1,500 Find CMTC Going Bit "Tough" But They Like It

CAMP BULLIS, July 17.—America won't be trampled underfoot by any blitzkreing foreign power if any of the more than 1,500 youths and middle-aged men attending the Citizens Military Training camp here have anything to say about it. Although they say the going is a bit "tough"—the men and youths—many of whom have never had any military training before—are not complaining. Included in the camp are 105 business and professional men who are here at their own expense and have come from as far away as Phoenix Ariz. and Oklahoma City.

From the time the trainees are awakened by a bugle at 5:45 a. m. until taps at 10 p. m. they face a full day of drill, exercise, planned sports, and lectures on army organizations and functions. After arising, the men wash and are served breakfast 6:15 a. m. Between the time they complete breakfast and 7:30 a. m. the enrollee must make his own bed, shine his shoes and equipment, "police" a tent area and prepare for their morning drill program.

Morning Schedule Actual morning schedule starts off with a half-hour period of calisthenics. Following this is drill which includes regular drill maneuvers and class work. Class work is made up of lectures on citizenship, organization of the army and instructions in operating the rifle, pistol machinegun and other weapons.

At 9:30 comes a half hour refreshment period at which time the men are given lemonade or chocolate milk and cookies. Drilling and classes continue until noon and mess is served at 12:15 noon and typical menu includes roast beef or steak, corn on the cob, tomatoes, green beans, ice tea or lemonade, ice cream, cake and hot rolls.

COFC REVIEWS COLLEGE AND OTHER WORK

Erection of a sign giving pertinent information about Cisco for quick reading as motorists enter or leave Cisco was ordered by the chamber of commerce board of directors last night. A special committee was instructed to go ahead with the project. Reports on various activities of the chamber were heard, including a summary of the campaign for raising a fund with which to buy library and laboratory equipment for the junior college. This campaign, interrupted by Fourth of July activities and other events, will be completed by the end of next week. With large numbers of prospective donors yet to be seen, it was predicted that the drive would go well above the \$4,000 asked. Committee members will meet at a breakfast next Tuesday morning to begin the round-up phase.

Supt. R. N. Cluck, returning from a visit with accrediting authorities, told the board he had received great encouragement and that he was enthusiastic over the prospects. A campaign is now under way for students, he said. The board approved plans made for a survey of sheep and goat population in this area with a view of locating a wool and mohair buying depot and storage warehouse here. Such a plant will be installed and maintained in charge of a competent grader if sufficient support for the project is realized, it was explained.

The park will be open tonight and each following Wednesday night from 8 until 10 p. m. A particularly interesting musical program which will start promptly at 8 o'clock is planned for the first part of the program. 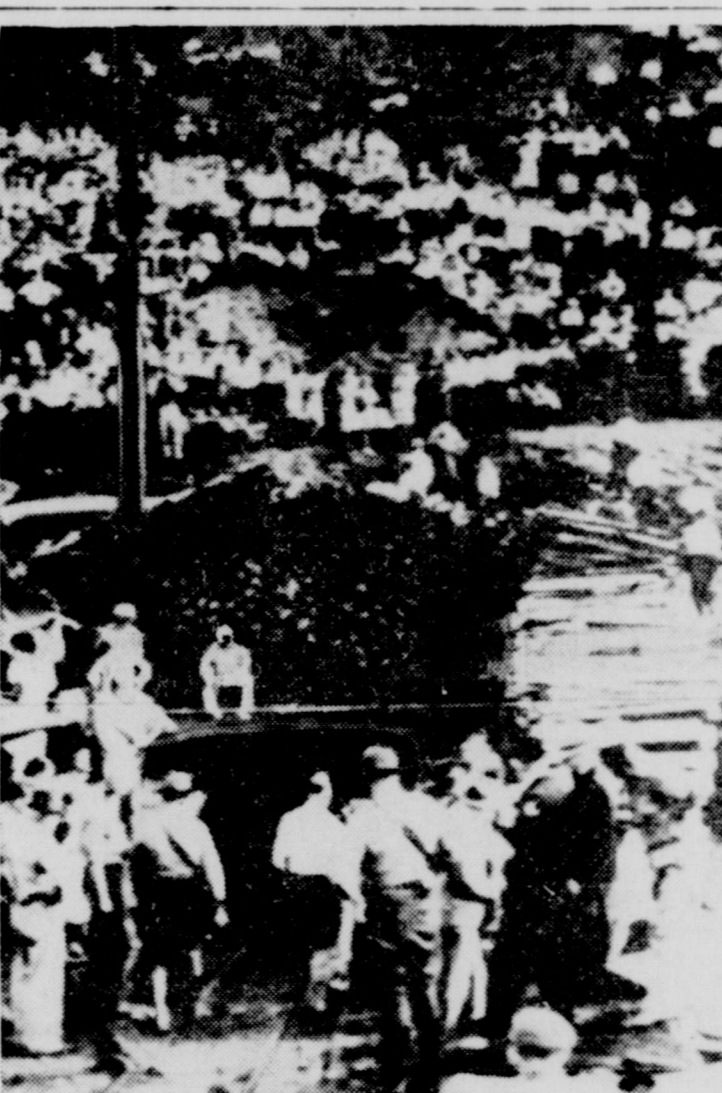
WTU Superintendent on Dallas Program

Forecast Axis Peace Ultimatum

Diplomatic quarters in Rome heard last night that Adolf Hitler was prepared to make a last three-point peace offer to Britain before launching a full-scale blitzkrieg against the island kingdom soon. Two other reports, one from a French newspaper, and the other from the Rome radio and picked up in turn by the British broadcasting company and NBC, predicted an attack on England by Friday. Nationalist Spain suddenly broke diplomatic relations with Chile, which will send delegates to the Havana Pan-American conference Sunday along with other nations in this hemisphere. Spain's move was explained only by a foreign ministry statement which said the action was taken because of the Chilean government's tolerance of an anti-nationalist campaign. Chile's popular front regime presently is engaged in a drive on rightist elements deemed dangerous to the state's safety. Nationalist Spain under Gen. Francisco Franco terms herself in the ranks of rightist countries.

PRODUCTION OF McELREATH IS GAUGED

Production of the McElreath wildcat south of Cisco was being gauged today. The rate of flow was said to be better than 10 barrels per hour and a daily production of more than 150 was forecast for the Caddo well which opens up a large new area south of Cisco to development. Operators from all over the state and in Oklahoma were watching the well with keen interest. Located on what geologists have said is the biggest Caddo structure in the state, the well has indicated excellent possibilities for production in other horizons. A territory several miles in extent is affected. Bases Set The United States was reported sounding out Chile and other nations on their attitude toward the establishment of a protectorate over European possessions in this hemisphere. Informed Berlin sources declared nazi jump-off bases for the invasion of England were all set, and that Adolf Hitler's decision was expected soon. But there were some indications that eleventh-hour proposals to England might be made despite Prime Minister Churchill's vigorous declaration Sunday night that Britain would fight to the end. It was said Count Galeazzo Ciani, Italian foreign minister, may go to Berlin late this week to discuss a three-point price the axis powers are said to demand of England. In Tokyo, the government of Premier Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai resigned, apparently under pressure of an army clique which de-

DELEGATES NOT DETERRED BY STATEMENT

Barkley Tells Convention President Has No Desire to Run

CHICAGO, Ill., July 17. (AP)—Undeterred by President Roosevelt's first and long-awaited assertion on the third term — a statement that he had no "desire or purpose" to run again — the Democratic national convention loudly demanded Tuesday night that the chief executive be drafted for another term. The president's statement, read to the convention by Senator Alben W. Barkley, served only to send the delegates into a prolonged and noisy demonstration which had all but a few state standards parading the aisles, and the big crowd shouting over and over what had become its theme: "We want Roosevelt!" Pro-Roosevelt leaders went steadily ahead meanwhile with their plans to accomplish the chief executive's renomination, feeling certain that, particularly after Tuesday night's big demonstration, he would comply with the convention's demand. "The president," Barkley read to a suddenly hushed convention, "has never had, and has not today, any desire or purpose to continue in the office of president, to be a candidate for that office, or to be nominated by the convention, for that office. "He wishes in all earnestness and sincerity to make it clear that all of the delegates to this convention are free to vote for any candidate. Leaders of the draft-Roosevelt movement promptly interpreted the message as placing no obstacles in their path. They made that clear in statement after statement, promptly issued. Harry Hopkins, secretary of commerce, and Roosevelt liaison man here, predicted that Mr. Roosevelt would be nominated by acclamation Wednesday night, and Senator James F. Byrnes, of South Carolina, the third-term floor leader, said that in his opinion nothing could delay the nomination beyond that point. (The convention program had not called for presidential balloting before Thursday.) Hopkins said he felt sure that "the situation that has developed in the last year and particularly our domestic problems that are related to that" would be "compelling reasons" why Mr. Roosevelt would accept renomination. "Roosevelt is wanted not only by these delegates but what is far more important by the great masses of American people," Hopkins said. While the leaders issued their statements, the vast throng kept up an unceasing din. The great stadium organ, which inaugurated the 1932 Roosevelt theme song "Happy Days Are Here Again," thundered that lively tune, over and over again. And from the microphones scattered about the floor, voice after voice proclaimed that state after state "wants Roosevelt." The confusion once reached a semblance of organization, with Senators Claude Pepper of Florida and Josh Lee of Oklahoma leading the crowd in thunderous cries of "We want Roosevelt!" over and over.

But there were some dissents. Representative Elmer J. Ryan, a Minnesota delegate, issued a statement that the convention was "being run by a group of White Houses manipulators." Wheeler to Stay The Corcoran-Cohen-Hopkins group has induced a tired President to accede to a third term draft," he said. "By White House influence, this small clique has so far been able to kill off the candidates of other capable democrats." Senator D. Worth Clark of Idaho, said that Senator Burton K.

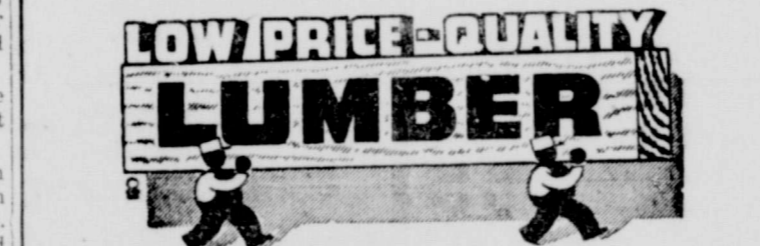
