LONG, HARD WAR FORECAST BY CHURCHILL

MODERNIZATION M'ELREATH DELAYED

Not Be Done Until Tomorrow, Tubing Yet Off Bottom

Work in getting tubing in the McElreath wildcat of town may cause postponement of scheduled acidification of the well until tomorrow, operators said this afternoon. Difficulty was encountered in cleaning out and afternoon tubing was still in place at bottom.

It was possible, however, that work would be completed late today and there was a possibility that the acid would be before night. However, this was considered unlikely.

Well, one of the most prominent developments in this territory in several years because of extent of new territory available, is located in a 3,000-acre block more than four miles south of Cisco. A three-foot diameter well has been drilled, and has responded well to tests of permeability and saturation. There are 25 barrels per day of oil and operators declare in proportion to other wells similar characteristics it will be for 300 or more barrels.

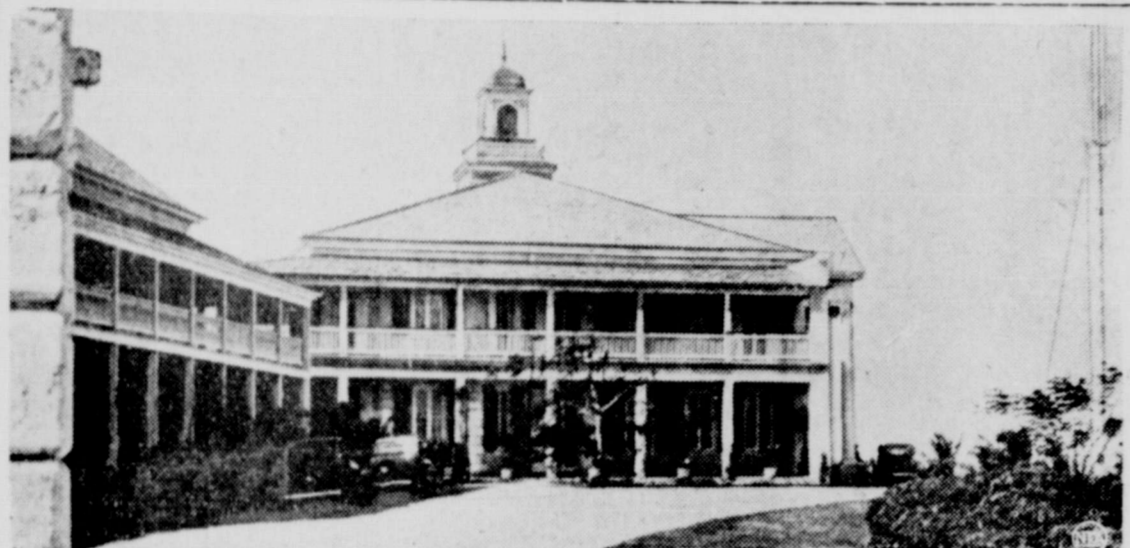

PEACE FOR CHINA, JAPAN BRITISH AIM

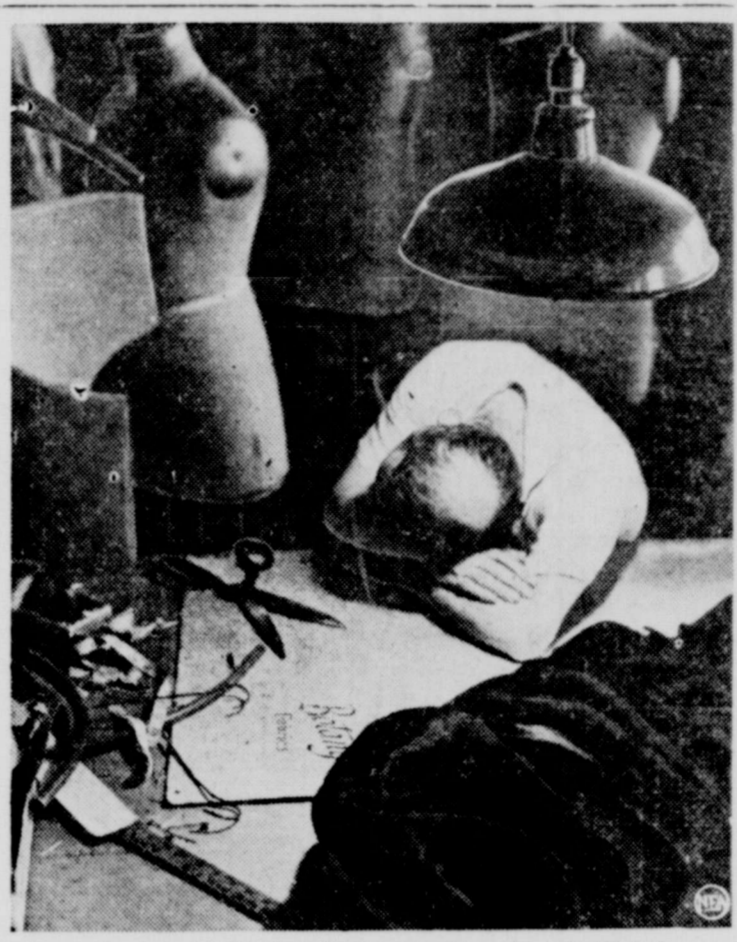

Ko-Ko and Oui-Oui

"My good sir, the awkwardness of your position is grace itself compared with that of a man engaged in the act of cutting off his own head."

So spoke Ko-Ko, lord high executioner of Titipu, in Gilbert and Sullivan's perennial "Mikado."

And so the French government might speak today as it engages in the last melancholy formalities of destroying itself and assuming the shape of whatever weird changeling the conqueror dictates. It is hard to watch these grotesque gyrations at Vichy and to see in them the slightest relationship to Frenchmen as they have for many decades stood proudly before the whole world as men free and unafraid.

If there is, then, a certain lack of grace in the bringing forth of this changeling state at Vichy, no wonder. The pressure under which the bleeding stump of France is acting is hinted by the German news dis-

patch which pointedly says: "If the decision of the necessary numbers of members... is lacking, a legal solution already has been provided to make delay impossible." That, translated, means simply, "Sign, boys — or else!"

Stunned by defeat, numbered by humiliation, the French nation is not functioning in this act. The people who fiercely dedicated themselves only 70 years ago to "Liberty, Equality, and Fraternity" can scarcely be dedicating themselves with equal consciousness to the principles of Mussolini and Franco.

THE Third Republic died when Paris fell. France, the world's very symbol of freedom and tolerance and individualism, is nothing now but a province, the same to Hitler as once it was to Caesar.

Nothing ever returns to its exact status. It would be absurd to predict the restoration of the Third Republic, or even to predict the eventual setting up of a Fourth Republic which would worthily succeed it.

But the last word in the story of France is not being spoken at Vichy. Neither the people who allowed the Third Republic to decay, nor the people who are erecting this wretched German appendage on its corpse, are really France. The France of Liberty, Equality, and Fraternity will find a way, some day, to live again.

Britain, there will be no placid lying down of the people in submission before him as we have seen, alas, in other countries," the Prime Minister said. "We shall defend every village, every town, and every city. The vast mass of London itself, street by street, could easily devour an entire hostile army."

Britain Waits
Churchill, speaking in this

strong city of refuge, said the British waited undismayed for the German invasion.

"Perhaps it will come tonight; perhaps it will come next week; perhaps it will never come," he said. "We must show ourselves equally capable of meeting a sudden violent shock or, what is perhaps a harder task, of a prolonged vigil."

He recalled that he was speaking on France's Bastille day and that a year ago he watched the stately parade down the Champs Elysees of the French army and

the French empire, and asked: "Who could foresee what the course of a year would bring?"

Recalling, too, that the British navy, in addition to blockading what is left of the German fleet and chasing the Italian fleet, had been put to the necessity of disposing of the French navy's capital ships, Churchill said: "We had no choice but to act as we did and to act forthwith."

U. S. SOLDIERS' GRAVES IN CAPTURED AREA

GRAVES of some 30,000 American soldiers are now in Hitler-occupied territory, and the American Battle Monuments Commission here so far has been able to get little news from its officials in Europe.

These graves are in the American cemeteries in France—at Romagne, Thiaucourt, Fere-en-Tardenois, Belleu, Eony and Surresnes—and at Wavresghien, Belgium. All of the cemeteries had been completed before the present war began, and a staff of 30-odd persons was maintained to keep them in order. Direction of this staff has been in the hands of Capt. Charles G. Hollie, U. S. A., in charge of the commission's Paris office. Captain Hollie is now at Bordeaux, striving to regain contact with the different caretakers.

In addition to the cemeteries, the commission has charge of 10 memorials to American troops in Europe. One is in Gibraltar; the rest are in occupied portions of France and Belgium.

WILLKIE FACES TEST ON FOREIGN POLICY

WENDELL WILLKIE'S first big test is likely to come in the tug-of-war which is now being waged by rival groups in the Republican party over the important matter of foreign policy.

His nomination was taken as a victory for the so-called interventionist crowd. The isolationists, however, have not given up hope; currently, both groups are confidently saying that "he's really one of us" and will so declare himself shortly.

Unless he works out some formula that can make both sides happy, he's going to have to disappoint somebody before long—and the disappointment is likely to echo loudly in the campaign.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING TAXES FOR THE USE AND SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF CISCO FOR THE YEAR 1940, PROVIDING FOR THE INTEREST AND SINKING FUND FOR THE YEAR 1940, APPROPRIATING SUCH LEVY, AND PROVIDING FOR TAX DISCOUNTS.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO:
SECTION 1. That there is hereby levied for 1940, and shall be collected for the use and support of the municipal government of the City of Cisco, Texas, and to provide a fund for the refunding bonds issued by the City of Cisco, November 1, 1934, a tax upon all property within the corporate limits of said city, subject to taxation, be it real property, personal property, or mixed property, said tax in the amount of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) upon each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property, to be apportioned as follows:
(a) For the maintenance and support of the municipal government (General Fund) one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property.
(b) For the interest and sinking fund and creation of a sinking fund to retire the principal on the refunding bonds issued by the City of Cisco, November 1, 1934, one dollar (\$1.00) on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property.
SECTION 2. That, for the year 1940, the following system of tax discounts shall be in force: If a taxpayer pays all of the ad valorem taxes assessed against his property for the year 1940, during the month of October, 1940, a discount of 3 per cent shall be allowed; if all taxes are paid during November, 1940, a discount of 2 per cent shall be allowed; and if all taxes are paid during December, 1940, a discount of 1 per cent shall be allowed. All taxpayers who pay only one-half of their ad valorem taxes for the year 1940 before November 30, 1940 shall receive a discount on the balance of such taxes of 3 per cent if paid during the month of March, 1941, a discount of 2 per cent if paid during April, 1941, and a discount of 1 per cent if paid during May, 1941.
SECTION 3. That all funds received by the City of Cisco that have not been appropriated shall be applied to the General Fund.
SECTION 4. That Section 27 of the Rules and Regulations Governing the City Council, providing that an ordinance be read three separate meetings before passage, be hereby suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present, as provided by Section 33 of said rules, and that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the publication hereof.

"Me left in the desert, didn't me!" she smiled back, waving goodby.

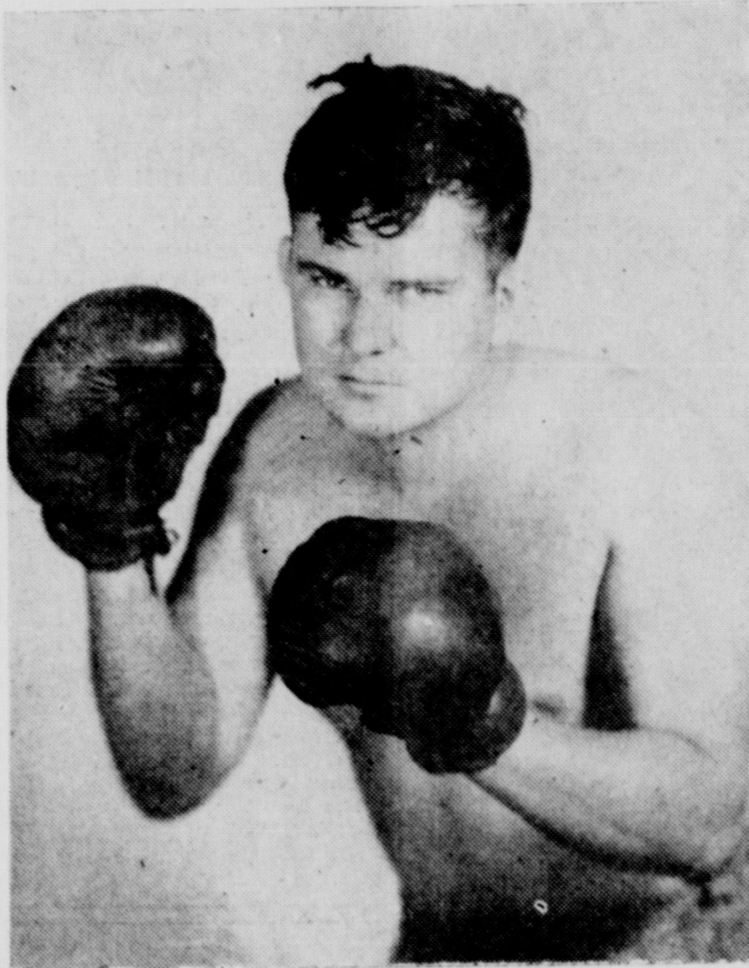
