2.2 INCHES OF RAIN HERE LAST NIGHT

Water Supplies Are Replenished By Heavy Downpours

According to reports from lake officials, Lake Cisco had risen 18 inches by noon and stood at 67 1-2 feet by gauge. It was reported still rising.

Two and two-tenths inches of rain fell in Cisco last night as downpours north and northwest drenched thirsty lands and filled lakes and tanks with welcome supplies of stock and municipal water. Precipitation was reported particularly heavy on the Lake Cisco watershed, while Albany and other towns in that direction had their reservoirs well replenished.

South of Cisco the sandy land areas were in less need of moisture than the tighter land districts north and west, but there also the fall was reported heavy. Crops, particularly row crops and pasture lands, were in excellent condition.

NAZI GENERAL HINTS DRIVE IS SLOWED UP

German Advance Guard Is Routed From Abbeville

(By Associated Press)
A wave of optimism swept over France today, the thirteenth day of the war in the west, as French shock troops were reported to have recaptured shell-torn Arras and routed the Nazi advance guards from Abbeville, 12 miles from the English channel.

In the first official German hint that the blitzkrieg might be slowed, Gen. Walter von Reichenau, German field commander, said today:

"Maybe our present movements have come to a temporary halt. Weygand has ordered every man to stand his ground. That may mean hard fighting ahead."

The main German army in northern France is braced for a hard counter attack by the Allies under Generalissimo Maxime Weygand.

Great Britain, acting swiftly in her hour of peril from threatened Nazi invasion, rushed the "dictatorship" bill through parliament to mobilize her manpower and money against German jeopardy.

SIX-INCH RAIN AT HAMBY

ABILENE, May 22 (Sp)—Torrential rains fell in the Hamby community, six miles northeast of here, and near Albany last night, while much of the area received only light showers.

The downpour at Hamby, which was accompanied by considerable hail and wind, was reported by residents to total approximately six inches.

U. S. Highway 80-A was under water in several places, halting all traffic for an hour or more. The overflow water was coming from flooded fields.

Deadman creek, which 80-A crosses at the G. B. Lynch store, was running bank full about 10 last night and the water was still pouring in.

Residents of the Hamby community reported extensive hail damage to crops, buildings and automobiles. The Jack Canon and Lennox Gist barns were reported blown down and Gist lost 50 chickens.

About 5 o'clock
The cloud struck in the Hamby area about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, coming from the northwest. The second rain came from the southeast.

A 4.25-inch downpour was reached on the Caldwell ranch northeast of Albany, sending creeks on a rampage.

Missing WTU Employee Found At McAllen, Texas

Wandering about in a dazed condition, Charlie Walton, employee of the West Texas utilities company here, who had been missing since Monday afternoon, was found on the streets of McAllen, Texas, about 9 o'clock last night.

McAllen officers noting his condition questioned him and found that he could neither tell them how long he had been in McAllen, how he got there or where he was from, the McAllen police chief told H. H. Monk, district superintendent of the WTU, last night in a telephone conversation. He did know that he was employed by a utilities company and he recalled the name "Monk."

Mr. Walton suffered a fall in the office Monday afternoon, but it was not believed that a bump he received on the head caused any serious injury. At McAllen, however, officers said he complained constantly of a headache, and it was considered probable that the blow had been more serious than first believed. E. L. Jackson and B. B. Hurst left early today for McAllen and expected to return with Mr. Walton Friday.

WTU officials believed that with rest and hospitalization he would be all right.

After the fall in the local office Monday, Mr. Walton appeared all right. He left the office shortly before 5 o'clock and when he did not show up at his home that evening an investigation was started. It revealed that he had left on the Texas and Pacific Sunshine, taking his meter testing equipment with him and buying a ticket to Ranger. From Ranger he rode to Fort Worth, paying the conductor cash. How he travelled to McAllen, none knows. The distance from Cisco is about 600 miles, a good 24-hour journey.

BRITISH HOLD FIRMLY TO CHANNEL

(Editor's Note: Drew Middleton, Associated Press war correspondent, returned to London yesterday from France and Belgium, where he had been accompanying the British expeditionary force since the German offensive started against the Netherlands, Belgium and France. In the following dispatch he tells of the situation as he left it, and how he escaped Nazi machine gun bullets which pierced two holes above his bed, and Nazi bombs which fell but 100 yards away.)

LONDON, May 22 (AP)—The British expeditionary force, in peril of being pinned against the English channel means to die where it stands rather than let the Germans occupy the coast where they could base an attack on the British isles.

I have traveled over 1,000 miles through the British positions in Belgium in the last ten days, and men I knew well are dead or horribly wounded.

But as I left France this morning (on orders from the BEF), their fellows gave but one impression.

They mean to fight.

Arras, the little city of culture where Robespierre was born and the scene of five battles, including Vimy ridge in the World war, "is dead and buried" as one British officer told me.

Situation Critical
Amiens, too—jammed with pathetic refugees from France, Belgium and Holland when I saw it Friday—has felt the awful weight of war. Its famous cathedral of Notre Dame has been shelled by the Germans, who are in possession as they were for four years during the World war.

When I left the continent, the German attacks, to my knowledge, had not been extended to the coast nor were the British and their allies in Belgium completely separated from French forces in France.

Now, however, the Germans appear to have reached Abbeville, on the Somme estuary, 12 miles inland from the channel's open waters, and whether they have cut off the two allied forces depends on the staying power of this western wedge.

It is apparent that the situation has become the most serious in the long history of British arms. The BEF, plus French and Belgian...

GERMAN THRUST REACHES REIMS

BERLIN, May 22 (AP)—The German thrust toward Paris has reached the region of Reims, it was said in official German circles today.

Reims is 80 miles east and slightly north of Paris. Occupation of this region would mark a new bottom of the "pocket" formed by the advancing German armies in the French lines. It would be an advance of 25 miles southwest of Reims or 30 miles southeast of Laon, the previous far points of the German drive in that sector.

Civilians began pouring out of Paris Tuesday night as Nazi blitzkriegers drew within sight of the Eiffel tower and within 12 miles of the English channel.

England, fearful of Nazi attack in force, beat off German coastal feints from the air.

British troops, trapped in Belgium by the German drive into France, swore to die in their tracks rather than let the Nazis establish channel bases for an invasion of Great Britain.

The French announced officially that Amiens and Arras were taken and when the news became generally known that the Germans had penetrated to Abbeville, 12 miles from the channel, lines of automobiles containing civilians moved out of the south and west gates of Paris.

Britain's air scare came from a series of forays by German planes. One dropped bombs that missed shipping anchored off the south-east coast. Twice previously there was anti-aircraft fire in the coastal regions and fighters went up to drive off raiders. An air alarm was given on the Kentish coast and persons on the waterfront dashed for cover.

No Bombs On Land
No bombs were dropped on land. Amid the growing alarm that the war would spread still further, Dictator George Metaxas of Greece talked with his council of generals and then went to see King George II.

The Balkans, hearing reports filtering across the suddenly-closed Yugoslav-Albanian frontier that Italy was rushing munitions to Albania, wondered if Italy was setting herself to strike into their territory, or else was locking her...

ported a half inch rain last night and the downtown rain was believed about the same.

There was a heavy rain in the Davis mountains yesterday, according to word received here last night by C. M. Caldwell.

While there was a downpour northeast of Albany, that town received only .91 inch of moisture. Points west of here reported lightning and wind, but no rain.

Shortly before midnight there was a heavy downpour south of town at Mrs. Rupert Harkrider's farm, motorists reported. Some cars were unable to drive through the heavy rain.

Preceded by light showers in the afternoon which brought .20 inch of rainfall, one of the heaviest downpours in more than a year fell in Haskell last night. By 9 o'clock the downpour was estimated at 1.25 inches and it continued to rain. Light hail was reported in the east and southeast sections of Haskell county, but there was no crop damage.

Hamlin reported a two-inch downpour, which was heaviest of the spring. The city lake was catching water last night and it was believed the new lake there would catch its first supply. There was a good rain around Neinda.

V. F. W. Post Will Conduct Poppy Sale

Wreaths of V. F. W. Buddy Poppies will be placed on all veterans' graves and strewn on the waters of the seven seas as America's annual tribute to the memory of its war dead on Memorial Day, May 30.

On Saturday, May 25, members of Cisco V. F. W. Post No. 3359 will conduct their annual sale of Buddy Poppies which gives the general public an opportunity to support a veteran welfare program inspired by a desire to honor the dead by helping the living.

Proceeds of the annual Buddy Poppy sale are kept apart from all other funds and are used exclusively for relief work, local, state and national.

The little red blossoms, emblematic of those that bloom in Flander's Field, are assembled by disabled veterans in government hospitals, for several months previous to Memorial Day.

The task of making these poppies is a congenial one. It offers the soldiers handicapped by illness or wounds an opportunity to earn during his convalescence. In addition, hospital authorities testify to the therapeutic value of this work in keeping the minds of the patients busily occupied, thus bringing relief to nerves drawn taut by shell shock and wounds that refuse to heal.

The poppy relief fund, realized through the sale of these flowers, gives the local post money with which to carry on its welfare work among comrades and their dependents in distress. It permits a system of Veterans' Administration liaison service on behalf of the veteran seeking hospitalization or compensation.
