The Germans during the day drove to the Swiss border, reported some 1,000,000 Frenchmen trapped in the St. Mihiel area alone and stormed without pause through the Maginot lines.

Metz, which Germany surrendered to France after the World war and which subsequently became one of the key fortresses of the Maginot fortifications, fell.




