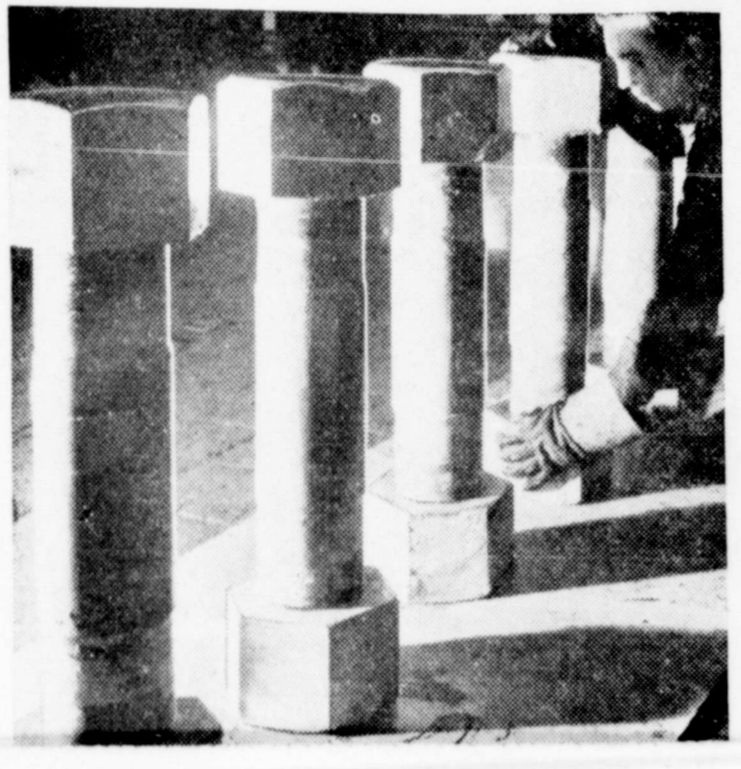

#### Commodity Prices Soar to New High

CHICAGO, March 27. (AP)—Butter, eggs, wheat and in some cases other commodities—soared to new high prices here Wednesday.

Heavy buying benefited the mercantile exchange as much as a cent or more per dozen. Butter futures sold above 23 cents, and egg futures sold above 23 cents.

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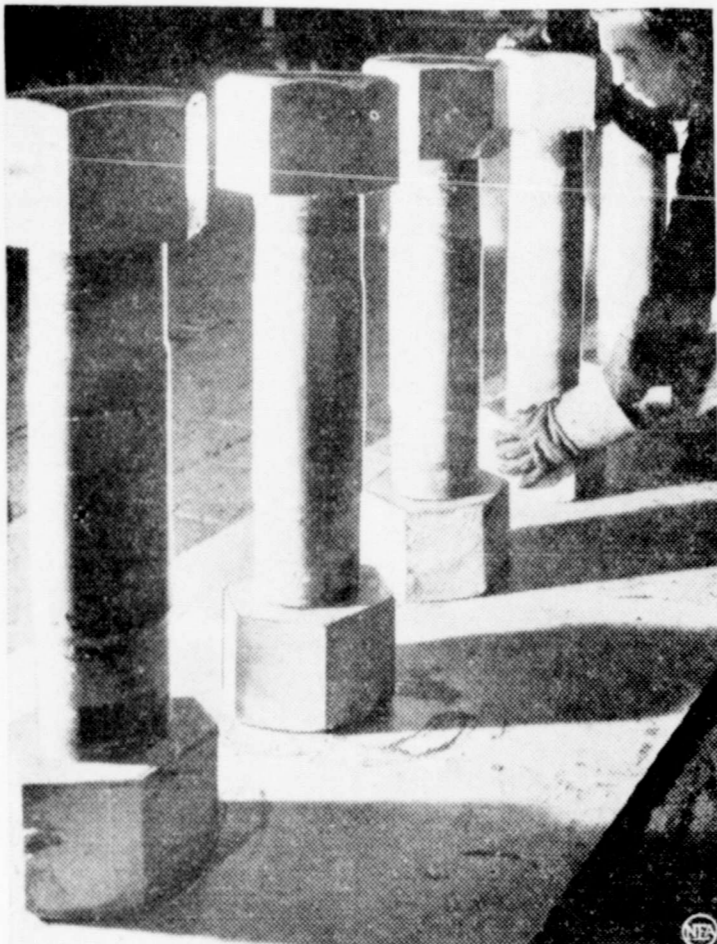

## YUGOSLAVIA STILL SILENT ABOUT PACT

### Nazi Troops Move to Border as Berlin Demands Attitude

The intentions of the new Yugoslavian government with respect to Yugoslavian-Axis relations remained a secret today while large Nazi troop movements were in motion toward the country's border with Bulgaria.

Berlin was said to have demanded an immediate assurance that the pact signed by the deposed government of Prince Paul Tuesday would be respected and to be furious that the Yugoslavian cabinet had not made known its position on the pact in its original announcement.

The vast German army of occupation in Bulgaria was in motion today, while 1,200 defiant Yugoslavs were ready for battle after overthrowing the regency government that had bowed to the axis.

Thus the long expected Balkan war involving five or more nations appeared imminent.

Dispatches from Sofia, Bulgaria, said the Nazi army which had been moving steadily southward to the Greek and Turkish borders now had shifted to the west.

Those reports followed sensational ones from Belgrade, the Yugoslav capital, where cabinet ministers who had signed with the axis were jailed in a bloodless revolution by army leaders headed by the tough old Serbian patriot, Gen. Dusan Simovic, air corps chief.

The regent Prince Paul was among those imprisoned, and the 17-year-old King Peter II was given full sovereignty amid wild rejoicing by the people.

Knowing the consequences of defying the axis by overthrowing the capitulation government, General Simovic had ordered Yugoslav troops to battle stations and stalled off the angered German ambassador who demanded an immediate explanation.

Yugoslavs demonstrating wildly in their capital and elsewhere clamored for war against the Italo-German combine, beat to the point of death at least one German attaché, and nearly killed a Swedish minister who made the mistake of speaking German.

They smashed offices of the German and Italian tourist agencies, carried caricatures of Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, and proudly displayed Greek, British and American flags.

"Tell them in Washington and London this is how we really feel," they shouted at every American or Briton they saw.

Hundreds gathered before the American embassy and vented their anti-axis feelings. The American minister was expected to deliver today President Roosevelt's assurances that U. S. aid would be given Yugoslavia if she sought to resist aggression.

German nationals went into hiding or fled the country, officially advised by their embassy to do so.

Greek diplomats jubilantly declared that even with a part of the Yugoslav army to assist them in the west, their troops could rout the Italians from Albania in three weeks. Then, they said, with the British aid already in Greece, the three nations could present a phalanx of 2,200,000 tough troops against the axis.

Yugoslavia is almost ringed with axis troops—Italians in Albania to the north, and Bulgaria to the east. The southern part of the country affords natural mountainous defenses.

## BURKETT SAYS Oil Comm'n Bill HB 322 'HOT CHECK' BILL

AUSTIN, March 28 (Sp)—The smacking down by a vote of 86 to 57 of the bill to set up a new appointive gas and oil regulatory body was the outstanding surprise of this legislature that has not been without unanticipated and startling results. Moreover, the house opponents working, it was manifest in close concert with the railroad commission, took their revenge the bold way by striking the bill's enacting clause.

In many respects the oil and gas commission fight has been the mystery of the session. A little group of oil men and their attorneys, acting under the direction generally of former State Senator Clint Small had been plugging away since the session began. They made little fuss but when the house began work on Monday and suspended rules to take up the bill of Houston McMurry, they believed confidently that they had a safe margin to engross the measure. The noses had been counted.

stead of the governor's proposal to take twenty-six million eight hundred twenty thousand (\$26,820,000) dollars out of the general revenue fund for the purpose of paying old age pensions. The general revenue fund is now in the red to the extent of a little over twenty-five million (\$25,000,000) dollars. Every individual in this state who draws his salary out of this fund is forced to discount his check. If the \$26,820,000 appropriation advocated by the governor passes, it will simply mean that all checks issued on this fund will be discounted even more than they are now. The result would be that the old age pension re-

Caudle, vocational agriculture teacher here, and publicity has been given it throughout the section in an effort to contact as many interested citizens as possible. A large attendance is expected.

The hearing will be held on the roof garden of the Laguna hotel. Rep. Omar Burkett and Rep. Lewis Crossley were instrumental in bringing the hearing to Cisco. From here the group will go to Lubbock for the sixth of the series.

There are people today who trust in science blindly, almost as our forefathers trusted in God. Faith like that, by the way, even in science, is not scientific.

But even science requires a sort of faith at bottom--faith that the truth is discoverable, and that it is worth discovering. That faith has been shaken in these days, as the Rockefeller Foundation admits in its review of its 1940 activities.

SCIENCE has placed powerful tools in the hands of men. But of what use are they if they are used merely for man's enslavement? If the German dye industry produced sulfanilamide, most amazing of modern modern medical discoveries, it also produced mustard gas. If deep principles of physics are used to point a 500-ton telescope at a hitherto unknown star, they are used to

Science is swell, and we're all for it. But science is not everything. Is man so great that he can afford to discard anything he can achieve in faith, in morals, or in science? Surely, the fault is not with any of these, but with the fact that man has not yet perfectly developed them.

boy king who rode a white horse in a parade through the streets. The new Foreign Minister Montebello Ninic gave only a 6-minute audience to the German minister demanding the new government's attitude to the axis pact signed by the old regime Tuesday in Vienna.

"I can't tell you that yet," Ninic told him.

Neutral sources said this was official "hedging," playing for time to get the country on a complete war footing for an expected German smash.

Prime Minister Churchill of Britain promised the resisting nation aid. He said:

"The British empire and its allies will make common cause with the Yugoslav nation and we will continue to march and strive together until complete victory is won."

Fulfillment of at least part of the second condition--that King Peter ask for help and that the Germans make a hostile move at Yugoslavia--seemed very near.

Diplomats in the southeast said that German troops were almost certain to march into Yugoslavia at the moment that Peter's government formally signaled what already had been strongly intimated--a repudiation of the axis pact which had been reluctantly signed only last Tuesday.

The Germans--and the British exulted at the great embarrassment caused them at the very moment when the Japanese Foreign Minister Matsuoka was in Berlin to talk of the "new order" with Hitler--quickly took the line that, after all, complete information was still lacking as to this apparent upset of all their long diplo-

Berlin nevertheless directed Belgrade to explain at once how Yugoslavia's enlistment in the axis was going to be affected by the change in the government. The United States sent a message to Peter's associates saying that the ouster of the pro-axis regime was a matter of self-congratulation to every liberty-loving man and woman and that President Roosevelt had power under the lease-lend act to give effective material assistance to nations seeking to preserve their independence against aggression.

Tying in closely with this great change of atmosphere in the Balkans were British announcements that General Sir Archibald P. Wavell's imperial armies of Africa had taken Cheren in Italian Eritrea and Harar in Italian Ethiopia.

HOLD EVERYTHING... THAT BEAUTIFUL DREAM OF DEFENSE BOOM ENDING WPA IS A DREAM

WASHINGTON--Any hope you may have had that the defense program, by creating a lot of new jobs, would wipe out WPA, now seems rather remote.

And with that admission, you begin to wonder just what there may be to the Beautiful Dreamer WPA. Unto Me they say that we or anyone else can ever spend our way back to prosperity, even when we spend for such ephemeral stuff as battleships and bullets, made to be destroyed.

It's simply not in the cards. In the first place, the President has transmitted to Congress the National Resources Planning Board recommendation for a six-year public works program to aid post-war stabilization, and the WPA, without waiting for congressional action, has already set up a new unit to start making plans to put in a reservoir to be drawn on when and as the defense effort collapses. These two moves indicate the administration has no thought of folding up relief work agencies.

Frank A. March, who has been director of the project control division of WPA in Washington, has been named national director of the new long-range planning unit, and while there has not been time to prepare a detailed program, there are indications that it will consist mainly of super highways, swimming pools, sewers and such. So those are the things we may be spending for when national defense is over.

In the second place, defense spending is not spread evenly, like soft butter on the national breadline. The butter knife was wiped off on the crusts, with the result that the old industrial east and the new industrial west and

the Buffalo to Milwaukee area get biggest jobs of government money. And the center of the gets comparatively none.

Putting it statistically, 80 percent of the defense contracts thus far have been awarded to areas representing only 20 percent of WPA employment.

Inting it to other way round, 80 percent of the people on WPA in areas which get only 20 percent of the contracts. Four out of five don't have much chance of getting off WPA, unless some way can be found to spread out the defense effort, or until the defense effort, the general prosperity to a level that the non-defense are carried along in a flood of recovery.

The idea of moving work from the areas which need into the areas which have a defense boom is generally for naught. Past experience has shown that big migrations of labor have been disastrous failures unless carefully prepared for, and therefore, it isn't the relief worker who is wanted in the defense industries where highly skilled labor shortage is felt sufficiently to make employers say Ouch!

Another and most important factor is that there are today 10 million workmen there ever before, more people than there has been in 10 years. It has been a net increase of 8 million potential job holders, and figure you can balance against the 6 million people unemployed.

WPA cannot and must not be written off as a total loss of the defense effort. It was only a few years ago, when Congress in the big-hearted mood to spend millions for relief but not a cent for defense, that WPA given projects like building military airfields and naval shipyards and machine shops. And today WPA labor has completed or working on no less than 1200 defense projects costing in all \$2 billion. In less than six years WPA has built or improved 15,000 buildings for army and navy, 1600 new airport buildings.
