WTSU plans course on free enterprise

The Political Science Dept. of West Texas State University has received a grant from the Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding to conduct a special summer program which will deal with the free enterprise system.

The six-hour, graduate-level program, designed mainly for social studies teachers, will be offered during the 1981 second summer term.

Approximately 30 scholarships will be awarded for the program. Those receiving scholarships will be able to enroll for six graduate credit hours, with the scholarship providing free tuition, fees, books, and, in some cases, free university housing.

"Political Systems and Capitalism" (POSC55912-1) and "American Government and the Free Enterprise System" (POSC55991-1) will both be offered in the afternoon, with the latter beginning at 1 p.m.

For the convenience of participating teachers, the courses will be offered on an accelerated basis. The entire program will last only about 3½ weeks.

Deadline for making applications for the available scholarships is July 1, but

interested persons are urged to do so as soon as possible, since the number of scholarships is limited.

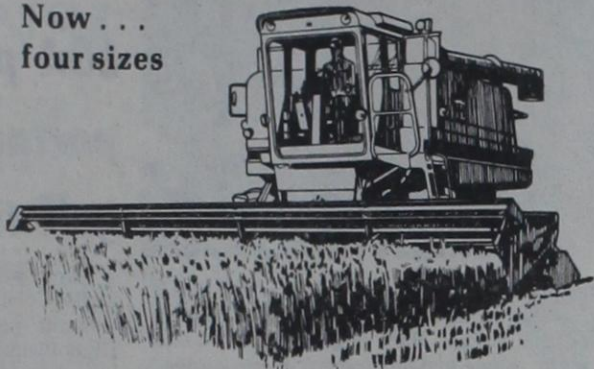

Social Security in Castro County

A 1977 amendment of the social security law has changed the way some people who receive federal, state or local government employee pensions are treated under social security. Its purpose is to eliminate windfall payments to retired government workers who have their own pensions and who, in addition, would receive social security benefits as a spouse or surviving spouse.

The change extends to government pensions the same principle that has always applied to social security benefits — that is, that a person who is entitled to more than one social security benefit should have one offset against the other. This means that a social security payment to a person as a wife, husband, widow, or widower of an individual who worked long enough in covered employment is reduced by the amount of any social security benefit that person earned in his or her own right.

For example, if a 65-year-old woman is entitled to a \$200 benefit on the basis of her husband's social security record and to a \$150 benefit based on her own record, she receives \$200, not \$350. The reason is that the \$200 benefit which she is entitled to as a spouse is reduced by the \$150 to which she is entitled on the basis of her own employment. Her benefit then is the sum of the \$150 plus \$50 as a spouse, or a total of \$200.

The offset applies only to government pensions for employment not covered under social security. A person whose government employment was covered under social security on his or her last day of employment is not affected by the new law. The law exempts certain persons from the pension offset provision provided they meet two criteria: First, the individual must be eligible to receive — but does not necessarily have to apply for — a federal, state, or local government pension before December 1982. And secondly, the person must meet all the requirements for social security spouse's or surviving spouse's benefits in effect in January 1977. At that time a divorced woman's marriage must have lasted at least 20 years rather than 10 years, as is the case today; and a

husband or widower must have received at least one-half his support from his wife. Because of this exception, most women now applying for benefits and men who actually have been dependent on their wives are not subject to the offset.

Nicholas has also signed Rhonda Reed of Amarillo High School, a 5-9 guard.

The women's mentor said, "All three girls felt SPC was the place to play ball next season, and our program will certainly benefit by having this type player on the dome floor."

Lori Gerber averaged 18 points a game her senior year in shooting 65% from the floor and 85% from the charity stripe. She was twice named all-state, her sophomore and senior years.

"She's 5-10 and does everything well on the court, both underneath and outside. She's an excellent player," said Nicholas.

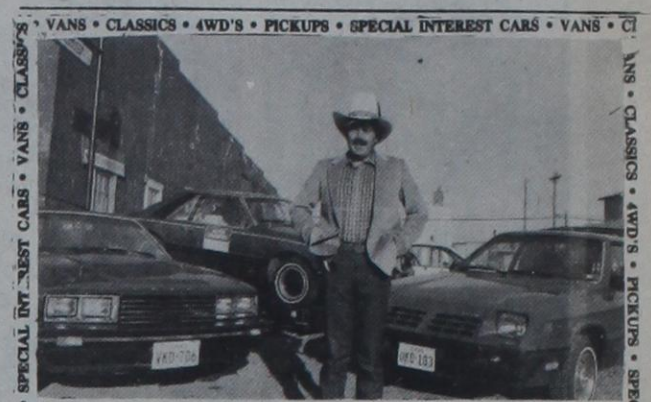

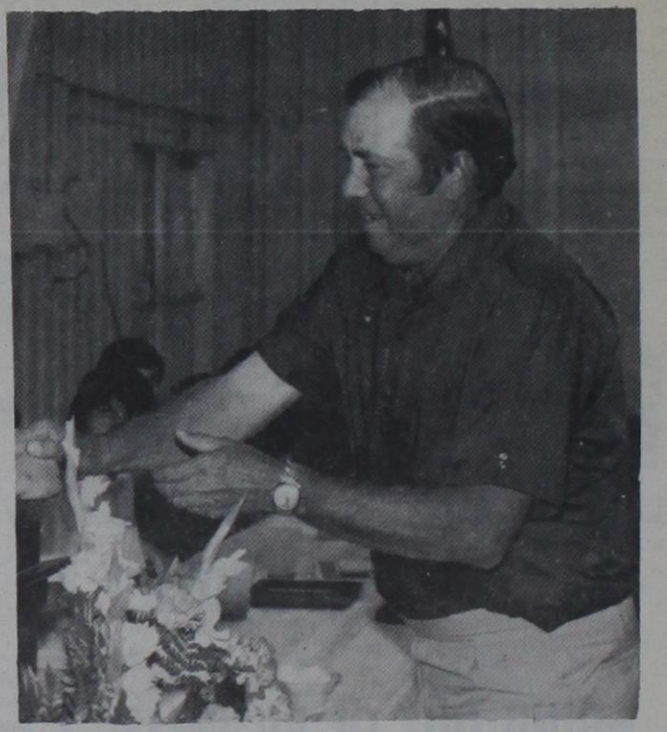

Wheat board sets election

The Texas Wheat Producers Board, formed in 1971 to support wheat research and market development, will hold its fifth biennial election June 26, according to Leo Witkowski of Hereford, chairman.

The three board members whose terms are expiring are Troy Sloan of Spearman, C. L. Edwards of Panhandle and W. R. Moore Jr. of Munday.

In 1971 when the Producers Board was formed by Texas producers as a self-help program to enhance the value of their crops, 3.5 million acres were planted to wheat that produced 31.4 million bushels valued at \$37.3 million. In 1981, just 10 years later, Texas planted acreage of wheat totals 7.7 million acres, producing 179.2 million bushels valued at \$700 million. All of the increased production in the ensuing years has been exported through newly developed markets; the domestic use in the US has remained virtually

unchanged.

Any wheat farmer producing within the 34-county commercial wheat area is eligible to vote for a board member for that district. Counties included are:

DISTRICT I: Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Moore, Hartley, Hutchinson and Gray.

DISTRICT II: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Floyd.

DISTRICT III: Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Wilbarger, Wichita, Young and Clay.

Witkowski pointed out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may become a candidate for the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least 10 other persons eligible to vote in the election, at least

30 days prior to the election date.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to the election, Witkowski said. He also indicated that any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date may obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices in the 34-county area, as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Wheat producers fund the TWPB with a half-cent assessment on their deliveries of wheat at commercial handlers. Proceeds support programs of foreign and domestic market expansion, food and feed wheat technical service, insect control demonstrations and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producers' income. In addition to Witkowski and the three members with expiring terms, TWPB members are Dwight Hamilton of Olney, Cagle Kendrick of Stratford, Otis Harman of Tullia, Robert Graves of Perryton and Wiley Tabor of Quanah.

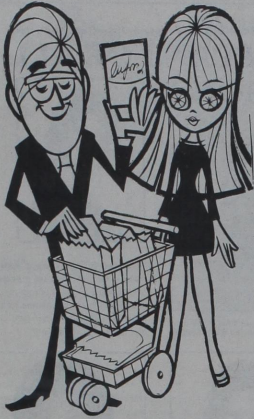
