A \$305,943 grant has been given the City of Dimmitt by the Federal Aviation Administration for improvements at the Dimmitt Municipal Air-

The grant was announced last Friday by US Sen. Phil Gramm.

> **Growers donate** sugar to Africa Area sugar beet growers are

helping starving people in Africa with a donation of 100,000 pounds of sugar to the Red Cross to aid with a rehydration program and dry rations.

Holly sugar is donating a total of 250 tons to the Red Cross as part of a total gift of 350 tons from the American sugar industry.

Some of Holly's 300 growers in West Texas were on hand Friday as the sugar was

outloaded from the company's Hereford warehouse onto trucks. The sugar, already sacked, will be trucked to New Orleans, where it will be loaded June 3 to go to Monakchott, Mauritania.

"This program has been in the making for several months," said Cal Jones, agricultural manager of the Hereford plant. "Red Cross has assured us this sugar will reach Africa and be used for

Smith gets payment on raw potato deal

Smith Potato, Inc., of Hart has received \$10,000 from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture's Produce Recovery Fund as settlement of a claim against the bankrupt Romney Produce Co. of El Paso.

Smith Potato filed one of three claims against Romney alleging failure to pay for over \$54,000 worth of produce.

Other firms involved in the settlement include Golden Valley Distributing of McAllen, who received \$9,612.52, and Stallings Farms of El Paso, who received \$5,387.48.

Each company receive a prorated share of the \$25,000 maximum that can be paid from

"The original deal was made in 1983," said David Smith. "We filed a claim with PRF. I'm happy-tickled pink-with it. Without PRF we couldn't have gotten a thing."

Smith refused to divulge how much was lost through the deal, "but at least we got a little something for it.'

Money was not reimbursed to PRF by Romney and TDA was authorized to cancel Romney's commission merchant license.

PRF protects licensees who fail to receive payment for Texas-grown produce from other licensed commission merchants. Commission merchants licensed by TDA pay an annual fee into the fund and are authorized to handle produce on credit, check or consignment. The fund does not cover cash dealer licensees.

"TDA handles some 60 to 70 claims each year from the PRF," said TDA Assistant Commissioner for Regulatory Programs Ron White. "We urge all producers and other sellers to confirm that a merchant has a commission license before entering into any deferred payment arrangement including payment by check.'

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
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Summer basketball opens Tuesday

famine relief.

"It's a satisfying experience and thought that the Panhandle of Texas can actually help the starvation and famine in Africa through a joint contribution of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association and a fine organization like the Red Cross.'

"Most of us take sugar for granted as a good tasting part of a well-balanced diet," said Association President Bill Cleavinger. "However, it may come as a surprise to most Americans that sugar is extremely valuable in treatment of severe infantile diarrhea, a severe problem that kills an estimated 5 million children a year.'

The sugar will be used in three Red Cross programs to aid in oral rehydration therapy and as a source of essential calories in intensive feeding efforts and food staple programs.

Sugar is used as a substitute in saline solutions used for oral rehydration that previously called for oral glucose or intravenous treatment.

According to the Red Cross, the adding of sugar to the saline solution is "potentially the most important medical advance this century" and could save the lives of up to 13,000 children every day.

In Red Cross oral rehydration programs, native women are taught to measure sugar in the hollow formed by the forefinger of a clenched fist, add enough salt to fill the dimple at the crook of the wrist and mix them in a liter container of water.

Local property taxes were highest in Crystal City and lowest in Brenham in 1983-84 according to the Texas Research League, an Austinbased public policy research group. The average tax on all types of taxable property was 2.3 percent of market value in Crystal City but only seventenths of one percent in Brenham.

For a single family house that would sell for \$80,000, the highest tax was \$1,935 in Pasadena and the lowest was a \$251 tax bill in Dumas. Homestead exemptions cut the tax in Dumas to \$220.

Considering the total tax burden of each of 336 cities in Texas, from the highest to the lowest, Dimmitt is ranked at 161 by the Texas Rese League. We are in the mid the "tax burden" scale.

Insect scouting workshop to be offered in June

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Castro County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 4, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, according to Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-Entomology. the center is on US 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second session is scheduled for July 9 in Plainview and will cover mid-to lateseason crop pests.

Sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the workshop was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Exten-

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down cost, Knutson said.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m., with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining the scope of the training and explaining general concepts of pest

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management, pesticide safety, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-Entomology based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The day-long workshop will conclude with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available.

Social Security in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS

A person should apply for social security benefits two or three months before they plan to retire. This way, benefits can begin shortly after income from work stops.

Before applying, a person should get the necessary evidence together. This will save application time. The first item a person needs is his or her social security card.

Next, proof of age is required. Preferred proof is an official record of birth or baptism recorded before age 5. If this does not exist, other proofs can be submitted. The people at the local social security office can tell you what kinds of evidence can be used.

Records that might be used include school, church, state or federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificates, union, immigration or naturalization. This is not an exclusive list and other records may be acceptable.

Forms W-2 or selfemployment tax returns for the past two years should be provided. These are needed because recent earnings reports may not yet be in social security records.

A husband or wife who also plans to apply should have about the same documents. A marriage certificate may be required, but is not needed in all cases. Information about any previous marriages is also

Birth certificates of any young, unmarried children should be obtained as well. Additional documentation may be required depending on the particulars of certain cases.




