Explosion, Fire Wreck Large Warehouse

YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 29 (AP)-A death-dealing explosion follow ed by fire ripped a large ware asunder at Toppenish Wash., Thursday, killed at least seven persons and left an untold number of others buried beneath the ruins of five stores in the

The blast was believed caused gas which had collected in the arehouse basement or by dyna-

About 12 persons were injured were taken to hospitals in

The blast reduced the two-story 250-foot long warehouse to rubwere a merchandise store, a real estate office, barber shop, beauty shop, produce company office, and

The explosion apparently occurred in the center of the building. The roof collapsed and the four cement walls crumbled.

Earl Hanson, one of the injured fought his way through the flames to rescue Mrs. Ralph Wheeler who was trapped in the debris of the beauty shop. Both were severely burned.

Mrs. Wheeler said she smelled gas two hours before the blast. A repair man, Ray Synder, was called. The explosion came just as he turned on his flashlight to investigate the leak, he said.



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

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




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
