If there is any possible way, the street paving program of the city should be continued. Lack of funds with which to carry on this program has caused the city to suspend it, although in doing so it was inevitable that numbers of workmen would be removed from the WPA employment. It is always true that things need most to be done when times are hardest. And it is usually true that what needs to be done is never fully done because of that fact. The city has been forced to halt the project because it doesn't have the money. That is a very effective reason. It there is no money there can be no paying. It is necessary that the city pay some of the costs of this work before the WPA will furnish its share.

Now Cisco needs this paving. It needs it for several reasons. First, there are a considerable number of men who want jobs. Unless they have these jobs they cannot pay their bills. If they cannot pay their bills community business is injured. A considerable section of purchasing power is lost.

Second, Cisco streets need he repairs that would be reized. Much of the commustreet system has baddeteriorated because of e same reason that has forced the city to forego its paving program. To be maintained as a continuing asset a street must be conditioned in proportion to its rate of depreciation. The paved streets of the community are 20 years old. They have been kept in as good condition as possible with the means at hand, but much of the base as well as the surface has depreciated. The WPA program would enable the city to overcome this.

Again, Cisco needs this street paving program because it would greatly increase proprty values as well as community living and business values. These go tcgether. It is unlikely that an. other opportunity to pave Cisco's streets at such small cost as this project affords will be realized in the future. The community, therefore, has a definite asset in this approved street project. If it it lost it will have lost a great sum in improved values and savings to future tax payers who may be compelled to supply the means for replacing worn-out streets later on. Most of those now living in Cisco will in all probability continue as tax payers into this future time.

Now, there seems to be two ways in which the street program can be continued. One is to pay past due taxes. There has been some reponse. The effort is not to enalize or persecute. It is rected at enlisting commuity cooperation in behalf of

The other is for property owners along unpaved streets to provide the small amount






