# 1,000 NAZI PLANES MASS **UPON ENGLAND**

#### Croydon Airport Near London Bombed by Raiders Today

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via-

LONDON, Aug. 15 (AP) .-German warplanes late today bombed Croydon airport, eight miles from London, and fought a furious battle with British fighters over Loadon's Tilbury docks.

Meanwhile, hundreds of other nazi raiders lashed coastal defenses and military objectives from Land's End to the Thames

Observers estimated that at least 1,000 planes took part in the greatest mass attack of the war. It was believed possible the assault signaled the opening gun of the long-threatened attempt to invade England.

Kimmell was passed: That the group go on record cooperating with Stephens county officials, the Stephens county committee, the state veterinarian, the state livestock saniary commission, the county officials of Eastland county in asking proper authorities to make a thorough investigation of the anthrax epidemic in that vicinity, to act accordingly, and to take proper action to check such epidemic.'

### City Health Officer Appeals for Cooperation in Keeping City Clean

By DR. W. P. LEE; City Health Officer.

After several consultations with Mr. Johnson wh gathers the garbage, I have driven over the town noting particularly its sanitary conditions. I find that there carelessness in some places where the urgent need of cleanliness is known, and that people who realize the men ace of decaying refuse and the speed with which disease spreads are sometimes among the offenders.

Cooperation is necessary if the town is to be kept clean. The ordinance that requires each resident to be provided with two garbage receptacles, one for wet and one for dry garbage, need not work a hardship on anyone Where it is possible, suitable and separate cans must be provided and these should have covers and should be free from holes or openings.

Wet and dry garbage should not be mixed. Wet garbage should not be burned, for it causes very disagreeable odors and is a just and frequent cause of complaint. At this season of the year there are melon rinds and fruit peelings which must not be thrown into the alleys to cause swarms of flies and gnats.

Some householders use large iron barrels as garbage cans. These are too heavy to lift, even when empty These should be replaced with smaller, lighter cans. If there are those who are unable to buy suitable garbage cans, they should burn the dry garbage and put the wet garbage in a covered box or bag and place it where the collector can pick it up.

I cannot see each housewife, so am taking this means of appealing to the citizens of the town to look about them and see where their premises can be made more sanitary. The city commission is anxious to cooperate in this important work and will assist in every way possible.

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






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
