King optimistic on gasohol bill

the passage of a state bill to the Senate's Natural 'gasohol bill," Texas Corn Resources Committee - at Growers President Carl King the request of the TCGA.

reported this week. House Bill 24, sponsored by Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, gained approval in the Texas House of Representatives May 12 in its full form including the eight-point program for gasohol development that was recommended by the TCGA at its last convention here.

This is the bill that would allow a five-cent per gallon tax deletion for five years on gasohol, as a financial boost to a new industry. Many states already have such tax

incentives on gasohol. With its passage by the House, Kubiak's bill now goes to the Senate for consideration - first to one or more appropriate committees for study and hearings, then to the Senate floor for a vote. The committee designation can spell life or death for a

proposed bill.

Juveniles face year's probation

Judge John T. Boyd of the 64th District Court placed two juveniles on formal juvenile probation for one year Friday.

The action came as a result of their involvement in the March vandalism of the Wade Maynard home.

The provisions of their probation include a curfew of p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. The juveniles must report weekly to the juvenile probation officer, must commit no offense against the laws of this or any other state, must stay away from the Maynard's home, Austin. must use no drugs unless under a doctor's prescription, 6 ins. to place in the finals. and must make total restitution for the damage to the

The court noted that the juveniles have already made restitution for two-thirds of the damage, which totaled \$1,217.70.

> Without the nickel tax incentive, King said, Texas stands to lose out in the gasohol race. Texas is surrounded by states that have tax incentives on gasohol, "and these states have invited Texas producers to move if this program isn't passed by the legislature,' King said.





Social Security

social security law has changed the way some people who receive federal, state or local government employee pensions are treated under social security. Its purpose is to eliminate windfall payments to retired government workers who have their own pensions and who, in addition, would receive social security benefits as a spouse

The change extends to government pensions the same principle that has always applied to social security benefits - that is, that a person who is entitled to more than one social security benefit should have one offset against the other. This means that a social security payment to a person as a wife, husband, widow, or widower of an individual who worked long enough in employment is covered reduced by the amount of any social security benefit that person earned in his or her own right.

For example, if a 65-yearold woman is entitled to a \$200 benefit on the basis of her husband's social security record and to a \$150 benefit based on her own record, she receives \$200, not \$350. The reason is that the \$200 benefit which she is entitled to as a spouse is reduced by the \$150 to which she is entitled on the basis of her own employment. Her benefit then is the sum of the \$150 plus \$50 as a spouse, or a total of \$200.

The offset applies only to government pensions for employment not covered under social security. A person whose government employment was covered under social security on his or her last day of employment is not affected by the new law. The law exempts certain persons from the pension offset provision provided they meet two criteria: First, the individual must be eligible to receive - but does not necessarily have to apply for - a federal, state, or local government pension before December 1982. And secondly, the person must meet all the requirements for social security spouse's or surviving spouse's benefits in effect in January 1977. At that time a divorced woman's marriage must have lasted at least 20 years rather than 10 years, as is the case today; and a

The following information concerning dental care benefits has been received from the Waco VA regional office: Former prisoners of war who were held in captivity for six months or more are now eligible for any dental care deemed necessary by the Veterans Administration.

Also eligible are certain veterans whose serviceconnected disabilities are permanently rated at 100 percent.

Veterans who believe they may qualify for the expanded dental benefits should contact the nearest VA health care facility for applications and assistance.

Dental treatment for former prisoners of war was previously limited to dental problems rated as service connected. The new legislation - Public Law 96-22 distinguishes between former POWs held captive for less than six months, and those who were prisoners for six

months or more. Short term prisoners are presumed not to have suffered irreparable dental damage, while those held prisoner for six months or more are considered to have

suffered such damage. For this reason, they are now eligible for any dental care, as determined necessary by VA, on an unlimited treatment basis.

Under certain conditions, veterans living in localities remote from VA health care facilities may be authorized treatment by private dentists.

These additional groups are eligible for VA dental care: -Those with compensable

service-connected conditions; -Those who apply within

one year of discharge for treatment of service-incurred dental conditions; -Those with non-compen-

sable service-connected dental conditions caused by trauma; -Those with service-

connected medical conditions which are professionally determined by the VA to be aggravated by a dental condition;

Sales from the livestock sector, including dairy and poultry, totaled almost \$5.7 billion last year while crops contributed about \$3.8 billion. Another \$633 million came from such agriculturally related areas as timber, horses, fish farming and hunt-

Social Security

Castro County

President Reagan's proposed budget cuts have garnered considerable press attention since mid-January. In particular, the discussion of changes in social security has caused concern. We receive phone calls and visits daily from people who have read or heard of various cuts in the

First, I would like to stress that the key work is 'proposed." At this time none of these changes have been enacted into law. However, it does appear likely that they will be put into legislation in some form in the near

There are three major changes currently in discussion; elimination of the minimum benefit, student benefits, and the lump sum death

The minimum benefit is \$122 per month and is paid to individuals who have worked under social security over 20 years and have had very low earnings. Normally, based on earnings, these people would receive a benefit less than \$122. If this provision is eliminated, all beneficiaries will receive according to their earnings. If your benefit is figured to be \$75 a month, that is what you will receive instead of the current

minimum. Student benefits are paid to individuals who are between 18 and 22 and full-time students. Of course, these students must be eligible for social security, based on the record of a deceased, retired, or disabled parent. The current proposal suggests eliminating these benefits over a four year period.

The third major change is the suggestion to eliminate the \$255 death payment. This would not be completely obliterated. It is proposed that it still be paid if there is a widow or surviving child who is eligible for benefits on the record of the deceased


