That is the fact that when the showdown came and war was actually declared, the overwhelming majority of Americans of German descent flocked into the ranks with all other Americans and served this country well and faithfully.

So today the action of the Sons of Italy in Ohio is a beacon light of loyalty. Through Raymond A. Boccia, grand venerable, a letter has been issued saying that the members of that order are "stunned" by Italy's declaration of war, but that "we as Americans stand ready shoulder to shoulder with other

Americans in assuming the responsibility of upholding and safeguarding our form of government."

For American citizens who take this attitude, no matter what the country of their origin, other Americans should have respect and brotherly hand of welcome in every activity of our great American society. For it is of such loyalty from all conditions and groups of men that America is made. It is from such loyalty that she draws her magnificent strength.

Those who allow sentimental regard for or political attachment to another land or another kind of society, and who allow that interest to overrule the loyalty they owe to this country are the real "Fifth Column." It is they who are to be watched with care, never trusted in positions of responsibility, and always rendered powerless by vigilance.

But citizens of foreign descent who are loyal, who will support and defend the constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and "bear true faith and allegiance to the same"—these are one of the chief glories of our common country.

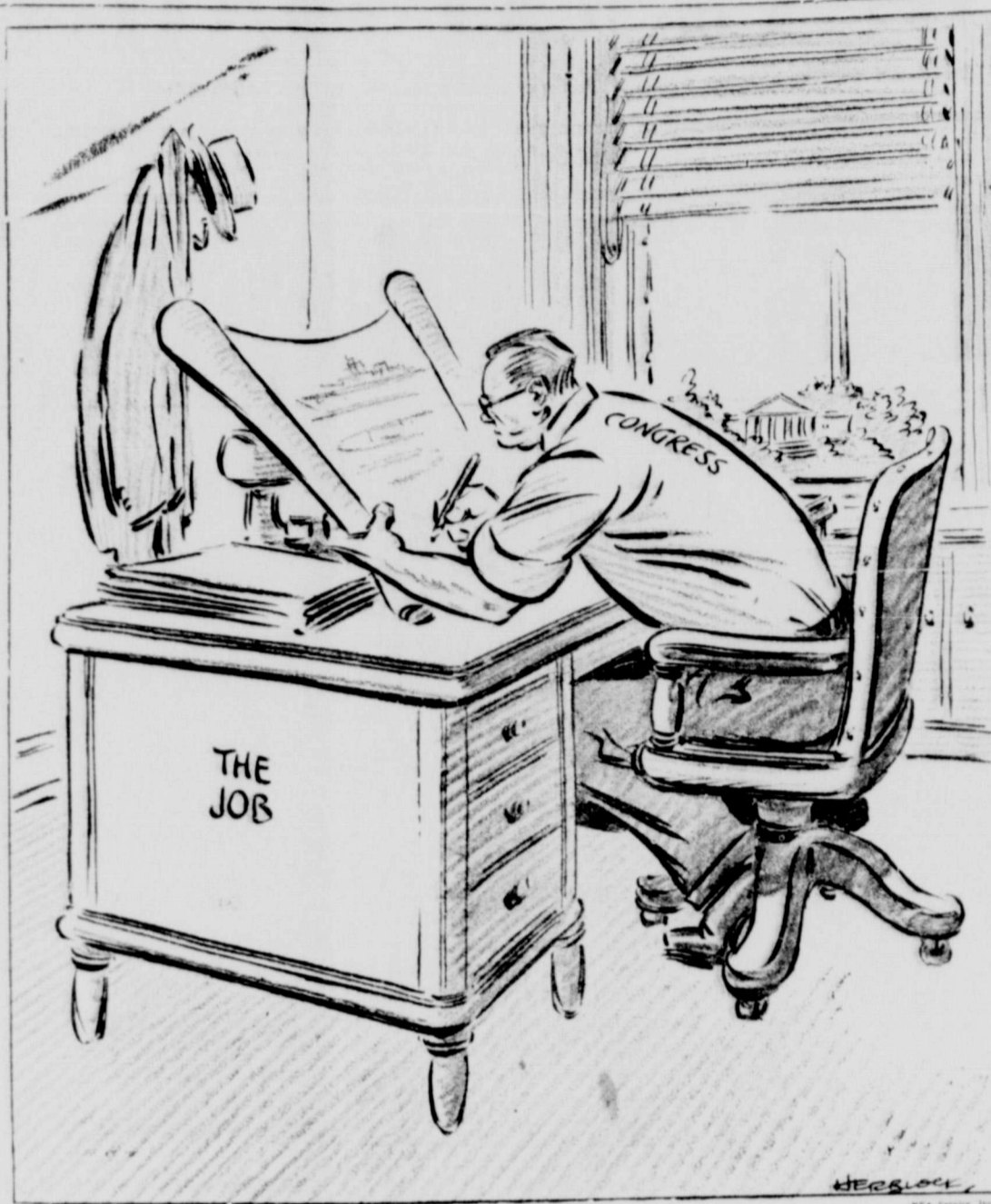

BRUCE CATTON'S AMERICAN ROUNDUP

PRESENT PLANS CALL FOR STANDING ARMY OF 13 DIVISIONS; SMALL, BUT GOOD

WASHINGTON—Expected Senate approval of the House plan to boost the army to 375,000 men would soon give the United States a modern, up-to-date striking force of nine infantry divisions, two mechanized divisions, two cavalry divisions, and a number of enough supplemental troops to form the whole into two complete army corps ready for immediate action.

This new enlargement of the army, which goes beyond increases previously voted, would give the nation a mobile field army within its continental borders of close to 135,000 men.

HORSE CAVALRY STILL KEPT

UNCLE SAM'S field army today has five infantry divisions, plus a skeletonized sixth division; the new plan would fill in all the gaps and add three brand new divisions. Peacetime strength of these "streamlined" divisions is 2500 men, organized into three infantry regiments, two artillery regiments, and various signal, quartermaster, engineer, and headquarters units.

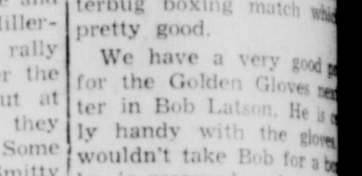
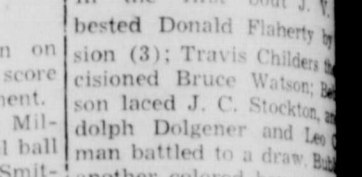


Conoco Downs Miller-Penney Boys 13-5

non fodder. Only trained men have confidence in themselves. And only in trained men, properly equipped, can this country place confidence. It isn't a question of whether or not we shall be attacked. It is a question of whether or not we can afford to place ourselves in an exposed position at such a time as this.

Congress and the president should act immediately to impose a selective draft for military training upon all the manpower in the country. These men, picked under a system which will impose a minimum of hardship upon the people, should be given thorough training in the various branches of the defense forces, supplied with the equipment needed and retired at the end of training periods to reserves which may be called instantly in event of emergency.

There is a great psychological value in this procedure, aside from the military aspect. In the knowledge that this nation has several millions of trained men ready for instant service its people can take confidence and its enemies within and without can take fear. American manhood trained and ready for war is a guarantee that all the equipment in the world could not provide. We must have not only guns, tanks, ships and planes. We must have trained men.

Let congress and the president, if they are to act efficiently and patriotically in this hour, courageously cast aside all political considerations and provide for the selective draft of the national manhood for training in warfare. Such a program is vital to defense.

said, precipitating the government change in France. The French said late Monday night there still was no reply from their peace offer made by aged Marshal Henri Philippe Petain, World War hero who succeeded Paul Reynaud to the premiership. The French, forced to bow to overwhelming enemy arms, awaited the verdict calmly hoping for the best but fearful of the worst.

Churchill Defiant
Across the English channel Prime Minister Churchill defiantly laid down the challenge that Britain "shall fight on unconquerable until the curse of Hitler is lifted from the brow of mankind." "What has happened in France make no difference to British faith and purpose," Churchill shouted to the axis partners. "Britain has become the sole champions now in arms to defend the world cause. We shall do our best to be worthy of this high honor; we are sure that in the end all will come right."

With the hard-pressed French army shattered, the famed Maginot line collapsing and Paris and most of her rich industrial region in German hands, France appealed to Hitler for peace. "With a broken heart," Petain, who immortalized the words "they shall not pass" at Verdun in the World War, sadly told his people that France had been forced to her knees before an enemy "superior in numbers and arms."

A major question left unanswered is the disposal of the French assumed command of Allied land forces and the British took over combined Allied naval operations. **Added Power**
With the French fleet, the Germans and Italians would have added sea power against Britain; without it the British would have an overwhelming sea edge. Even as their venerable French leader appealed for peace, the broken French armies fought bravely with what they had left. The Germans during the day drove to the Swiss border, reported some 1,000,000 Frenchmen trapped in the St. Mihiel area alone and stormed without pause through the Maginot lines. Metz, which Germany surrendered to France after the World War and which subsequently became one of the key fortresses of the Maginot fortifications, fell.

The possible terms Hitler and Mussolini would lay down for France and the effect of a separate peace on axis policy was advised that Britain would take over French armament orders in this country. Behind these developments ran an undertone of worry in official circles over the possibility that Germany might seize the French fleet. Dispatches from France indicated that nation considered it probable that surrender of its fleet would be one of the conditions imposed by Germany. Officials here, mulling over the question thought it at least possible that Great Britain might "seize" France's navy before Germany could take it over. This idea seemed to have some support in the terms under which the Allies started the war—France to control the land forces, England the sea power. Should Germany get the French navy, the combined German-Italian-French fleet would outnumber the British fleet in all categories other than cruisers and aircraft carriers, and would have a similar superiority over the United States fleet.
