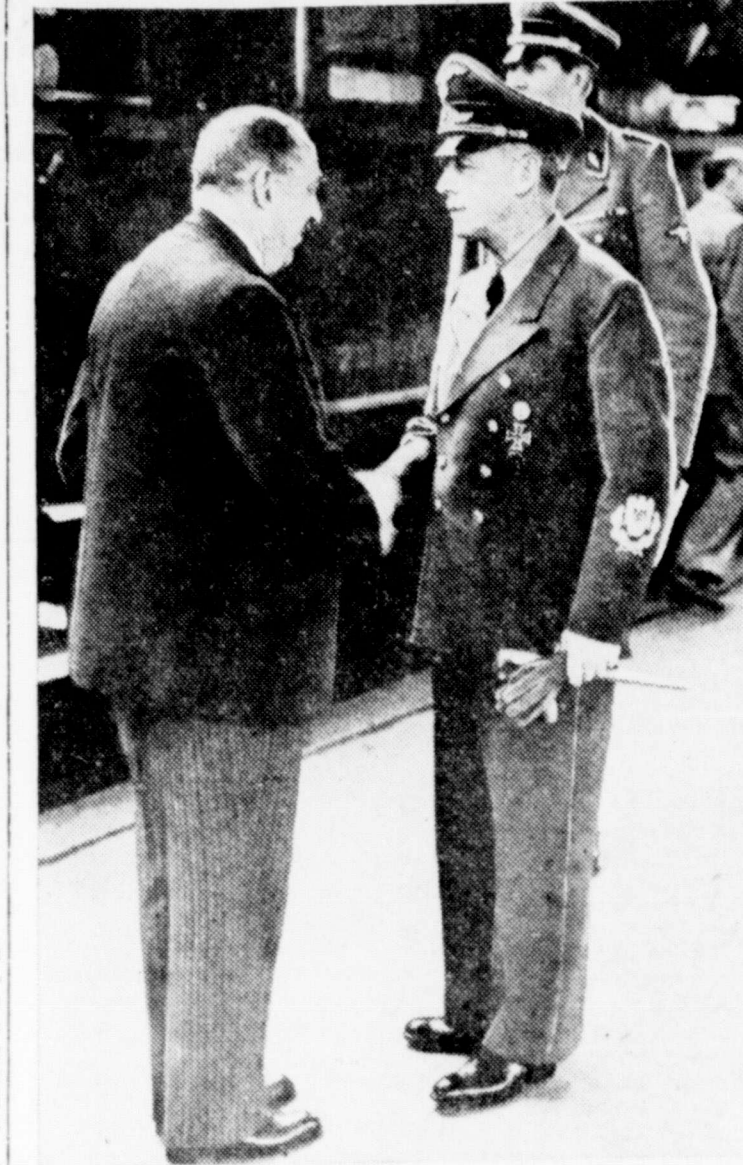

High Wage Rates in Petroleum Refining

Highest average hourly entrance pay rate for common laborers in any of 16 manufacturing industries surveyed is found in petroleum refining, it is reported in the U. S. department of labor's "Monthly Labor Review." The average for petroleum refining, 63.6 cents an hour, was 13.8 cents above the 16-industry average of 49.8 cents an hour.

The report, dated July, 1940, indicates that petroleum refining led not only in the general average, but in every section studied. Within the northern and western region, where the average was 56 cents an hour, petroleum refining averaged 67.4 cents. In the south and southwestern region, where the average was 35.5 cents an hour, petroleum refining averaged 57.9 cents an hour.

A survey of 20 industries revealed that in the northern and western region the petroleum refining industry stood alone in paying virtually all common laborers 40 cents or more per hour. In the south and southwestern region petroleum refining had the highest concentration in the upper brackets, more than 98 per

cent of common laborers receiving entrance pay of 40 cents or more per hour.

Although land in the U. S., according to the 1930 census reported a 3.1 per cent increase in the number of acres in 1930. The new total is compared with 6,812,300 and 6,288,648 in 1930.

There are 57,999 drug stores in the U. S., according to the 1935 census, and their annual receipts total \$1,562,438,000.

The 1940 census reported 856 gasoline filling stations in the U. S., compared with 1935.

There are 106,991 clothing stores in the U. S., according to the 1935 census.

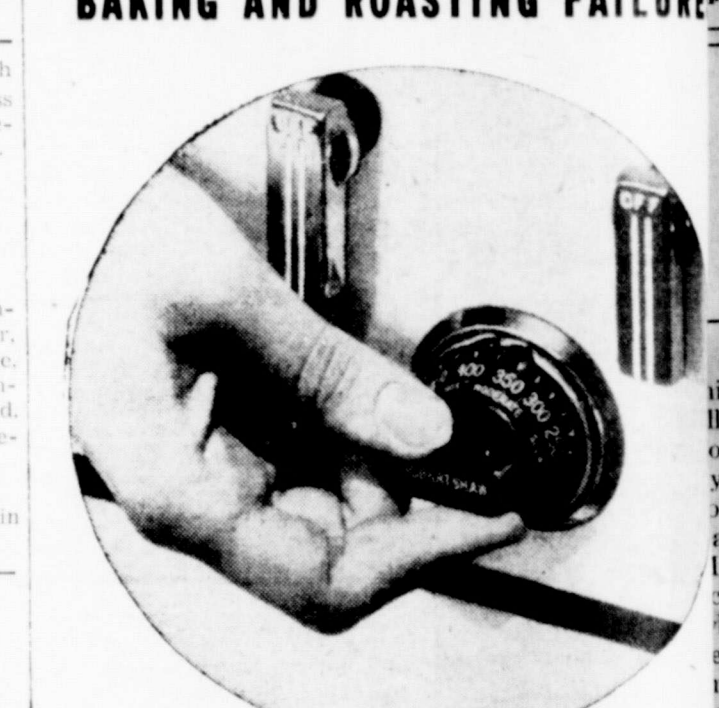

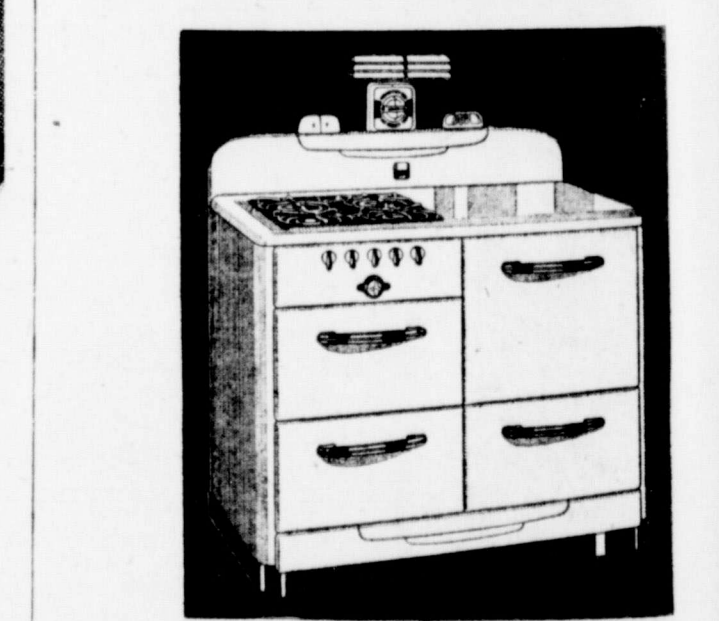
