LIES PLAN HIT HARD MORE ROUTE

Lanc Along Norway Coast Objective of Drive

LONDON, April 2 (AP).—British diplomats are preparing to "strike as hard as possible" against the proposed route along Norway's coast by which Germany imports Swedish iron ore.

German ships carrying iron ore from the coast have been hit by the "six-mile limit" which Norway claims for shipping.

British officials have informed sources in London that technical points arising from the decision of the allied war council to stop German imports. This was taken care of by the decision to place a naval base of "any size" in the area.

The forces of both the British and French empires were being used for a crippling blow at Germany's economic base.

The French chamber of commerce, also resuming meetings, will be informed by Paul Reynaud of steps taken here last Thursday he allied war council.

The navy traditionally is "silent service," carrying out orders without publicity, no one is expected to come from the navy to the press.

Threat Sounded by CIO Labor Leader

MONONGAH, W. V., April 2 (AP)—John L. Lewis Monday sounded a threat to organize labor, youth, old age, negro and farmers' groups into a third party unless democrats adopt a platform and select a candidate acceptable to labor and the common people.

The outspoken president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations brusquely commented: "I don't expect anything of the republicans," and changed the present administration is curtailing the meager relief heretofore extended.

Lewis did not specifically mention a third party, but said unless the conditions he laid down were met by democrats at their convention, he would call a convention of his own, presumably before the fall elections.

Striking at those who, he said, secretly hope America may be drawn into the European war and thus find the answer to the economic and political questions that beseth the land, Lewis declared such persons were in for a fool's awakening.

He disclosed plans for a strong alliance between the American Youth congress and the Labor's Nonpartisan league, which Lewis organized, already have been worked out and ratified.

Declaring that in some southern states only 26 per cent of the population votes and that 8,000,000 negro voters were disfranchised in eight southern states because they do not have enough money to pay their poll tax, Lewis called the poll tax iniquitous and said such a condition was damnable.

The bushy-haired labor leader announced plans to speak at a forthcoming meeting of the Townsend old-age organization and to address conventions of the American negro congress and the American Society for the Advancement of Colored People.

Big War Talk In Little Country

ZURICH, Switzerland, April 2 (AP).—The Zurich newspaper "Die Tat" complained recently in a front page editorial that the Swiss are so interested in their big neighbors' wars and political troubles that they're forgetting their own internal problems.

"We gaze in an almost hypnotic state at what is going on beyond our frontiers," said the paper, "and meanwhile our own internal affairs suffer from lack of interest. Let's go back to our own pastures."

CROSS PLAINS COUPLE DIE IN ACCIDENT

Car Hits Dips, Crashes Into Tree on Right of Way

A Cross Plains couple were fatally injured Monday afternoon in a highway accident two miles west of that community. The man, Tom Holmes, an oil well driller, died en route to Cisco and his wife died at 10:30 in a local hospital of injuries which attendants said consisted of both legs broken, chest and head injuries.

The accident occurred at 3:30 yesterday afternoon when the Holmes automobile, apparently driving at a rapid rate, hit two dips on highway 206, went out of control and crashed into a live-oak tree on the right-of-way. The tree was uprooted in the impact.

Mrs. Holmes died of a head fracture, which opened the skull.

Rites for the couple will probably be held in Fort Worth, where two sisters of Mrs. Holmes live. The bodies were taken to Fort Worth by a Fort Worth undertaker Tuesday. Arrangements for the services awaited word from a brother of Mr. Holmes in Bismark, N. D.

Mr. and Mrs. Holmes had been living in Cross Plains for several months, where he had been engaged in drilling operations.

Group Hospital Service Now Available Here

The plan of Group Hospital service was originated by a distinguished Texas hospital executive and educator. He might have copyrighted his great idea for personal profit, but instead, he gave it to the hospitals of Texas for the unanimous action which they have taken.

Under state law, for the first time in history, a non-commercial and non-profit hospital service is given to the people of Texas at a cost permitting men and women earning the smallest salaries to easily provide for the emergencies of health in the future with the surety that they are under the protection of a stringent state law.

Group hospital service is the only plan sponsored by the Texas Hospital association and wholeheartedly endorsed by doctors, county medical societies, state medical association, state health department and state department of insurance. This plan does not exploit people, but serves them according to their hospital needs.

For this reason, Group Hospital service is receiving, and is entitled to, the support and co-operation of such state organizations as chambers of commerce, American Legion, Lions clubs, Kiwanis clubs, Rotary clubs, P-T. A. clubs and women's clubs. This plan is required by its charter to place 85 per cent of its membership fees in such banks that are acceptable as a state depository.

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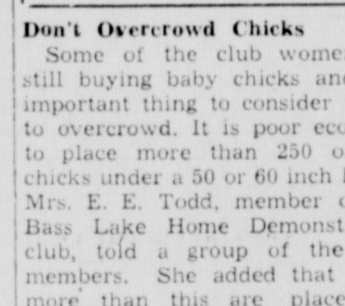

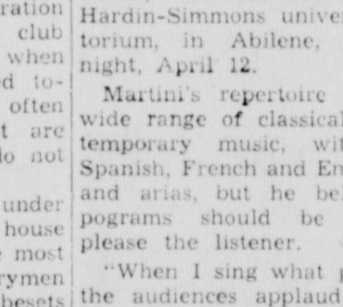
