized to give both the state educational agency and local citizens a better look at the requirements and potentials of their school systems.

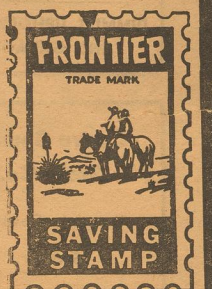

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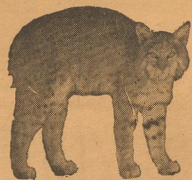
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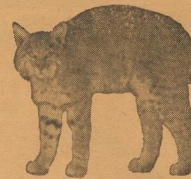

little more than 18 million barrels a day, an increase of about 10 million during the past ten years.

So rank and file Texans, Oklahomians, Californians and others from major oil producing states must begin to shoulder more of their state tax loads. It is indicative of the effect world conditions have on small communities that every barrel of oil pumped in Venezuela, loaded into a tanker and transported to Houston means that Castro County citizens are just a little closer to paying that extra penny or two on every dollar they spend to support our state government. The fabled "oil-rich Texas" is in a position now to start looking for other sources of revenue.

We seriously doubt that any effective curbs will be placed on crude oil importation in the United States. Even if it is detrimental to the state, the nation, and the independent producers, the fact that more of our increasingly expensive and diminishing reserves are being left underground for the future has a mollifying effect. We would like to keep on getting the tax from full-scale domestic production, but whether we wear out the goose that lays the golden egg now or later is up to this nation and its oil companies.

### State Wheat Increase Soon

The Castro County wheat allotment for 1959 will be announced before the June 20 wheat quota referendum. The state has received a slight increase—4,164,302 for 1959 as compared with 4,099,094 for 1958.

The 1959 national wheat acreage allotments of 55 million acres is the minimum fixed by law and is the same as for the 1958 crop. Legislation provides for the establishing of a national wheat acreage allotment each year except in the event of a national emergency. If the allotment had been determined on the basis of the law's supply formula, the 1959 allotment would have been 21,375,000 acres.

## Margaret Odom Outstanding Wayland Athlete

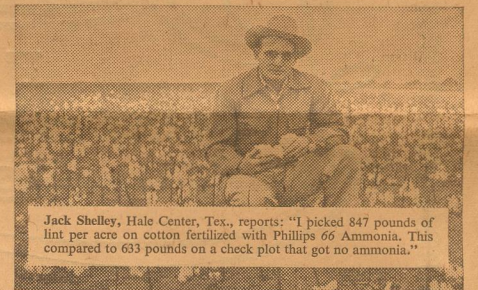

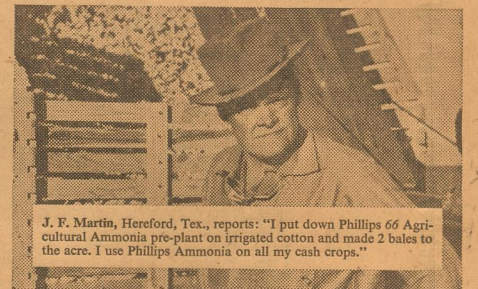

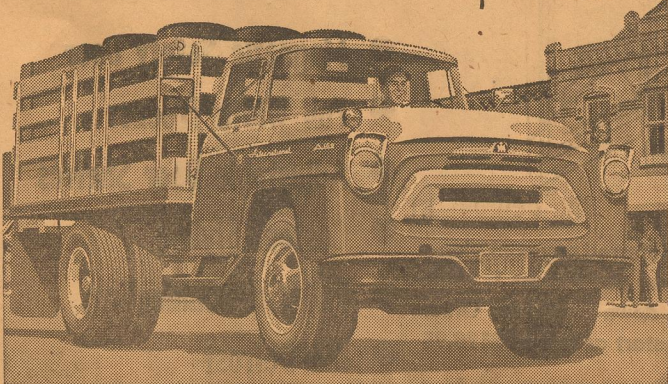
