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## We Learn About Our Aliens

FOR the first time, the United States is going to get together some really complete information about its aliens.

The registration which will begin Aug. 27 and close Dec. 26 is a tremendous undertaking. Perhaps 3,600,000 residents, non-citizens, will be required to list with the government basic data about themselves, including their fingerprints.

Time was when a proceeding of this kind would have been regarded as smacking too much of European restriction to fit into the American picture. Scarcely today. Left to itself, the United States would never have adopted such a plan. But the impact of European tension on the world has brought about adoption of this registry plan almost without opposition.

SEVERAL things ought to be kept clearly in mind as the day approaches when all aliens must appear at one of 7300 registration

centers to leave a record of themselves and their activities.

First, this is no witch-hunt. The definite assurance of Director Earl G. Harrison has been given that all loyal aliens will be protected from unfair attacks or discrimination. The fact that a person must register is nothing against him.

Second, there is no charge or fee in connection with the registration. Already unscrupulous persons have appeared, ready for a suitable fee to "help" aliens through the registration. No help is required except that which will be freely given through postoffices. The registration must not be allowed to open up a profitable source of graft by prey on ignorance.

Director Harrison is not expecting any widespread disclosures of criminal activities or Fifth Column work. He is convinced that the vast majority of aliens are peaceful and law-abiding.

AMONG the questions asked (with penalty for willful falsification) is one covering all membership or activities in clubs, organizations, and societies. Another covers connection with political activities of foreign governments.

Persecution and injustice could easily follow abuse of such information, and even of the mere fact of registration itself.

Of the old Anglo-Saxon principle that all are innocent until proved guilty, all should guard against jumping to conclusions. The government has instituted the registration. The government is quite capable of taking any necessary action upon it in an orderly and legal manner.

## STAMP NEWS

INSURANCE of special U. S. National Defense and Red Cross stamps has been suggested to the Postoffice Department but no official response has been received on the proposal. United States has never issued semi-postals.  
Proponents of the National Defense issue urged that a 1-cent stamp, without franking value, be made compulsory on all mail to raise funds for the Red Cross program. The Red Cross stamp, with 1-cent postage value, would be sold at 1 cent, profits to be devoted to that organization.

Hungary has issued two new values for food relief. The design is the same as the recently issued special sheet.

erably to be paid with federal funds, sniffed at charges "I am communistic," and made caustic references to "my predecessor wanting to get on my present opponent's handwagon."  
Here for the rally was a delegation from Taylor county including the Bradshaw band, directed by C. M. Watson. There also were Garrett campaign leaders from nearly every county in the district. They held a conference after the rally.

E. J. Amey, administrative assistant to the highway commission, said that the notices called attention to the provisions of the recently-approved federal Hatch act, which, he said, were similar to state statutes applying to department workers.

morally deficient also would be placed in the deferred class. Federal and state officials, judges, and members of congress would be exempted from training, while members of the nation's armed forces and reserves as well as diplomatic representatives of foreign countries would not be required to register for conscription.

Conscientious objectors would be given a hearing by the justice department and if their claims were sustained would be ordered either into non-combatant service or would be employed in jobs of national interest under civilian direction.

**Year's Training**  
Enrollees selected for service would undergo a year's active training, during which they would receive the army's basic pay of \$21 a month and allowances, with opportunities for promotion. This service period could be extended

only by congressional action. It was provided specifically that the national guard, rather than trainees, should be the first to be inducted into active duty in case of emergency.

Congress would limit the number in training to those for whom funds had been appropriated. After they had served their year's training, conscripts would be transferred to the reserves for a period of 10 years, or until they reached 45. As an alternative, they could serve two additional years in the national guard or regular army.

One-year voluntary enlistment in the army of men between 18 and 34, inclusive, instead of the regular three-year enlistment, also was provided. Men who took this course would be excluded from conscription. No bounties would be paid conscripts, nor would they hire "substitutes" or buy their way out of service.

Private employers would be required to rehire released trainees unless it was "impossible or un-

reasonable" to do so. Interstate employers who declined to rehire workers would be subject to prosecution for an unfair labor practice and the national labor relations board would be empowered to go into court to force any employer to give back his job to a conscript who had served his period.

Maximum penalty for violation of the act, which would be effective until May 15, 1945, would be five years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.
