### Through the Editor's Spectacles

President Roosevelt the other day said no truer thing in his statement that wars are not fought with guns. The instruments men use in battle or peace are the means with which they translate faith into action. The appeal of the president for a firm and lasting faith in the cause which democracy fights is to the very reason for opposing the aggression of the dictators if those who fight under it have confidence in it and not firmly believe that they are better when they are under its forms. Democracy is more than a word.

What the president said about faith in democracy as cause worth the struggle to keep it, can be applied to local problems for the law that makes strong men out of mere animals is the same everywhere, in whatever field of endeavor men invade. People who have faith in what they seek to achieve are failures before they begin. Men who have no faith in their community and no confidence in themselves cannot expect to achieve little. Men who are merely hanging onto something because it is something to hang onto may expect to hang on for the rest of their lives.

Perhaps it is trite to say that, but all truths are trite. It is the acceptance of them that is not. Marriage is about as trite a thing as exists. People have been loving and marrying since time began, and hardly a couple of that infinite multitude of human pairings has not greeted the experience as a discovery as new as Eden. Every sunrise brings with it the same sense of newness. Similarly the experience of having faith, which brings confidence, enthusiasm, alertness and earnest work in train, is new and stimulating.

## Scout Founder Dies of Heart Ailment at Home

NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, Jan. 9 (AP)—Lord Baden-Powell a military genius who devoted much of his life to a peace organization, the Boy Scouts—was buried today on a sunny slope of Mt. Kenya, deep in the Africa he loved.

The man who won British acclaim as the defender of Mafeking in the Boer war, died Wednesday at his home in Nyeri of a heart ailment. He was 83.

After the Boer war, Baden-Powell remained in Africa, lending his talents for organizing to forming the South African constabulary. Next he was inspector general of cavalry for Great Britain. In 1910 he retired.

Always interested in boys and girls, the outdoors and organizing youths in groups for instruction, he commenced a work that eventually led to the Boy Scouts, and formation of the Girl Scouts.

From little groups in Britain, the movement spread.

Baden-Powell served as a British intelligence officer in the World war.

Ordered to rest in 1937 because of a "tired heart," he left London for Africa, saying:

"I have had a long inning. I'd rather die in Africa, where my heart is, than anywhere."

It was agreed that he'd rather lie in death there, too.

## TOBRUK NOW IS HEMMED IN BY BRITISH

### 30,000 Italians Are in Same Predicament As Bardia

Britain's turbulent desert armies hemmed in 30,000 Italian troops at Tobruk—"last stand" fascist stronghold in eastern Libya—for a final siege last night, while on the home front, Britons were told they must make a choice between steaks and victory.

Surrounded by troops and tanks, blockaded by the British fleet lying off Tobruk harbor, the garrison was said to be without hope of reinforcements and fated to become "another Bardia."

A triple assault by land, sea and air appeared imminent.

In the Greek-Italian war, the Greeks reported the capture of more than 300 Italian prisoners and much war material in local fighting.

Reports encouraging to the followers of the Vichy government came from the capital of unoccupied France. There, U. S. Ambassador William D. Leahy, began his official duties as observers expressed the opinion that his appearance at Vichy was one of the most important recent events there. It was considered by some that Leahy's mere arrival had a moral effect.

Meat rations of the island kingdom were sharply reduced for the second time in a week and Food Minister Lord Woolton declared frankly:

"We can no longer bring the world to our door."

He explained many food shipments must be diverted to feed Britain's overseas armies fighting in the north African desert—not to mention the 70,000 Italians already reported captured in the campaign.

Under the new rationing, Britons will be permitted to buy only 23 cents worth of meat per person weekly, or about 15 ounces of beef at recent London prices. Since December 16, the ration has been reduced from 47 cents, approximately by half.

One fascist Italian who had not been to feed is Gen. Annibale Bergonzoli—dubbed "General Electric Whiskers" because of his bristling, vibrant beard—who was officially reported captured in the fall lot Bardia Sunday, but who is now the little man who wants there.

While the Italian press eulogizes Bergonzoli as a hero, as one who had died on the field of battle after refusing a plane sent to take him to safety, British general headquarters in Cairo declared that on the night before Bardia fell, "General Electric Whiskers" and two of his black-shirt commanders "deserted their troops" and possibly "decamped by motorboat" from the doomed stronghold he commanded.

Search for General

British patrols scattered over hundreds of square miles of the Libyan desert were reported on the lookout for the little general last night, even as his opponent, Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell, commander-in-chief of the British army of the Nile, began to lay siege to the next objective at Tobruk.



Hester, of Southwestern University, WTCC-engaged collaborator with Bandeen on the widely discussed plan to equip the administrative department of the state government with a system of budgetary control and fiscal management designed to actually supervise spending and at the same time provide adequate information to the legislature as a basis for its policy making.

This involves creation of a governor's cabinet with advisory functions, a new department of finance and control, a complete centralized purchasing scheme, and a civil service system for employment of state personnel.

The bill covering the plan, to be jointly presented by the West Texas, East Texas and South Texas chambers of commerce, will bear the name of Rep. Humphrey, 18th district, who will introduce it in the lower house. It is expected to go before the two houses early in the session opening January 14, and to have behind it an immense weight of public opinion. The West Texas chamber has taken the plan to its own territory in 35 regional taxpayers' meetings attended by groups from 132 towns, and the East Texas and South Texas chambers are now actively pushing it in their sections.

Other organizations: City of Ballinger, Winters Boosters club, Winters Home Demonstration club, 20th Century clubs (senior and junior) of Stephenville, Moran Luncheon club, Austin League of women voters, and the tax committee of the Fort Worth chamber of commerce.

In addition to official action by boards of directors, endorsements were voted at close of meetings by groups registered from 58 towns not included above. Chambers of commerce in these towns are expected to make the endorsements official.

BRUCE CATTON'S AMERICAN ROUNDUP

DIES WILL ASK NEW CONGRESS FOR MILLION DOLLARS TO CONTINUE HIS INVESTIGATION

Last of four articles highlighting major issues before the new Congress.

WASHINGTON.—An important part of Congress's job has always been its power to investigate. That power is due to be exercised in several important fields by the new Congress.

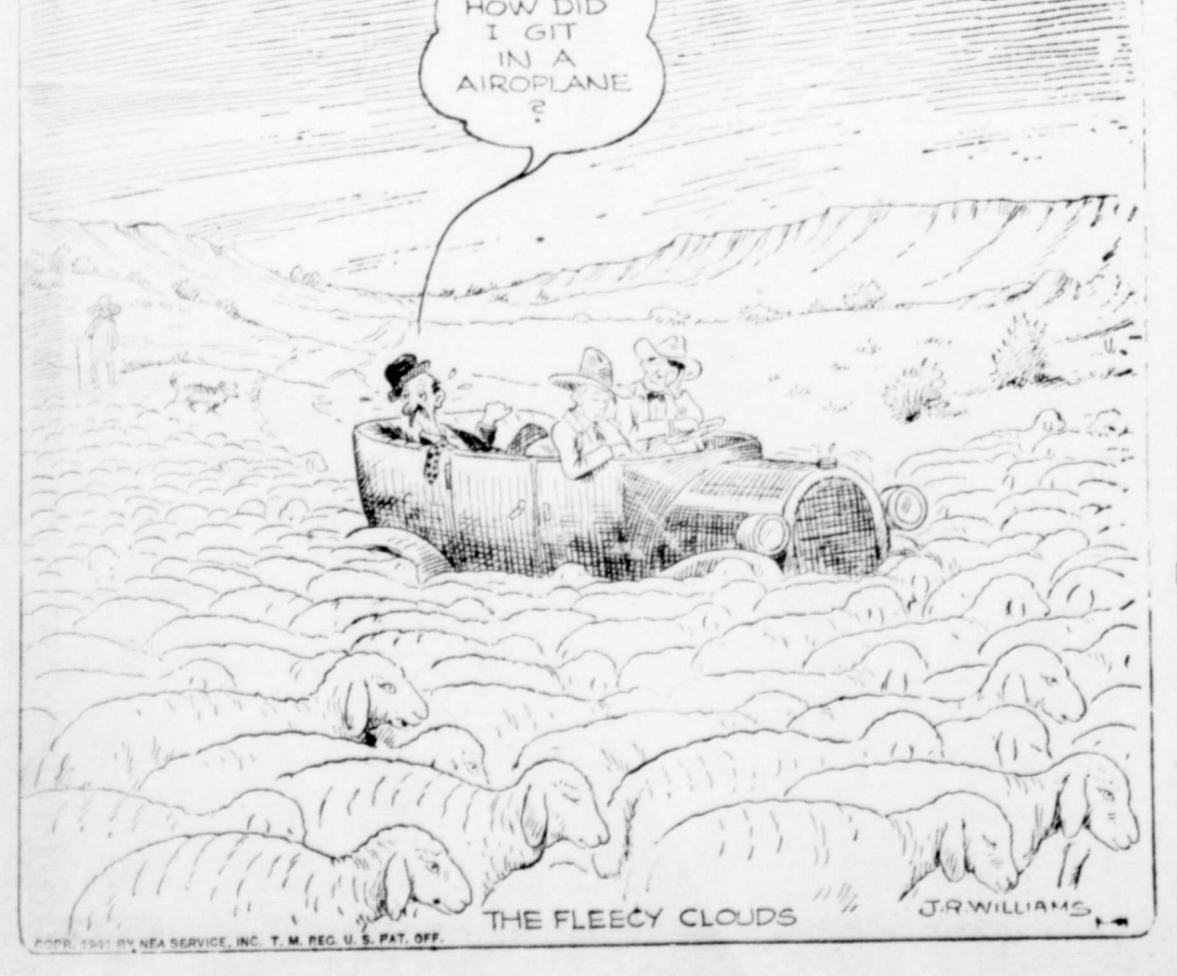

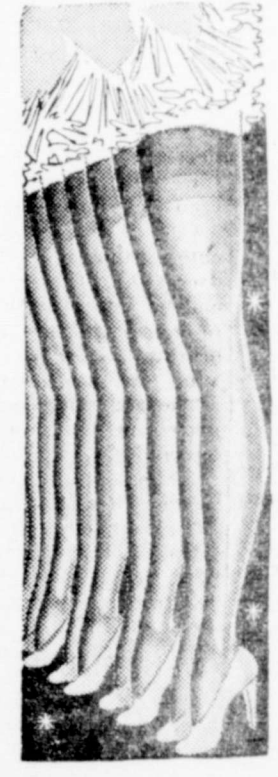

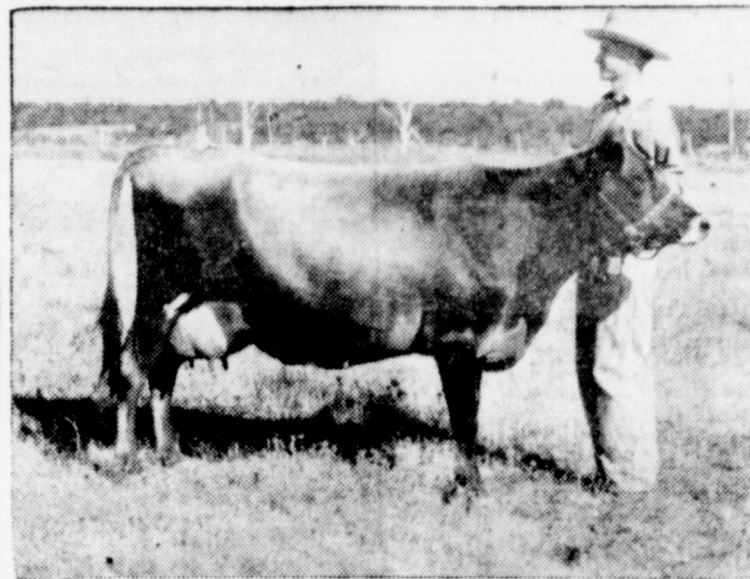

#### Gorman Boy To Receive Gold Medal From A&M

Announcement has just been made that L. V. Mauney, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Mauney, and a Gorman 4-H club boy, has been elected to receive the county achievement award of a gold medal presented by the A. & M. Extension service for outstanding demonstration work in 1940. The county achievement award replaces the gold star awards that have been made to boys who have done outstanding work. The most important change made in setting up the achievement award, according to A. C. Pratt, assistant county agent, was that only one award will be made to a county, whereas the gold star awards were on a competitive basis with other counties, and the number any county received was determined by the quality of demonstration work done.

L. V. has conducted a demonstration in raising peanuts for the past three years and, believe it or not, his average yield per acre has been 51 bushels. The average county yield is 16 bushels per acre. This demonstration work has been on hillside sand, with good farming practices carried out, with the use of fertilizer, and with the full cooperation of Mr. Mauney, who contributed sound advice from his experience in raising peanuts. It is not so unusual for a club boy to make 50 bushels per acre one year, but L. V. made 56 bushels in 1938, 43 bushels in 1939, and 52 bushels in 1940, so one would think this was not an accident.

Having a greater desire to do one thing well, than to divide his interests with several different types of work, L. V. has not had any 4-H demonstration other than peanuts. His 1941 demonstration is to be 1 1/2 acres of peanuts. Here's hoping Old Man Weather gives you a break, L. V.

#### 20,500 NYA Youths Get Private Jobs

AUSTIN, Jan. 8 (Sp)—During the past six months 20,500 youths have left National Youth administration projects in Texas for jobs in private industry, military service, and other types of employment, according to J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator.

This rapid turnover, Kellam said, is making way for other boys and girls who are unemployed; between the ages of 16 and 24, inclusive; out of school, and who need the work experience provided on NYA projects.

On NYA projects in Texas 22,621 boys and girls now are receiving work experience in manual types of work on resident centers, local production projects, and construction projects. Peak employment of 25,000 youth will be reached by January 15. This number represents the beginning of the increased employment of jobless youth authorized by congress in October with a \$32,500,000 supplementary appropriation.

Youth applications should be presented to the nearest NYA area office. The 22 area offices in Texas are located in Amarillo, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Eastland, Dallas, Waco, Palestine, Mt. Pleasant, Marshall, Lufkin, Brenham, Beaumont, Houston, San Angelo, El Paso, Austin, Crystal City, San Antonio, Cuero, Robstown and McAllen.
