British Hit at German Plane Bases

LONDON, Aug. 21 (P)—British bombers struck at German-held airbases from Norway to southern France Tuesday in an effort to smash Nazi springboards for any attempted invasion of these islands, and carried out attacks on the outskirts of Paris itself.

Here at home, seven German planes were declared shot down in the day's assault upon Britain—assaults described by the air ministry as "comparatively slight" and an unstated number of Englishmen died under the invaders' bombs.

Raided were two towns in Essex, one in south Wales and one in the Anglian region. A south Wales port was reported to have suffered only "small" damage.

After a final check the air ministry revised upwards to 152 the total number of German raiders destroyed in Sunday's fighting.

In preparation for the showdown across the channel—if it is to come—the government took further steps to insure the independent functioning of local defense areas in the event they were isolated.

Guardsmen Are Paid; Start On Journey Home

CAMP BEAUREGARD, La., Aug. 21 (P)—Seventy thousand soldiers of the third army, loaded down with \$2,000,000 in pay—and little chance to spend it—turned homeward tonight on a military schedule that made an ABC chart.

The 21-day maneuvers ended before noon in a simulated battle and then the paymasters began their rounds among the guardsmen and regular troops who for the past four days had been skirmishing on the hills and in the woods.

But when the troops pocketed their greenbacks and looked around for a likely spot to do their spending they discovered that many of them were deep in the country far from towns.

No sooner had the battle ended than Lieutenant General Stanley D. Embick, commander of the third army, called 2,000 officers back together to hear a critique on the mock warfare.

For several days four army efficiency men had spent all their time devising means of moving the troops out of the 2,800-square mile maneuver area and back to their own homes and camping grounds in southern and southwestern states.

La Guardia to Dump Obscene Magazines

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (P)—Mayor LaGuardia intends to treat "obscene" publications as garbage—subject to collection by department of sanitation trucks—unless distributors withdraw the literature from New York newsstands.

A blackboard panel covered with what he termed "filthy" magazines at his side, the mayor yesterday spoke a strong warning to a group of publishers, distributors and dealers.

"I don't care how big you are, you are not going to distribute filth and smut in New York, at least not for the next 18 months (when his term of office expires)," the mayor declared.

LAREDO, Aug. 21 (P)—Texas legionnaires selected 44-year-old Ed. Riedel of San Angelo state department commander and designated Fort Worth as the annual state American Legion convention closed here Tuesday.

Riedel, weighing 206 pounds and six feet, one and one-half inches tall, has been city auditor of San Angelo since December, 1928. He was unopposed for the commandership. Fort Worth gained next year's convention after El Paso and Beaumont cooperatively withdrew their bids.

Completing its slate of officers, the convention named Rev. H. M. Markley of Wink chaplain, and re-elected Andrew Dilworth of San Antonio, judge advocate; W. F. Spiegel of Port Arthur, treasurer; Joe Grammer of Port Arthur, sergeant at arms; W. J. Danforth of Fort Worth, national committee man, and Lou Roberts of Borger, alternate.
