Through the Editor's Spectacles

It is inevitable that there be a drastic cut in the amount of government money spent for WPA projects. The cost and magnitude of the defense program is such that it will tax the financial resources of the government to carry it out, while the number of workers needed to build defense projects as now drawn up will enable a great number of those now employed on WPA jobs to get employment in private industry and defense projects. Where possible, according to the Washington announcement in today's papers, WPA labor will be employed on defense projects. The cut will come in the work not related to national defense.

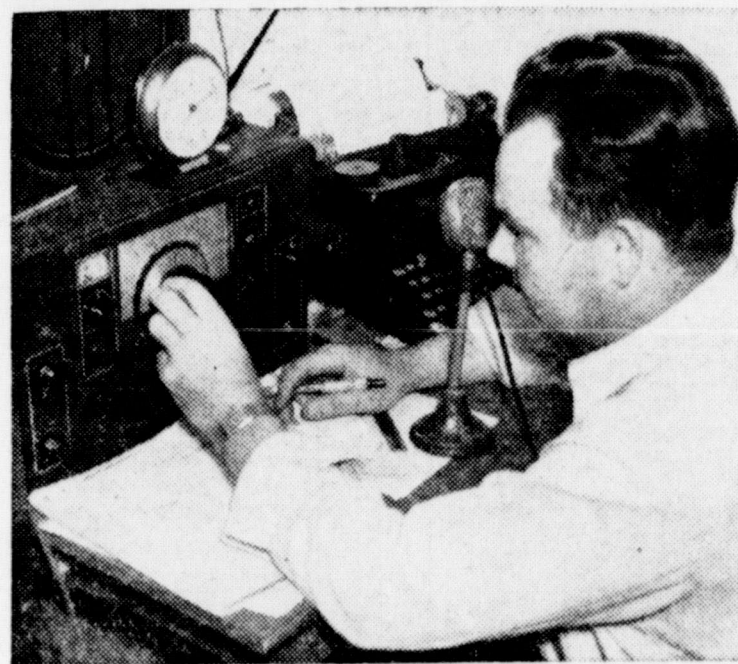
The question naturally arises, what are those communities and areas where there are no national defense industries or works and where non-defense relief projects were an important source of economic support going to do to take up the slack? In many cases, the opportunity to obtain WPA projects and dependence upon relief sources for community support has had the effect of blunting initiative in the quest of more enduring support. Opportunism has taken the place of constructive planning and development. The immediate has been favored over the long-range, because the struggle has been for what could be obtained quickly and with the least effort and cost. When the period of opportunism is over, the real cost of the neglect to seek more solid support begins to be paid.

The appearance of the national defense program which, despite its government-financed characteristics, will return the operation of the national economy toward a more natural basis, poses the problem quite sharply now. Obviously, if the communities affected in a manner mentioned have not already given serious thought to the problem of how they will meet their needs of economic support under normal conditions, they ought to get down to serious thinking and planning right now. It is not going to be easy, and it is going to call for earnest cooperation and some real patriotism where neglect and selfishness have existed.

Cisco and Breck Game To Be Highlight of Holiday

With most business houses in Cisco to be closed and the schools to have half a holiday, Cisco tomorrow will observe its second Thanksgiving celebration of the year, with the football game between the Cisco Loboes and the Breckenridge Buckaroos at Breckenridge the highlight of the day's program. The schools observed last Thursday and Friday for their regular Thanksgiving holidays and many of the citizens and institutions of the community likewise observed last Thursday.

The Cisco and Breckenridge game will be the last football contest on the schedules of both teams. Annually played on Thanksgiving, the contest has always been marked with intense rivalry and although no title hinges on the outcome tomorrow, interest is keen since there is no other important game in the district to distract from it.

Tickets for the game are on sale at the Red Front Drug store, where Ciscoans purchasing them may secure reserved seats without additional charge. Seat reservations were allowed in order that Cisco fans might be assured of good seats without having to go to Breckenridge a long time before the start of the game. They were urged to purchase their tickets here for that reason.

Coaches J. T. Petty and Drate Cathey reported their boys in good condition for the game with all of the squad ready to play. Injuries which caused a costly mid-season slump in the team strength, have healed, and for the first time since the game with the Childress Bobcats, the Loboes will present their full strength.

The Buckaroos have consistently defeated Cisco teams for the last seven or eight years, although the Loboes have always given Breckenridge teams a hard fight. This year the home eleven is said to have a better chance for victory than at any time during that series of losses, and will likely shoot the works in a contest that from all pre-game indications will be a thriller.

The contest starts at 2:30 p. m.

Texas Payrolls Gain Over 1939 Level

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (Sp)—Continuing at September's high level, Texas employment and payrolls emphasized this year's gains over 1939, University of Texas business statisticians said today.

More working hours per week for those not previously fully employed and somewhat higher wages than a year ago were reflected in the fact that payrolls climbed five per cent over October, 1939, while the number of workers increased only 2.2 per cent, university of Texas bureau of business research officials explained.

Livestock Shipments Up During October

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (Sp)—Livestock shipments from Texas ranches to Fort Worth markets and out-of-state points edged up during October, to total 12,367 cars—or two per cent higher than in October last year, University of Texas bureau of business research officials said today.

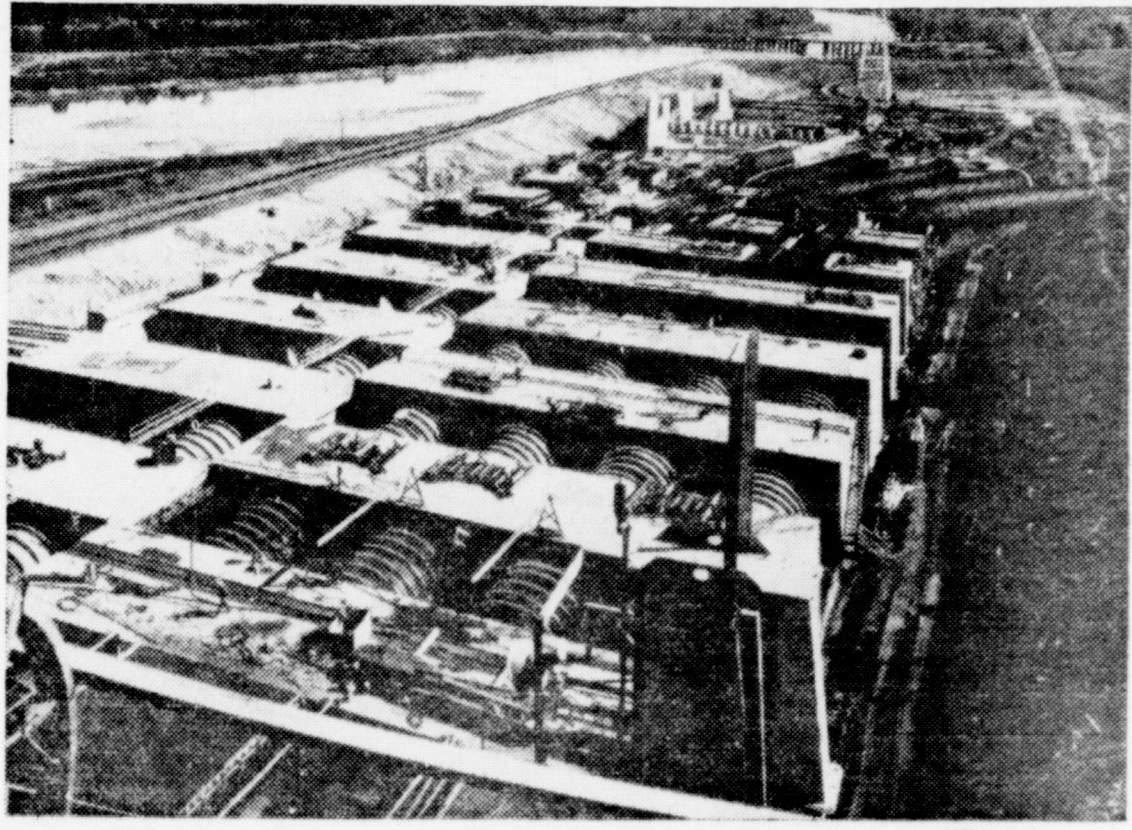
A 48.7 per cent gain in sheep shipments—1,627 cars—accounted for most of the increase, though the hog movement also increased from 683 cars to 730.

Cattle shipments were down 3.9 per cent to 7,869 cars, calves down 1.1 per cent to 2,343 cars.

Oil Meet Speaker

Scientist to Address WCTO&G Annual Meeting

ABILENE, Nov. 27 (Sp)—Principal address for the evening banquet program of the ninth annual meeting of the West-Central Texas Oil & Gas association here Monday, December 2, at 6:30 p. m. at Fair Park Supper club, will be made by Dr. J. C. Karcher of Dallas, it has been announced by Malcolm Meek, chairman of the association's arrangements committee.

Dr. Karcher, internationally known petroleum scientist, heads the Coronado Exploration corporation and Geophysical Service, Inc. As an independent oil operator, he and his associates are credited with the opening of more than 250 new oil areas in recent years.

His subject will be "Petroleum and Our National Defense." He will discuss prospects for future development of oil reserves, with particular attention paid to the west-central Texas area.

Feature of the afternoon "Open Forum" session of the association meeting will be an address on the subject, "Why a New Oil and Gas Commission for Texas," by D. Houston Bolin, Wichita Falls, president, North Texas Oil & Gas association. Several other independent oil operators of Texas will follow Bolin in short discussions of his subject.

Other speakers who have been scheduled for appearance on the Monday afternoon open forum discussion include Judge Sam Russell of Stephenville, congressman-elect for this district, and Carl M. Mapes of Tulsa, Okla., secretary of the General Mid-Continent Oil & Gas association.

BAIRD MAN, BLOWN FROM TRUCK, KILLED

BAIRD, Nov. 27 (Sp)—Emmett Lovell, about 39, of Baird, was killed here Tuesday afternoon when wind caught timbers on which he was riding on the flat bed of a truck and hurled him to the pavement.

He died in Callahan county hospital several minutes after the freak accident happened at 2:30. It occurred at the intersection of highway 80 and the new Coleman-Albany highway.

The wind swept both Lovell and the timbers off the truck bed. Lovell struck the pavement with his head, and the impact crushed the back of his skull.

He and a companion were returning to Baird from property owned by Robert Edwards east of town, where they were doing construction work.

Surplus Commodities For December Listed

Following commodities have been designated by the secretary of agriculture as surplus commodities during December to be exchanged for blue surplus food order stamps in eligible retail food stores participating in the food stamp program.

Butter, raisins, rice, pork lard, pork, corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, wheat flour and whole wheat (graham) flour, fresh oranges, fresh grapefruit, onions (except green onions), dried edible beans, fresh cabbage, Irish potatoes, fresh apples and fresh pears. *Pork shall include all cuts fresh, including chilled or frozen, pickled, salted, cured, or smoked but not cooked or packed in metal or glass containers.

Vultee Aircraft Strike Is Ended

DOWNLEY, Calif., Nov. 17 (UP)—A 12-day strike at Vultee Aircraft corporation—which tied up work on military contracts totaling \$84,000,000—ended Tuesday with ratification by striking CIO workers of a new contract which will increase wages of 5,200 employees by \$1,400,000 annually.

Employees began returning to work at 7 a. m. today—under the watchful eyes of federal bureau of investigation agents determined to see that no spies obtain entrance in the guise of workers.

DEFEAT GROWS INTO ROUT AS ITALIANS RUN

Greeks Push Steadily Forward, Capture Much Supplies

ATHENS, Nov. 27.—Bayonet-thrusting Greeks were declared to have scattered fresh Italian troops — "a choice regiment of Romans," the Greeks called them—thrown into action in a desperate attempt to bolster the center of the sagging Albanian battle line.

There was no stopping their forces here or anywhere else along the rambling, mountainous front, the Greeks reported.

In the north, they said, Greek fighters pushed steadily beyond Pogradetz, Italian stronghold 30 miles inside Albania, and in the south they engaged tattered Italian battalions fiercely to hold Argyroastro, the second and last major fascist "invasion" base, and keep open their path to the Adriatic sea.

The Greek high command's communique tonight said that in the Koritza area, six abandoned Italian airplanes, "among other material," had fallen to the Greeks.

A government spokesman declared that not only had Italian reinforcements failed to halt the Greek advance, but that these reinforcements were being pushed back in disorder despite their "desperate efforts."

"The broken morale of the other Italians," he added, "has been imparted to these troops. They have been overthrown and are retreating."

Abandoning Vehicles
The fleeing troops, the spokesman declared, were abandoning nearly all their vehicles. He added that on the bank of a lake near Koritza the Italians had buried "important quantities" of munitions and other materials, which had been dug up by the Greeks.

He confirmed reports that Greek forces had been landed on the Albanian coast opposite Corfu and denied Italian claims that they were annihilated or captured.

Advices reaching Salonika from various parts of the front indicated all Italian units were seeking to turn toward the Adriatic in their retreat. (Here 31 words were censored.)

The Italians were reported to have only two main roads to the Adriatic, one leading north from Argyroastro and the other running west from the Yugoslav border.

Both these routes and feeder roads were said to be crowded with troops and motor equipment, under continual bombing and machine-gunning from British and Greek planes.

We're beginning to believe that you can't keep a good ship down either. The Bremen has been sunk how many times now?

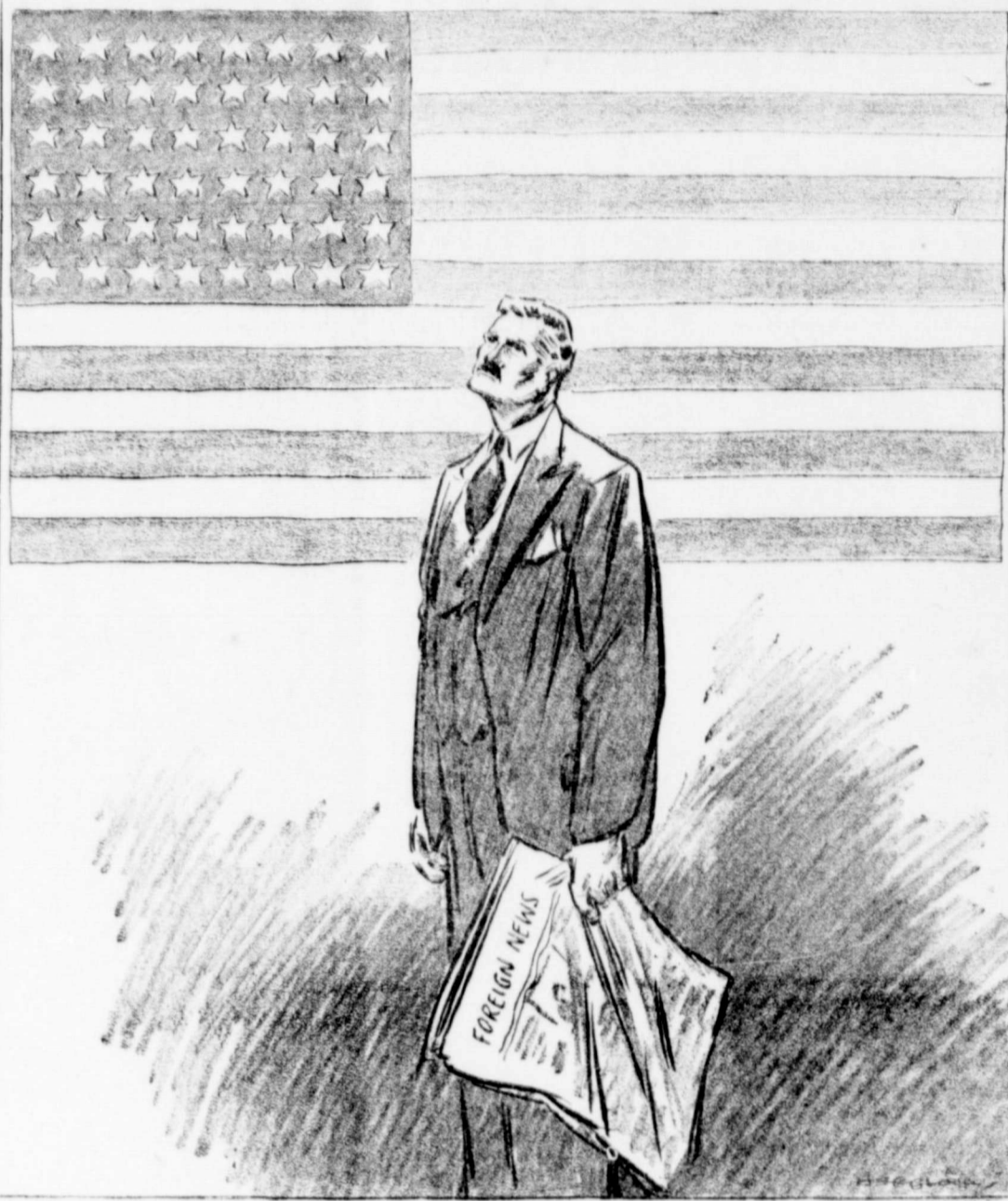
It's der Fuehrer's idea that death in war is a beautiful thing. For the buck private, eh, Adolf?

Registration of all ex-students and visitors will take place on the college campus at 9:30 Saturday morning and will be followed with an "old timers' pep rally" at 11 o'clock.

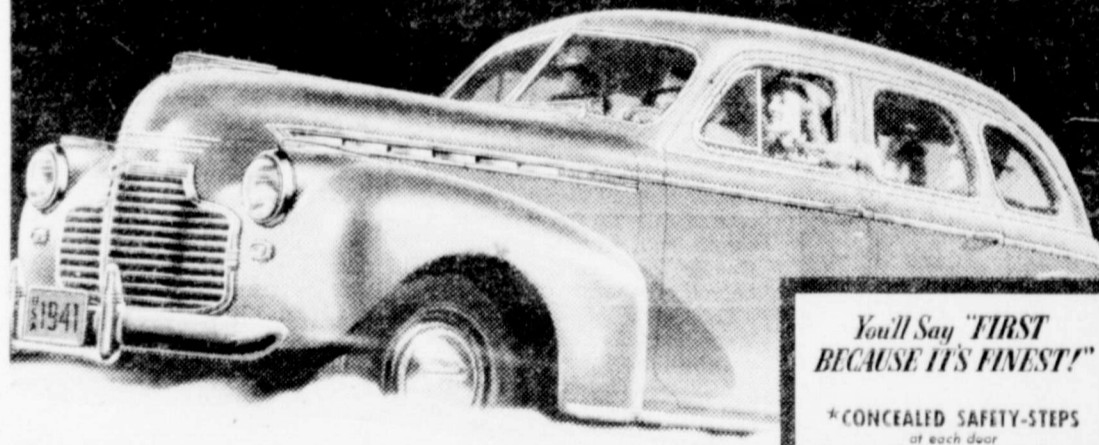

LONDON, Nov. 27 (AP).—German bombers ranged far and wide over Britain last night, striking particularly at a west England city which had been assaulted yesterday and heavily last Sunday night, but up to midnight only negligible damage had been reported.

Over the town in the west (which was obliquely but quite clearly identified as Bristol, the port through which American supplies have been pouring into England) the raiders were met with the shock of a fierce barrage. They unloaded hundreds of fire-bombs on a golf course. The extent of high explosive damage was thought to have been small.
