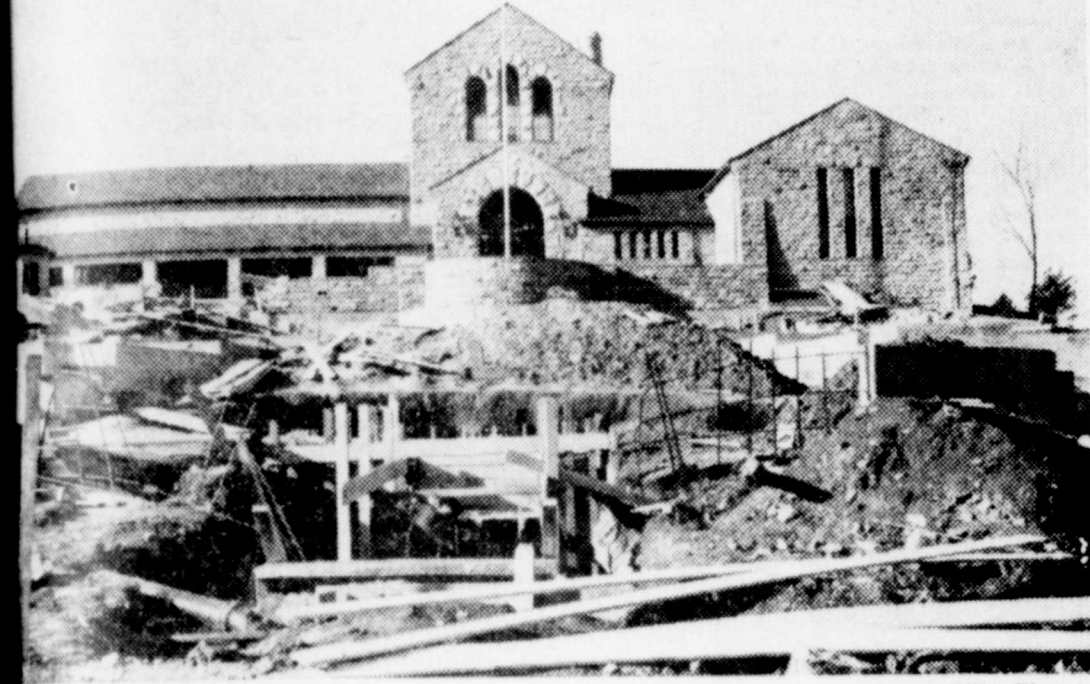

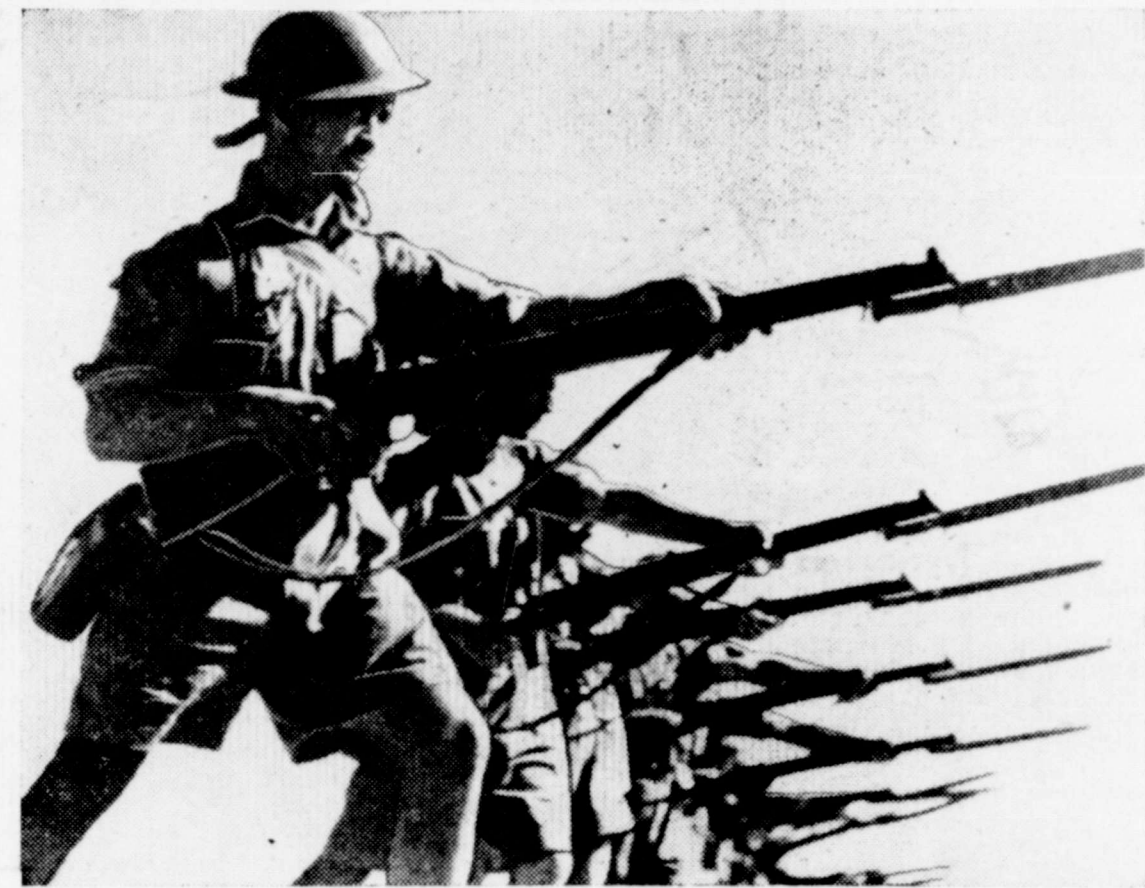

MAYOR BERRY WITHDRAWS FROM RACE

G. P. Mitcham Offered For Election as Successor

Mayor J. T. Berry today announced that he is withdrawing from the race for re-election in the April 1 municipal general election. Mr. Berry, who is serving his fourth consecutive term as mayor after having been commissioner for one term, announced his decision to retire after 10 years of public service, in the following statement: "Mr. G. P. Mitcham came to me like a man today and discussed the city situation and told me that he has been urged to run for election as mayor but that he would not oppose me in the election. He said that if the people want him to take the office and if he is elected he is confident that some solution to the city debt problem can be worked out, but that he would not run as an opposition candidate. Not Just a Job "I do not consider that this mayor's job is just a job for some one. It is a serious public task and the man who holds it has serious responsibilities, as I have learned in the 10 years that I have served the people of Cisco. "I have therefore come to the conclusion that if Mr. Mitcham believes that some progress can be made in the settlement of the city affairs, I certainly do not intend to place myself in the way of accomplishing something for the good of Cisco and I am therefore willing to withdraw from the race for mayor of Cisco, Texas. "I certainly appreciate the support which the good people of Cisco have given me. I appreciate the attitude of Mr. Mitcham and the way he came and talked the matter over with me. "So I am announcing that I am withdrawing from the race for mayor. "I sincerely hope that under the next administration the good work that has been done will be carried on and that there can be harmony and cooperation in the building of our town. Through Trying Period "Mr. Berry thus announced his retirement after a decade of public service during the most critical period in the history of Cisco, a period during which great strides have been made toward the solution of some of the most difficult problems that have ever faced a community. Under his leadership the city debt has been scaled down to one-fourth of its total. Progress has been made in further reducing this obligation to a point where it will cease to be a burden on the community and the tax-payers. Economies of operation have been placed in effect which have reduced the operating expenses. Valuations have been adjusted, efficiency of the municipal machinery has been increased, and municipal assets have been added to improve the public services and increase the value of the community as a place of residence. A modern city water treatment plant has been built, streets are being repaved, a farm market building is being provided, many WPA projects to give employment to Cisco people have been carried out and other programs of city development were realized. Has Distinction "Mr. Berry's tenure of office during the last 10 years has been marked with overwhelming local support. In no campaign that he has made has he actively solicited support, merely placing his name before the people and letting the voters decide on his record. He retires from office with the distinction of leaving it with as many friends and well-wishers as when he first was elected and the sincere appreciation of the community for the great service he has rendered. FIRST REAL STRIFE OVER TRUCK LIMIT

AUSTIN, Feb. 20 (Spc).—First real strife of the legislature has resulted over the truck load limit situation and it's a battle to the finish with no holds barred. On the surface, it's a battle between trucking interests, which 10 years ago were put under a 7,000 pound net load limitation, and the railroads which espoused that restrictive statute.

The fight, however, has brought into its sweep this year an increased number of principals. The trucks are not going it alone. To the list of those who have pleaded their cause for more liberal treatment have been added new allies, notably the interior cotton compress interests. When the law was enacted originally, the interior compresses fought valiantly on the side of the railroads.

But when the law was enacted, it has been recalled in debates, nearly two million bales of cotton were transported during a five months period over two or three highways converging at the port of Houston. There was a wave of indignation throughout the state at the exhibition of cotton clogged highways.

Agriculturists Active

Cattle and sheep raisers, through their state organizations, and the Dirt Farmers congress have turned all out in their aid to the battle for the weight formula statute which in its present form would legalize a gross truck weight of around 56,000 pounds. The cattle raisers have obtained expressions from the United States department of agriculture that the 7,000 pound limit in Texas constitutes a trade barrier that is injuring Texas producers in their association with other states.

The pending bills in both senate and house proposing a uniform formula for figuring weight limits have suffered somewhat from the designation "scientific bill." Proponents of the measure, however, have persistently pointed out that it calls for a simple application of multiplication according to a plan that has been generally adopted by highway officials' organizations, highway user's conferences and others.

Under the formula proposed, the lawful gross weight should be a coefficient agreed upon (700 is a recommended figure) multiplied by the distance between the first and last axles in feet plus 40. For a 30 feet length the weight limit would be 30 plus 40, equaling 70, multiplied by 700, which would amount to 49,000 pounds.

Railroads Fight On

The railroads are fighting on with no show of lessening their resistance. It is generally agreed that they would accept an increase to 10,000, 14,000 or even more for a continuance of the net weight limitation. Against this the advocates of a uniform basis gross weight statute are adamant and all factions seem in accord in

the stand for, complete liberalization or nothing.

In the debates already underway in the House and due to begin in the senate shortly, much will be made of the issue of gross weights and distributed loads all against the present net weight without regard to load distribution. Among all of the 48 states, only Texas with 7,000 pounds and Louisiana with 20,000 have net weight limits and advocates of the liberal gross weight statute say that the Louisiana limit would be as unsatisfactory as the existing law. Bills providing for simple increases to 10,000, 15,000 and 20,000 pounds have been introduced.

Cisco Hatchery Is Second in Fish Production

AUSTIN, Feb. 20 (Spc).—Texas anglers will have a chance to catch the survivors of 7,454,962 fish in lakes and streams of the state. That is the total number raised in the fish hatcheries of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster commission, the executive secretary announced today after receiving a final report from the hatcheries by the chief aquatic biologist of the department. Improved methods of fish production along scientific lines enable the game department to show an increase of 2,139,201 fish distributed in 1940, a gain of 36 1-2 per cent over 1939, when 5,115,761 fish were distributed.

National Hereford Show Heads State Fair's Livestock

DALLAS, Feb. 17 (Spc).—For the third consecutive year, the National Hereford Show will feature the growing livestock exhibit of the State Fair of Texas, it has been announced here by Frank P. Holland, director in charge of livestock. Premiums have been increased for this breed of cattle and the record-breaking sum of \$30,000 will be offered, the largest amount of premium money ever offered by a fair for one livestock classification.

This will also be the first time that the National Hereford show has been held in the same city for three consecutive years. The increase in premiums and distribution of the awards will bring many additional animals to the 1941 livestock show, John Henry Dean, superintendent of the National Hereford show has said. Mr. Dean said that more than 800 animals were shown in 1940, and that early indications pointed to more than 1,000 prize herefords in the 1941 show.

Harry L. Seay, president of the State Fair of Texas, and Roy Ruppard, secretary, are now at work on plans to enlarge practically every department of the livestock show, and the prediction is that the 1941 livestock show will be one of the largest shows of its kind ever held in America.

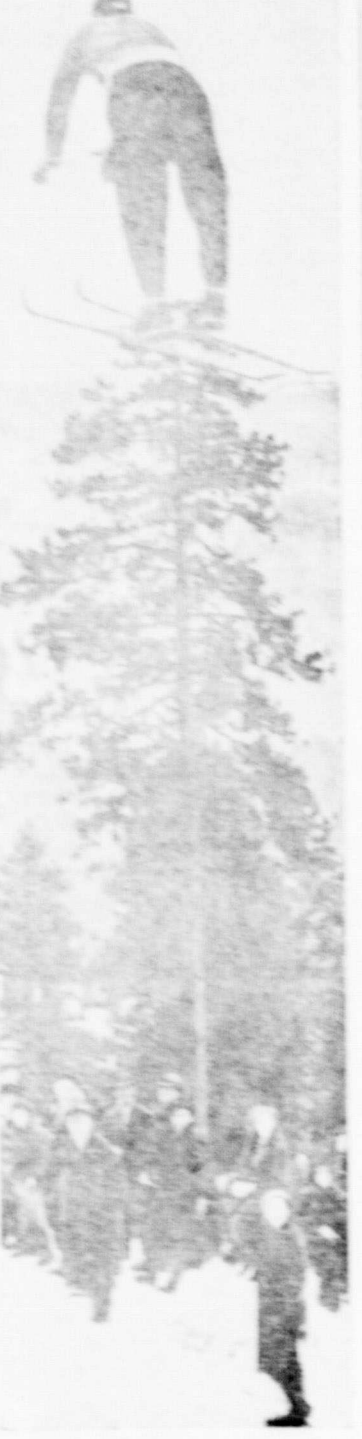

TAX BILL BY LEGISLATURE IS SAFE BET

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—There is a chilly sort of stillness in the legislative atmosphere here. It may portend some hours of agony for the legislative and/or the executive branches of the government. Most assuredly it is pointing the way to uneasiness of spirit in the bosoms of the taxpayers of Texas. That uneasiness of spirit is reflected in the perfect mirror of the faces of those men who represent business and industry. Furrowed brows and questioning eyes are badges of identification in Austin now. This legislature got underway in an air of expectant tension. There was so much of new blood in both chambers that no one knew for certain what might happen—and everyone wondered. There were those who came to believe fairly early conversation and frugality were to be watchwords of the session. There was a curious calm permeating the whole legislative atmosphere that had oldsters puzzled and mumbling in their beards—and that mumbling has grown almost into rumbling. It may break out into a chant with the refrain "Please pass the aspirin, Pappy—and add a slug of sleeping potion."

Showdown Is Near

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel has won praise as a radio actor, as a humanitarian, now is winning praise as a skillful politician. Has anyone thought of nominating him for a place as head football coach because of his ability to devise surprise and trick plays? At least twice in late weeks he has set the legislature and everyone else nearly back on well worn heels with surprise moves. Nobody will admit to having been in on the play when the governor sent up a message recommending emergency consideration and passage of a 14,000-pound truck load limit act. Although the same message advocated subsequent passage of a bill raising the truck load limit to a much higher figure based on rules of safety, its net effect has been to leave the representatives of interests favoring the standard trucking law wearing pained expressions. Now the truck fight is overshadowed by the impending showdown on Governor O'Daniel's most recent message submitting as an emergency proposal to appropriate \$26,800,000 for paying all social security obligations out of that huge grab-bag. It is a fantastic thought that this legislature that

apparently was bent on a course of complete frugality should be on the verge of such a spending spree, but the way is wide open. It could very well result that before the next week-end all there will repose on the governors' desk a bill providing an appropriation of nearly twenty-seven million dollars from a fund that already is depleted and nearly thirty million dollars behind commitments. House May Be Battleground

The big appropriation bill is liable to come bounding out of the senate early in the week unless the wondrous and doubt that exercises senators and representatives alike causes a reversal in convictions that are now apparent. In the house a stiff battle impends. A new struggle as bitter as that which was waged around Senate Joint Resolution No. 12 two years ago may result—and it may become as politically important. House members who staved off adoption of the famous constitutional amendment resolution are likely to lead the fight against the \$26,800,000 bill in a real test of strength in that body. Until this fight is out of the way, attention may be distracted from the business of devising a tax bill to present to the people of Texas. The house committee, however, will be grinding away. It is a pretty safe bet that whatever amount may be appropriated from a fund that is more than empty, a tax bill will be laid on the governor's desk some fine morning.

Chemical May Lengthen Life

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. (AP)—A chemical—sodium arsenite—which might increase man's life span years had been described by Dr. William Morris Salomon, professor of biochemistry at the University of Pittsburgh. "On the basis of what is done with rabbits," he said, "I believe we can have come to the conclusion if we can do the same for man, he can live a normal life until the age of 100. A waxy material, called cholesterol, which would deposit on the arteries, and there is a relation between age and the amount of cholesterol. Much experimental work has been done with chemical called sodium arsenite, which would deposit cholesterol without harming the body."
