### Spanish Balance Sheet

SURELY when three-quarters of a million human beings have poured out their lives in bringing about a certain result, the world may be pardoned an inquiry as to just what was that result.

It is not quite one year ago that General Franco of Spain mounted the steps of Santa Barbara Cathedral in Madrid and handed his sword to Cardinal Gomay Thomas. He was master of Spain. The dead were dead. The civil war was ended.

The republic, with all its dissensions, its political turmoil, its disorders, was dead. Franco was free to begin establishing his state.

A year has passed. Here are the leading accomplishments:

**T**HERE is order. More than half million adherents or suspected adherents of the republic are in prison. Much reconstruction of war's ravages has been accomplished; many of the 12,000

destroyed Madrid buildings have been replaced.

The grandees have their lands back, the Jesuits have been restored to their former position. The traditional religion of Spain has been restored to its ancient place.

A British credit of \$10,000,000 and 250,000 bales of American cotton on credit are helping to restore business, though feed is scarce and prices are high.

Business is under complete control of the government. No factory may build an addition, not a preseta's worth of goods may be imported, without government permits. Prices are fixed by the government.

**H**OW long it will take Spain to get its broken transport system, its shattered economics, back to where they were four years ago, it is hard to say. The less tangible results of the bitter civil war will be considered gains by some, losses by others. As Americans, it is almost impossible for us to judge. What comes to the American mind is not so much "Is this good?" as "Was this really necessary?"

What might be learned is a lesson against intolerance. Because two opposing factions in Spain's life could not, or would not, adjust themselves to one another in a workable manner, 750,000 men and women are dead. And the long, painful climb back toward a life of peace, toleration, and security for all is just beginning.

The Japanese, who don't like our conduct in the East, may go so far as to refuse to apologize for insults unless we mend our ways.

## NRLB Sustained In Decision by Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—The supreme court refused Monday to review a national Labor board order directing the Republic Steel corporation to reinstate 5,000 or more Ohio employees who participated in the 1937 "little steel" strike.

This left in effect a decision by the federal circuit court at Philadelphia sustaining the reinstatement order except for 40 employees.

The cost of the order to the Republic Steel corporation, the labor board said, must await future determination.

A petition for a review of the circuit court ruling, asked by a group of unions of the corporation's employees known as the "Central Council of Steel Plants," also was denied by the high court. The board had ordered their establishment on the ground they were "company dominated."

Among other actions, the court granted a petition by Harry Bridges, west coast labor leader, for review of his contempt of court conviction for sending a telegram to Secretary of Labor Perkins

criticizing a decision by the Los Angeles superior court.

No opinions were delivered Monday and the court adjourned for two weeks.

Bridges, in asking the review, contended the conviction deprived him of freedom of speech, freedom of press and denied a right to petition the federal government for a "redress of grievances."

## Filibuster Ends As Candidate's Voice Weakens

BELLEVILLE, Ill., April 9 (AP)—His voice a husky whisper, Geo. E. Hary, candidate for the democratic nomination for congress, halted his filibuster Monday night, although he was several hours short of the consecutive talking goal through which he hoped to prove his ability as a legislator.

Hary, who had declared he would speak until the polls opened Tuesday, curled up in a chair in time to vote. He had talked for fifty-two hours.

The candidate, who before entering politics was a promoter of soft ball games with the players riding on goals, began his filibuster Saturday afternoon against Congressman Edwin M. Schaefer, who is seeking nomination from the Twenty-third Illinois district.

Visitors to the hall—above a saloon—late Monday found him seated in a chair, nodding, both arms clasped about a microphone. The only other person in the unheated room was Hary's wife, who kept him supplied with sandwiches and popped them in his mouth while he was talking.

Hary's stunt capped efforts of two other candidates in the mad-cap race.

A. L. Bedel, former WPA time-keeper, suggested the hot weather of July might be avoided by exchanging the names of January and July, while Henry N. Frees, former circus juggler and clown, surprised his audiences by standing on his head while talking.

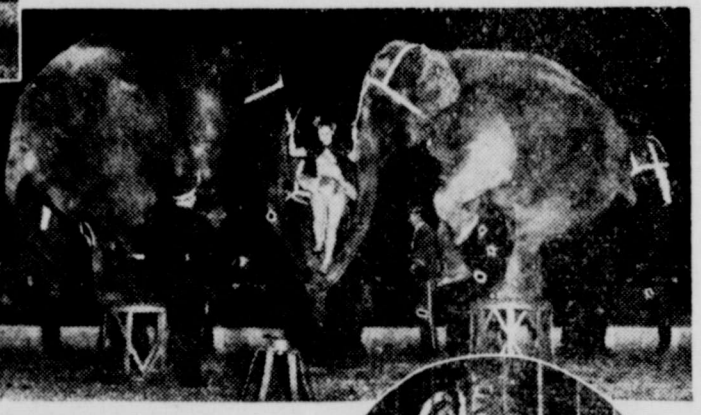
# Camera Fan Shoots Night Circus Brings 'em Back Alive!

IF BOB could only have his way, a-hunting he would go—to darkest Africa in pursuit of big game. But Bob is no millionaire. So he satisfies his hunting instincts by shooting pictures—photos of everything. Bob, you see, is one of America's countless camera fans.

The circus played his town the other night. Bob had always wanted to snare some prize photoflash shots of circus acts. But how to do this, what with his seat in the crowd so far away from his quarry? That was the question. Here is his answer:

He captured circus scenes here shown with the aid of, believe it or not—with midgets. No... not with the help of the familiar circus midget. Truth is, Bob bagged each picture with a single tiny flash bulb no bigger than a walnut. So small yet so powerful is the peewee lamp that photographers are calling it the "mighty midget."

The rest of the story accounting for Bob's success in getting clear action shots from far away is this. He used high-speed film. He took advantage of the fact that the midget bulb's flash is a point-source of light. This permitted use of a spot-type reflector with the result that Bob was able to rifle a powerful "bullet" of light at his distant targets.



Thus, not only Bob saw the circus, but so did his relatively inexpensive camera. No wonder he "brought 'em back alive."

# "Other Side" of Chain Store Question Next

WASHINGTON, April 9 (Sp).—The "other side" of the chain store question—how the chain stores have made possible a better standard of living in American cities and on American farms—will be presented by farmers and ranchers, housewives and economists, during the next several days in answer to two weeks of attacks on chains by Representative Patman and a group of supporters, urging on a congressional sub-committee the enactment into law of the Texas congressman's proposal to tax chain stores to death. Chairman McCormick said that the testimony "against" the bill would be under way during the latter part of the week.

Foes of businesses that have expanded into multiple units of stores through efficient business methods have been presenting evidence of "evils" of chains since March 27 in hearings conducted each morning before a sub-committee of the house ways and means committee.

The Patman bill has been on the calendar since the 76th congress convened in January, 1939. Patman proposed it to apply on a graduated scale, starting at \$50 a store and graduating up to \$1,000 a store, and this amount to be multiplied by the number of states, including the District of Columbia, in which the owning company conducts its business. Thus, a nation-wide system would be taxed \$49,000 for each store.

# LEAVE 'EM WHERE THEY LIE

Abdominal Injuries (Continued). You were told of a ruptured internal organ and the complication of internal hemorrhage in the last issue.

So to answer what should you do: lay 'em flat—keep 'em still—and quiet—and warm—BUT NO BRINK as that may make 'em vomit, which makes internal bleeding worse and SO DOES MOVING 'EM—only worse.

Realize that a torn solid organ like the liver or spleen or kidney is going to bleed just like a torn wound anywhere else. Remember blood will congeal—(clot) if not disturbed and the wound allowed to seal itself; if the wound is kept open by moving and pulling, it will keep on bleeding and finally the blood gets so thick the blood pressure is lowered to or past the danger point.

So how much they bleed depends on you—a little or enough to kill. If you leave 'em lie, keep 'em still and warm until the pulse that has been fast slows to below 90 beats to the minute; you have probably saved a life, because the blood will tend to clot and the tear seal itself so that bleeding will stop and only start again if they are manhandled.

BUT if you MOVE 'em before the bleeding stops they will keep on bleeding and die—and YOU killed 'em, not the accident. Believe it or not, eighty per cent of automobile deaths that die on the way in or when they reach the hospital are unnecessary; that means if you leave 'em lie, treat shock and control hemorrhage, that many should be saved.

Keep them quiet and still—avoid excitement—excitement increases shock. LEAVE 'EM LIE—TREAT SHOCK—DON'T SIT 'EM UP—LET 'EM LIE FLAT—TREAT SHOCK!

regardless of the store's size. During hearings Patman agreed that amount could perhaps be cut in half—still a death blow. Last week Secretary Wallace of the department of agriculture advised the committee that "sound public policy requires that we promote efficient methods of marketing and distribution rather than discourage them or prevent them by taxes such as those provided in this bill." Wallace stated that "Studies of the federal trade com- mission and other agencies have indicated that food chains have been able to introduce a number of economies into food distribution. The department of agriculture holds no brief for any type of food distribution, but does believe that greater efficiency and lower cost of marketing of farm products are of greater importance, both to the farmer and the consuming public." During the march of witnesses "for" the tax, Gerrit Vandor Hooning of Michigan, president of the National Association of Retail Grocers, answered committeemen's questions with an admission that the issue is "really a contest between chains and wholesalers." wants unless you are able to whip the other. Scandinavia cannot whip either the Allies or Germany. She must serve one or the other. She allied. Now her allegiance is being determined for her.

Meanwhile another foolish game is being played by the Washington politicians. It is extremely dangerous to try to fool the people. It is especially dangerous when rapidity is involved. The new deal, telling the folks that public debt is investment in national prosperity, is having a hard time trying to stem the trend toward "over-investment" before the people discover that, investment or not, the people who loaned the money expect payment with interest and the public must pay it.

Senator Alva Adams of Colorado has a suggestion. He would borrow some more money to meet specific appropriations. In other words he would fool the people into believing that the national debt limit has not been exceeded by the new government spending, that appropriations are being met and no new taxes are necessary.

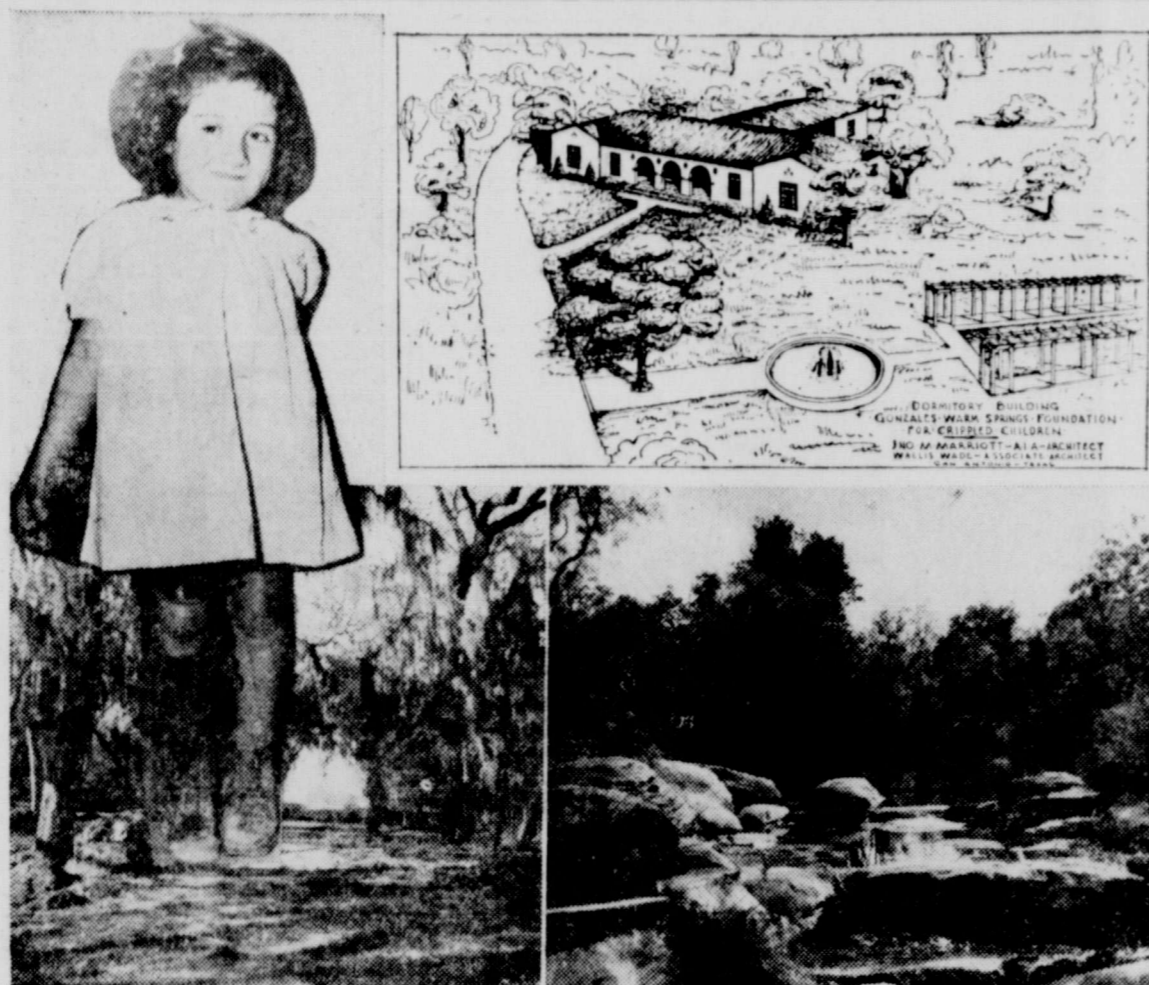
Such a suggestion is typical of political war thinking. But if the politicians who subscribe to the deception think that they are going to avoid the real issue they are as badly fooled as Norway and her Scandinavian sisters were fooled about the security of their neutrality.

The sooner the people of this country face the real issue of paying for what is spent on them by their government, the sooner will the country get back to a sound economic and political basis. As long as Washington politicians practice "deceptive" tactics because they are afraid to put the issue square up to the people there is no hope for recovery until the inevitable revolt takes place. As things stand now in this country, politically and economically, is heading for an upheaval that will make the crash of 1929 and revolt against Hooverism look like a small whirlwind.

today confirmed reports that four foreign warships had attempted to force an entrance into Oslo fjord, water gateway to the Norwegian capital.

The invaders were reported repulsed by shore batteries. These quarters said that one of the attacking ships was a heavy cruiser.

The attack took place about 12:30 a. m. (5:30 p. m., Monday, CST), and was over within a short time.

Some informants said the warship attack was accompanied by an air battle above the darkened gorge between Norwegian fighting craft and unidentified foreign warplanes.

Details of the air battle were not at once known, but apparently the invading planes were driven off by the Norwegians.

Reports of the engagement could not be confirmed at once in official quarters.

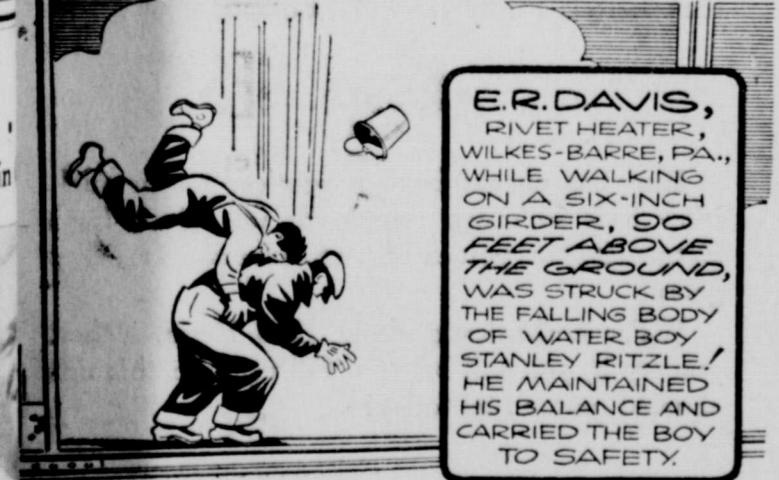

#### Illinois Lt. Governor Tries To Seize Power

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 9 (AP)—Lieut. Gov. John Stelle proclaimed himself Acting Governor in a melodramatic move Monday but ailing Gov. Henry Horner refused to relinquish the reins of the state government.

While the battle for the gubernatorial powers excited the capital, State Representative A. Andrew Torrence, a negro, was slashed and shot to death in his Chicago campaign headquarters in another startling prelude to Tuesday's primary elections in Illinois. His assailant, Cornelius Woodward, a negro, collapsed and died of a heart attack before he could make a statement.

These sensational developments diverted attention for the time being from the impending presidential preference primaries, pitting President Roosevelt against Vice President John N. Garner on the democratic side and putting Thomas E. Dewey to a solo test in the republican ranks.

Lieutenant Governor Stelle, insurgent candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, strode into the governor's state house office, seated himself at a secretary's desk and issued the proclamation. He signed himself Acting Governor and called the legislature into special session April 30—the same date listed in a similar call by the Governor Horner filed less than an hour earlier.

Stelle told reporters he was assuming the governor's duties under the disability clause of the state constitution. He contended Horner had been ill for eighteen months and that his power had been usurped by State Finance Director Samuel L. Nudelman and other back-room bosses.

While the lieutenant governor prepared to leave for Chicago, Atty. Gen. John E. Sassy terminated Stelle's action absolutely null and void.

Governor Horner, confined to the executive mansion by illness, stated: "I will continue to serve as governor. Stelle's pathetic antics should evoke pity rather than censure." He described Stelle as a desperate and defeated man.
