This work, carried out under the blanket WPA project approved for the community, has been a great deal more valuable than it appears. It has resulted in the restoring of the most - travelled thoroughfares of the city from a condition of deterioration threatening the very use of these thoroughfares and thereby saving an investment of many, many thousands of dollars. Naturally, the street service has been improved and the attractiveness of the streets so rebuilt increased.

The work has been done with an economy of expenditure which does credit to the city, and has made it possible to carry on this work despite the extremely limited condition of the city's finances. It is still
