## Seniors squeal at graduation

*"This little piggy had Crisco,  
This little piggy had none;  
This little piggy had graduation,  
This little piggy stayed home;  
And this little piggy cried  
wee, wee, wee, all the way home!"*

63 Dimmitt High School seniors graduated Monday night, but the ceremonies were in doubt until Monday afternoon after a practical joke late Sunday evening.

A group of about 20 DHS seniors unleashed two greased pigs in the halls of the high school Sunday night, along with a few rolls of toilet tissue strewn down the halls.

The pigs were reportedly put into the building only to roam the halls and to surprise school officials Monday morning.

One senior injured a finger while opening a can of Crisco used to grease the pigs, and was treated at Plains Memorial Hospital and released.

The seniors entered the building with use of a key.

Later Sunday night the seniors had second thoughts about the greased pigs and decided to get them out of the building. They were unable to get back into the building, and called school officials and police.

When officials got into the building, they discovered that books and papers had been emptied from several lockers and strewn throughout the hallways, reportedly by a group of students not connected with the greased pig incident.

The seniors who called school officials then called on their

friends to go back to DHS at about 2 a.m. Monday to help clean up the Crisco/paper mess.

School officials then discovered the pigs had gotten into the auditorium and soiled several of the curtains on stage.

After debating about punishment (and while rumors were flying that graduation would be called off, the students connected wouldn't receive diplomas, and that students who were in the National Honor Society and connected with the incident would be expelled from the NHS), school officials met with those who were known to be connected with the two incidents Monday afternoon.

The students were ordered to pay \$25 each to assist with the expensive cleaning of the curtains.

## City gets FAA grant

A \$305,943 grant has been given the City of Dimmitt by the Federal Aviation Administration for improvements at the Dimmitt Municipal Airport.

The grant was announced last Friday by US Sen. Phil Gramm.

"Sen. Gramm's office called us, telling us we had received the grant," said City Manager Paul Catoe. "We don't know all of the particulars. We don't know what they're going to let us do, but we are just thrilled about this."

The grant had been applied for by the city after the Airport Board recommended several areas for expansion at the airport, including:

- widening the runway by 10 feet to 60 feet;

- extending the runway by 1,200 feet to 5,200 feet;
- extending parallel taxiway to full 5,200 feet of runway;
- constructing two paved east-west taxiways;
- building a second access road from US 385 to the hangar area;
- installing new runway lights;
- and, building a new \$50,000 hangar with a paved ramp.

According to the Airport Board, the Texas Aeronautics Commission will loan one-half of the cost of the new hangar and grant 75% of the cost of the ramp.

City officials said most of the construction will not begin until 1986. The city will have to match 10%, or almost \$31,000, of the FAA grant.

## County considers closing dump

County Commissioners will look at the possibility of closing a landfill near Nazareth after a couple residing a quarter-mile from the dump lodged a complaint with the commissioners court Tuesday.

Claude and Brenda Annen told the commissioners they "catch the breeze from the dump pretty often."

"There is a lot of smoke," Claude Annen said, "and people throw chemical cans and stuff out there . . . old tires, dead animals, it all gets pretty bad."

"We can't open our windows

or turn on the air conditioner," Brenda Annen said. "Our kids cough all the time and wake up every morning with runny noses . . . because of the kids, we can't open the windows, and just imagine how bad it is with that dead animal smell. We're not trying to cause trouble, but something needs to be done."

Pct. Four Commissioner Vincent Guggemos, who said "I don't know what to do, I didn't start it," said the county has been unsuccessful in previous attempts to police the landfill, said he tries to set up a favorable time when the wind is out of a direction that will not cause smoke to blow toward the Annen's house, "but a lot of people go out there and start fires anyway."

"When we burn it off, we douse everything with diesel, but usually there is a fire or at least smoldering, and we can't do anything but let it burn. I'm in favor of just doing away with the thing . . . they abandoned the dump they used to

have at Jumbo, and we probably need to do the same thing."

Guggemos said he thought it would take a year to go through the closing process, but a Texas Dept. of Health official in Canyon told the News Tuesday county officials just need to indicate they will close the dump.

"To open a new site takes about a year," said Bobby Edmiston, manager of Solid Waste Disposal with TDH. "You have to go through hearings, publication of notice and so forth. If they want to close the site, all they need to do is close it."

If the site is closed, the count-

## Smith gets payment on raw potato deal

Smith Potato, Inc., of Hart has received \$10,000 from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture's Produce Recovery Fund as settlement of a claim against the bankrupt Romney Produce Co. of El Paso.

Smith Potato filed one of three claims against Romney alleging failure to pay for over \$54,000 worth of produce.

Other firms involved in the settlement include Golden Valley Distributing of McAllen, who received \$9,612.52, and Stallings Farms of El Paso, who received \$5,387.48.

Each company receive a prorated share of the \$25,000 maximum that can be paid from PRF.

"The original deal was made in 1983," said David Smith. "We filed a claim with PRF. I'm happy—tickled pink—with it. Without PRF we couldn't have gotten a thing."

Smith refused to divulge how much was lost through the deal, "but at least we got a little something for it."

Money was not reimbursed to PRF by Romney and TDA was authorized to cancel Romney's commission merchant license.

PRF protects licensees who fail to receive payment for Texas-grown produce from other licensed commission merchants. Commission merchants licensed by TDA pay an annual fee into the fund and are authorized to handle produce on credit, check or consignment. The fund does not cover cash dealer licensees.

"TDA handles some 60 to 70 claims each year from the PRF," said TDA Assistant Commissioner for Regulatory Programs Ron White. "We urge all producers and other sellers to confirm that a merchant has a commission license before entering into any deferred payment arrangement including payment by check."

## Growers donate sugar to Africa

Area sugar beet growers are helping starving people in Africa with a donation of 100,000 pounds of sugar to the Red Cross to aid with a rehydration program and dry rations.

Holly sugar is donating a total of 250 tons to the Red Cross as part of a total gift of 350 tons from the American sugar industry.

Some of Holly's 300 growers in West Texas were on hand Friday as the sugar was

outloaded from the company's Hereford warehouse onto trucks. The sugar, already sacked, will be trucked to New Orleans, where it will be loaded June 3 to go to Monakchott, Mauritania.

"This program has been in the making for several months," said Cal Jones, agricultural manager of the Hereford plant. "Red Cross has assured us this sugar will reach Africa and be used for
