# AZIS CLAIM WARPLANES SINK BATTLESHIP

## SAY BOMBS SINK SHIP OF 30,000 TONS

British Have No Comment on Report of Loss at Namsos

BERLIN, May 4 (AP).—Germany asserted jubilantly Saturday that her bombing planes had sunk one of the mightiest vessels of the British navy—a 30,000-ton battleship of the Queen Elizabeth class—off Norway's coast.

The sinking was said by the German high command to have taken place off Namsos, the port from which the last British troops in Central Norway re-embarked Friday.

Authorized sources said that it was the first time since the beginning of the current war that German aircraft had been sent out with specific orders to keep after a designated battleship until it was sent to the bottom.

Adolf Hitler and Air Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering were represented as overjoyed at the news of this latest German success, which they were said to regard as equivalent to the defeat of an army.

**Five Vessels of Class**  
(Vessels of the Queen Elizabeth class, of which there are five, normally carry a compliment of 1,124 to 1,184 men. The class includes the Queen Elizabeth, Warspite and Valiant, each totaling 30,600 tons, and the Barham and Malaya, each of 31,100 tons.

In London, British sources declined to comment on the Nazi claim. Britain has not admitted the loss of any capital ship through air attack since the start of the war.

From the high command came the announcement that German vanguards north of the Arctic ore port of Narvik turned back the enemy, while the situation in Narvik remained unchanged.

In the Andalsnes sector north of Trondheim, deserted by all but Norwegian forces, the communication reported the surrender of one general, 127 officers and 2,500 men.

**Report Submarine Sunk**

"Pacification is proceeding throughout Norway," said the high command.

It was announced also Saturday that an enemy submarine had been sunk by a pursuing German U-boat after it had been sighted and bombed by a German reconnaissance plane. The location was not disclosed.

The high command said the battleship sinking actually took place Friday, but that it had withheld the news "in order to give Winston Churchill (first lord of the British admiralty) a chance to say it when Churchill maintained silence, the high command felt the information should be delayed no longer, it was said.

German authorities said that numerous hits were scored on the battleship during the attack, which the communication said was carried out by dive bombers, but it was thought that one bomb must have struck the magazine.

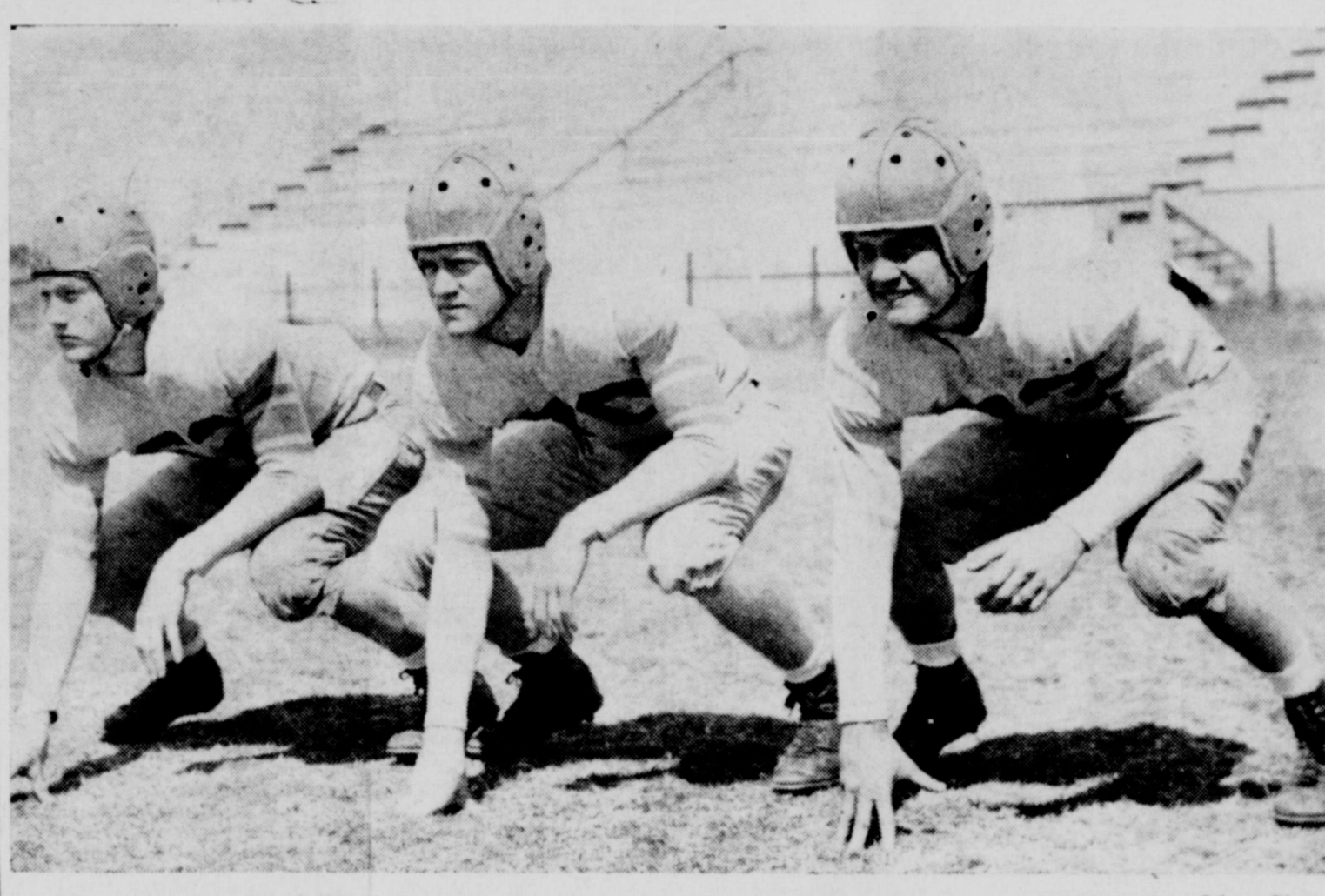
That alone, it was said, could have caused the flames which were reported to have shot up over 1,500 feet into the air.

**Nothing But Debris**  
"After the clouds of smoke disappeared," said the high command communication, "there was nothing more of the ship to be seen except debris."

## CISCO DEMOS MUM ON FDR-GARNER ISSUE

### Controversy in West Cisco As Wirtz Is Endorsed

If there was any Garner-Roosevelt issue in the democratic precinct conventions held here Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, it was not apparent in the proceedings. In only one instance was there any controversy over issues before the conventions.

On a closely divided vote after a heated discussion democrats of the west Cisco precinct passed resolutions endorsing Olvin J. Wirtz of Austin for democratic national committeeman from Texas. The convention with more formality endorsed the national administration of Roosevelt and Garner. The delegation to the county convention at Eastland next Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock was not instructed.

**Oil Men Protest**  
Several oil men present strongly protested the endorsement of Wirtz on the ground that, as the undersecretary of interior, he was Secy Ickes' "right-hand man" and committed to policies of federal control which would destroy state control and individual enterprise in the industry.

Those speaking in support of the resolution as strongly condemned federal control and the policies represented by Ickes. They insisted, however, that Wirtz in an outstanding democrat and that the resolution was entirely in order as a courtesy to which he is entitled.

### Another Hemisphere Link

WITHIN a month another link in the chain binding the western hemisphere into an economic unit is expected to be forged. The creation of the Inter-American Bank by five countries, Brazil, Colombia, Mexico, Nicaragua, and the United States, is likely to be accomplished soon.

This is a highly important step. It may result in an almost revolutionary change in financial and economic relations between the countries of the Americas.

This undertaking is completely different from the present Import-Export Bank. This is not an undertaking of the United States, but a joint undertaking of the five countries, and perhaps later of others who may join. It will be more like the Bank of

International Settlements, a sort of American "World Bank."

THE object is broad—to promote trade between the Americas, to foster good will, to help stabilize currencies, to aid industrial development and monetary equilibrium.

Certain immediate results should follow: (1) It would be the first step on the part of the United States to redistribute its gold and silver among countries with which it seeks to stimulate trade and friendly relations. (2) It would tend to supplant private capital ventures in foreign fields by joint ventures of all American countries, thus minimizing classes which have always been a source of diplomatic friction (as in the oil cases in Mexico at present). (3) It would tend to make the Americas still more closely interdependent, and thus less dependent on Europe. And all American countries know now that European trade and financial invasions are arms of the new imperialism.

If the American countries can together supply their own capital needs for expansion; and industrial and economic progress, so much smaller is the chance of European penetration by alien ideologies.

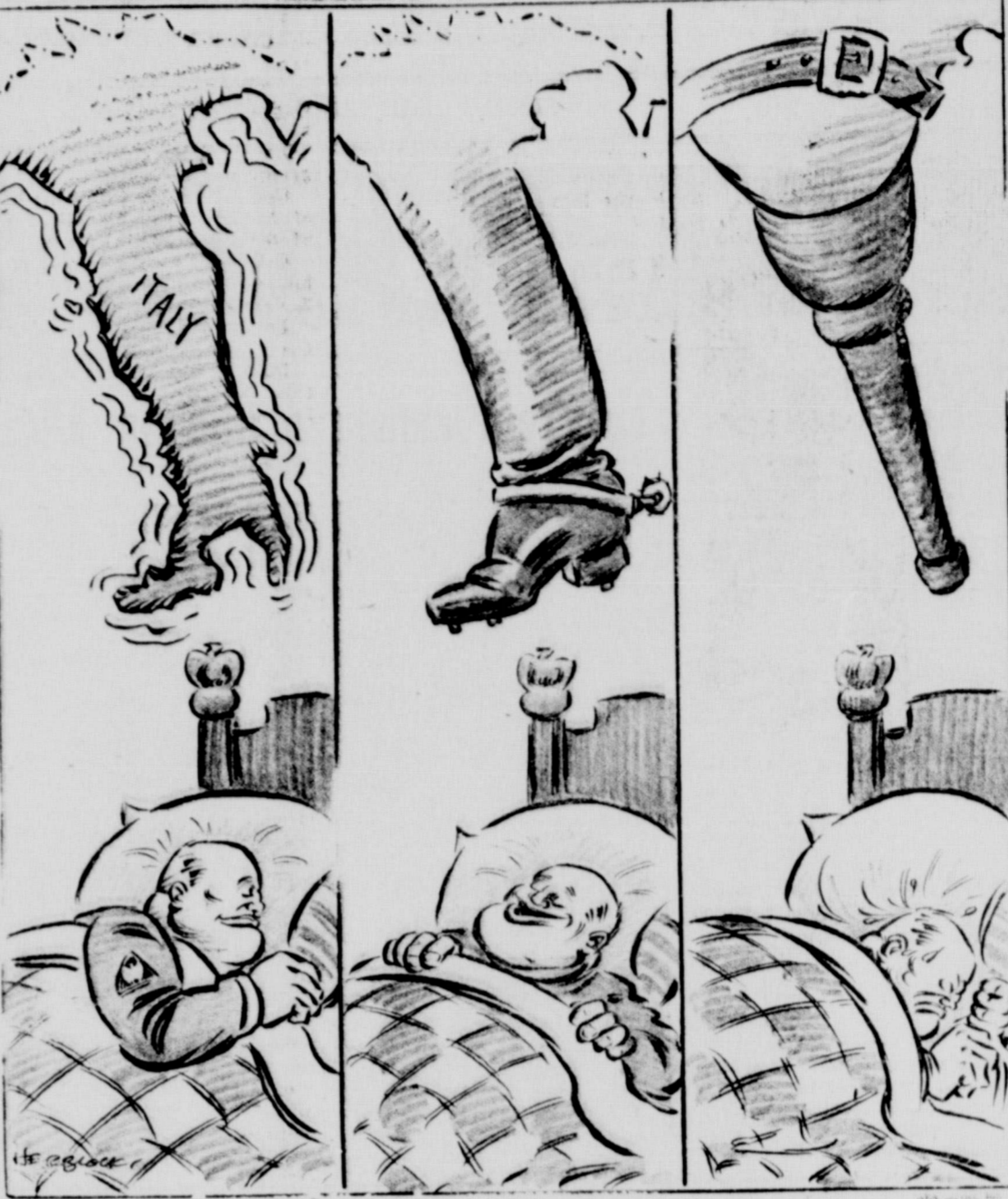

It is only a question of whether they are willing to strike out boldly and exercise that leadership, or sit idly by while it crumbles away from them, to fall into the hands of those who will grasp it by pressure and violence, for political ends.

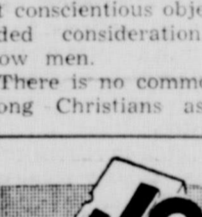

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### Wage-Hour Law Will Stand Unchanged

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Disgusted over a week-long parliamentary fiasco, house members said Saturday that their failure to agree on wage-hour amendments meant that the labor standards act would stand unchanged through the election-year campaign.

Chairman Norton of New Jersey of the house labor committee was one of the first to say that the question of revision was "out the window" for the session since the house, after slipping into an almost hopeless situation ordered the committee Friday to study amendments further.

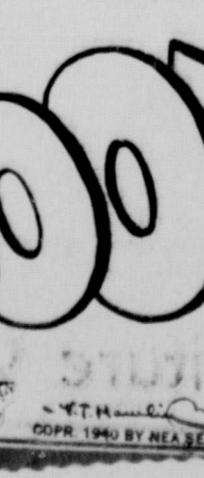
With some members confused by a series of rapid-fire votes, the chamber finally balloted 205 to 175 to pass no amendments at this time.

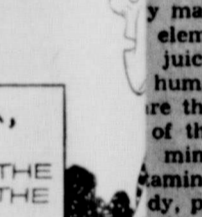

CISCO, May 4—One of the spirited Trojan horses operating in the United States will appear before the Dies committee when Joseph E. McWilliams is chief of the mobilizers, which, if not a Trojan horse, is at least a trial heat by run-

Denies He Plans Trojan Horseplay Like the Christian front, the mobilizers have actively sought members among the New York police department, but McWilliams denies that he plans any Trojan horseplay or fifth columning. "The real 'fifth column,'" he says, "is trying to get us into a war that does not concern our national interests."

### Editor May Receive Sentence

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Editor Clarence Hathaway of the Communist Daily Worker, convicted of criminal libel, may receive a year in prison when he comes up for sentencing May 17.

A special panel jury returned the verdict Friday night convicting on the same charge the Communist Publishing Company, publisher of the Daily Worker. The jury acquitted Hyman Golodny, former business manager of the paper.

Conviction of the 46-year-old Hathaway was based on a representative Wadsworth of New York successfully sponsored a motion to send the entire subject back to the labor committee.
