

LONDON, March 27 (AP)—Unchallenged, a man wearing a German army officer's uniform and trappings strolled London streets for hours Tuesday, looked over busy Scotland Yard and peered through Buckingham palace's fences.

British Beat Off U-Boat Attacks

LONDON, March 27 (AP)—British vessels shepherding convoys through the North sea beat off a series of night attacks by German torpedo boats and shot down a German plane with a hit full in the nose, the admiralty announced Wednesday night.

The admiralty said naval light forces hit several of the speedy E-boats and that it was probable some were lost.

The plane was shot down when it made a daylight attack on a convoy guarded by the destroyer Versatile. No British damage was reported.

Firm Faith in Love and Truth May Yet Rid Darkened World of Hate, Violence

Text: Luke 24:36-53

WE think of the resurrection of Jesus as the supreme miracle of Christian history, but it must always be associated with a corresponding and accompanying miracle, that of the restoration of the faith and vision of the disciples.

The sudden arrest and trial and crucifixion of Jesus had plunged them all not only into sorrow and gloom, but into despair. The allegiance to Jesus had never been entirely dissociated from the belief that He was going to set up an earthly kingdom in which they would have prominence and power.

Even to the very last, in spite of the words in which Jesus sought to warn them of the tragic events that were impending, they held to this belief. The disappointment of that belief may have had much to do with the temporary defection of Peter when three times he denied His Lord. That temporary defection was slight in comparison with the apparent disappointment when they saw their Master led away to be crucified, with no power intervening to save Him.

A STRANGE sense of wonderment and loyalty persisted, in spite of their disappointment.

The two disciples who walked in sadness on the way to Emmaus indicated something of this regretful longing when they said, "We trusted that it would be He who would redeem Israel." But even those words of sad longing expressed something that they realized was gone.

Then suddenly, what a change took place! There came the stories of those who had seen

the risen Lord, of the women at the tomb, of other appearances, and now the strange figure who joined the two sad travelers on the walk to Emmaus and who conversed so freely and sympathetically with them concerning the events that had brought them to the verge of despair.

Words cannot begin to express the strangeness and power of the experience as their Companion was made known to them in the breaking of bread, and they realized that they had been walking and talking with their risen Lord.

THESE are difficult things to understand. They bring us into a world of mystery that is beyond our ordinary experiences and comprehension. Yet, how otherwise can one account for this miracle that happened in the lives of the disciples, as despair gave way to hope and disappointment vanished under new faith?

The commission that Jesus gave to His disciples to go forth and teach, making disciples of all nations, who have had little power if it had not been for these experiences that revived all the faith and enthusiasm and courage with which the men whom Jesus called to follow Him had in the first place left their nets, and government jobs, and other occupations, to give to Him their full allegiance. With this is the miracle of this religion, first manifested by a small group of earnest men, which has become our worldwide Christianity.

What miracles the world may yet see if we hold firm to our faith in love and truth, at a time when hate and violence again seem to have conquered and plunged the world in darkness.
