### Mid-Continent Ass'n Program Is Announced

FORT WORTH, Oct. 28 (SpC).—The full program for the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association's annual convention, opening here next Thursday and extending through Saturday, was announced today by President E. L. Smith.

The program includes details just completed for the celebration of the 45th anniversary of the birth of the Texas oil industry. Presentation of a bronze memorial plaque to the citizens of Corsicana, commemorating the discovery of commercial oil production there in October, 1895, is scheduled for Thursday afternoon. President Smith will present the plaque to J. L. Collins, association vice-president for east central Texas, who in turn will present it to Joe E. Butler, president of the Corsicana chamber of commerce. It will be erected in Corsicana on a concrete base and model derrick, and dedicated next week with appropriate ceremonies.

Special invitations to attend the anniversary celebration have been extended the men who discovered some of the more famous fields in Texas oil history. The petroleum pioneers also have been invited to make up the crew for the wildcat oil test which the association is sponsoring in downtown Fort Worth, using the world's oldest rotary drilling rig. Spudding ceremonies for the wildcat will take place Thursday noon, with a number of leading Texas oilmen due to take part.

### Business Session

The business session Thursday morning will include the welcome by Mayor I. N. McCrary, response by J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls and the president's annual address. Reports will be made by Paul W. Pitzer of Breckenridge, Al Buchanan of San Antonio, and Raymond M. Myers of Dallas. Judge Homer T. Bouldin of Albany, president of the Texas County Judges and Commissioners association, will discuss "Oil and the Community."

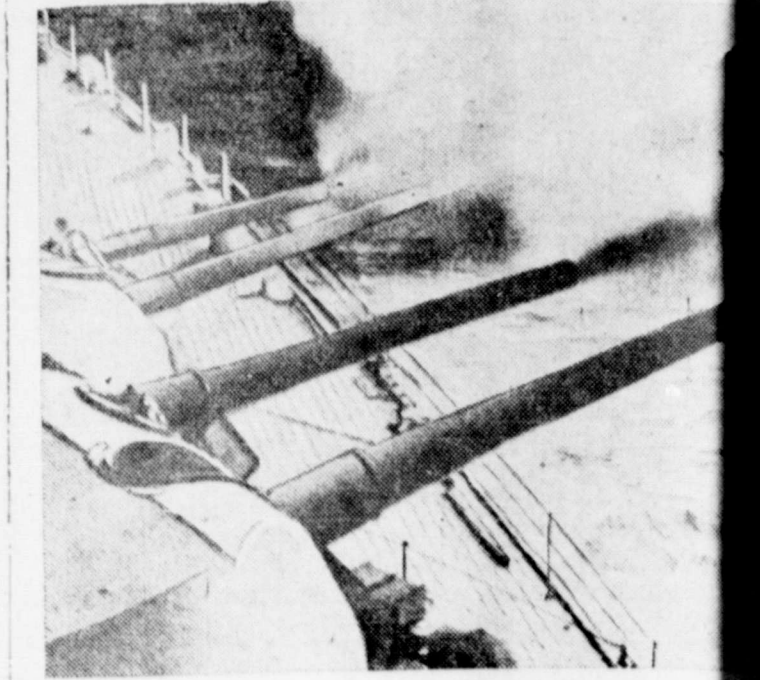
Thursday afternoon, R. B. Anderson of Vernon, former state tax commissioner, will speak on "If Oil Were Gone." Ray L. Dudley, Houston publisher, will talk on "The Oil Industry is Ready," after an introduction by Charles F. Roeser of Fort Worth. Guy L. Tate of Dallas and F. T. Baldwin of Houston will make committee reports. The annual directors' dinner will be held Thursday night.

Friday morning's program will include an address by M. W. Fodor, famous foreign correspondent, on "Hitler in Quest of Oil." Association distinguished service awards will be presented two outstanding Texas oilmen by John G. Pew of Dallas and Julius Fohs of Houston. Dr. J. C. Karcher of Dallas will offer nominations for officers, and invitations from cities seeking the 1941 convention will be heard. A luncheon and style show for the oilmen's wives will be a feature Friday noon, while oil tax men will meet that afternoon.

The annual handicap golf tournament will be played Friday afternoon.

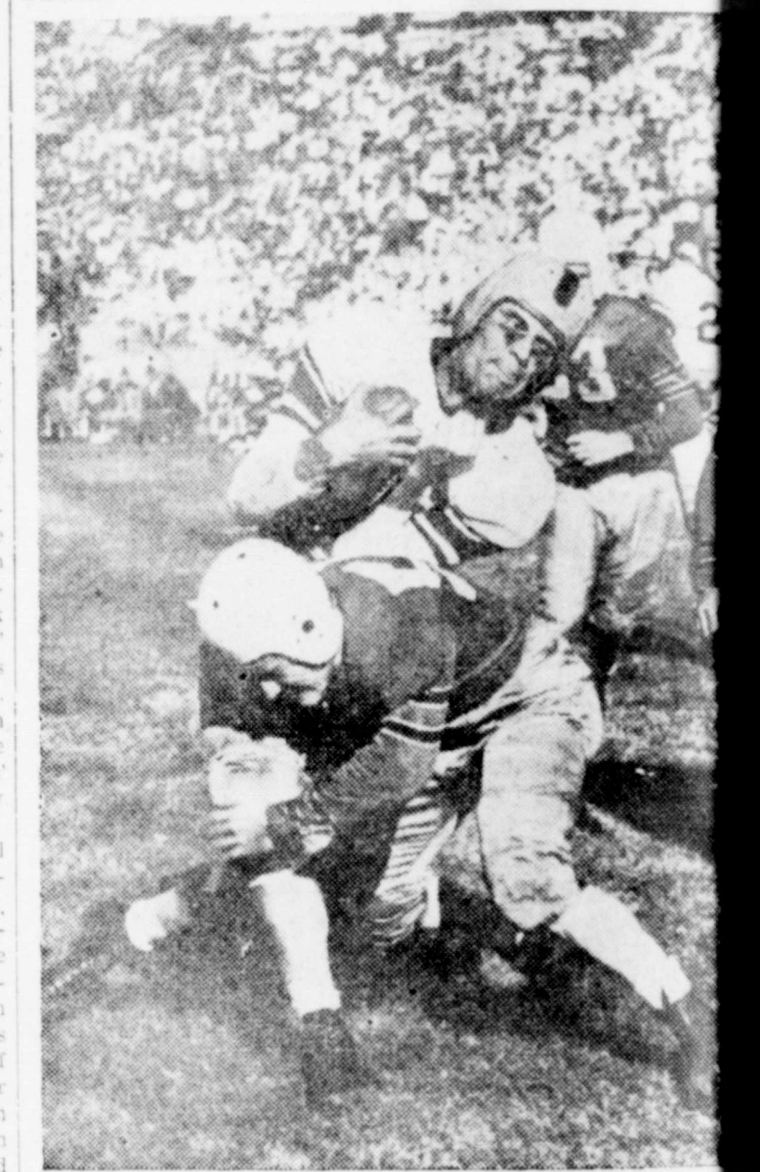

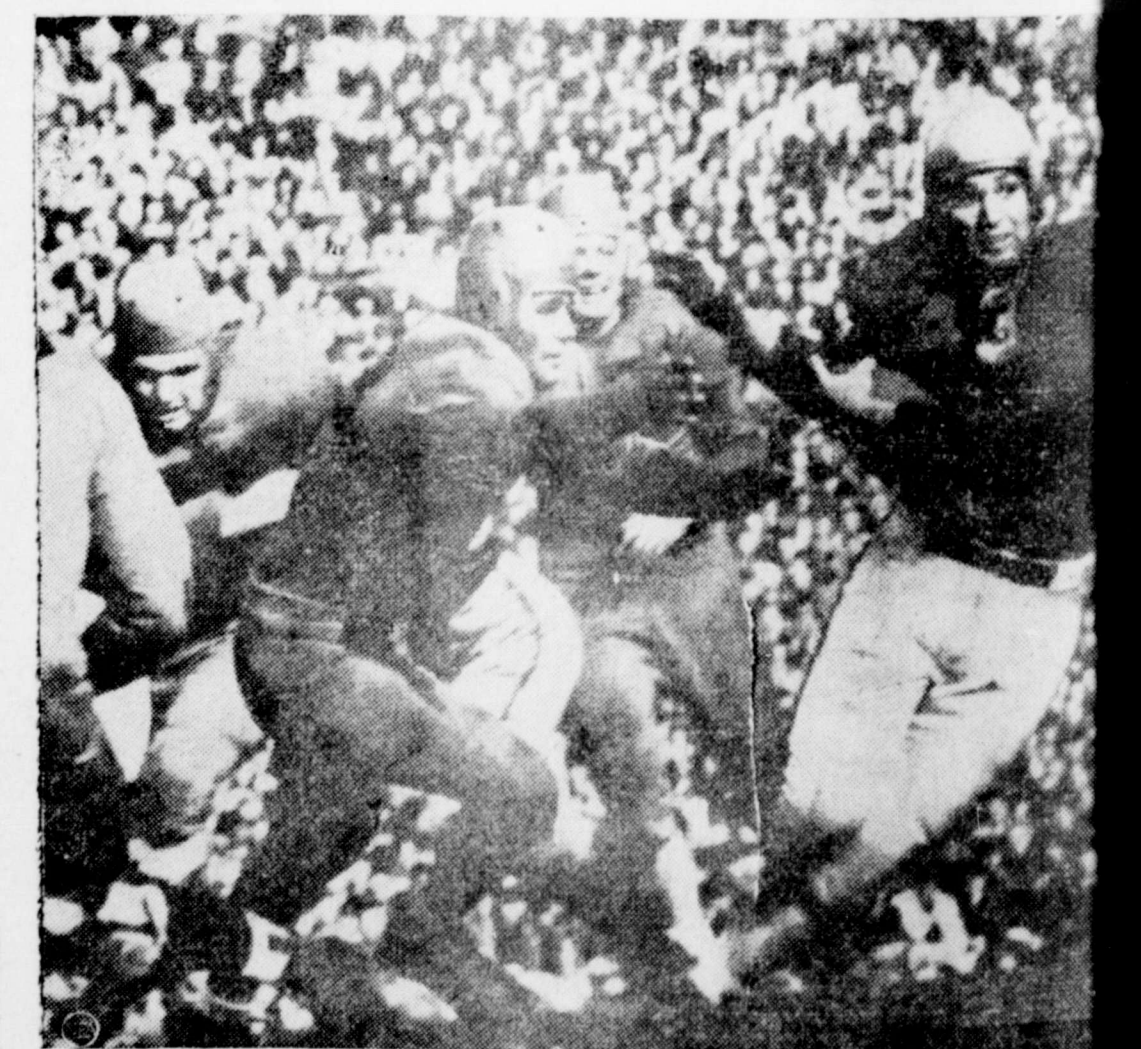
