DISRESPECT FOR LAW TOLD **GRAND JURY**

Recommendations to Improve Situation Urged by Judge

Calling attention to various laws on the statute books of the state to which public indifference has caused widespread violations, Judge B. W. Patterson of the 88th district court, suggested that the newly convened grand jury investigate and make recommendations for amendment of repeal of these laws which would cure the disrespect for government inherent in the situation.

Judge Patterson mentioned par ticularly the so-called Sunday "blue laws" and the state lottery law which he said are being generally violated by the citizens and

business men. "I doubt," said Judge Patterson, "that if indictments were found or complaints filed for the violation of such laws, seldom if ever would there be convictions by our juries."
