



Winners of today's semifinal games will play for the state championship at 11 a.m. Saturday. Coach Ken Cleveland's awesome bunch earned their tickets to Austin by blasting Canutillo 93-47 and Abernathy 78-55 in the Region I-AAA Tournament Friday and Saturday in Lubbock. So far, no team has come

within 20 points of them in the playoffs. The Bobcats are carrying a lot of momentum into the state classic. They're the only unbeaten schoolboy team of any class; they have four starters plus the sixth and seventh men back from last year's championship team; they've been ranked No. 1 in the state since the opening tipoff of the season.

When any opponent ponders those numbers, the intimidation factor alone could be worth points on the scoreboard for the Bobcats, who are ranked as odds-on favorites going into the tourney.

The Bobcats got a big sendoff Tuesday morning when hundreds of fans gathered at the Expo Building for a sendoff breakfast, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

The team left via chartered bus from the Expo Building at 8:30 a.m., and stopped in Coleman for a 90-minute workout en route to Austin. They were allotted a half-hour workout Wednesday afternoon in the Super Drum.

The team is staying at the Chariot Inn, 7300 N. Interstate 35. Although Dimmitt basketball crowds are

always big, the number of fans following the Bobcats to Austin this year may be the biggest ever. Dimmitt High School received 400 tickets for the first tournament game at mid-morning to the state tourney as dads and uncles.

Dimmitt's Bobcats are back in Austin, Monday, and they were all gone within 24

"I'm sure I could have sold 100 more easily," Administrative Secretary Lucille Dollar said. "This is twice as many as we sold in advance last year.'

Lindale, the Bobcats' first-round opponent, play in the Super Drum on the UT-Austin is from District 15, in East Texas. Lindale is 13

"They're big, and they play a running The other two Class AAA teams in the state game," Coach Cleveland reported. "Their tourney are Columbus (31-4) and Van Vleck starters are 6-6, 6-5, two 6-1's and a 6-0 kid. They've won their last 15 games.'

Lindale captured the Region II championship with a 49-47 win over Graham and a 66-63

victory over New Boston. 'They hit 21 of 24 free throws in the second half against New Boston," Cleveland noted.

Lindale and Dimmitt play similar styles of basketball.

'Their coach was at Coahoma when we beat them in regional a few years ago, so he knows what kind of game we play," Cleveland said. 'And his team plays about the same style of ball that we do. They run a full-court press."

The other two Class AAA teams in the state tourney, Columbus of Region III and Van Vleck of Region IV, come from adjoining districts -24 and 25. The two districts are evidently strong, because both Columbus and Van Vleck like Dimmitt — defeated teams from their own districts in their regional championship

This is Dimmitt High School's 11th appearance in the state boys' tournament, in a basketball tradition dating back to 1944. The 1982 Bobcats are the sixth Cleveland-coached team to go to state, and they're hoping for Dimmitt's third state crown in eight years.

Dimmitt has captured the big prize three times - in 1952, 1975 and last year. The 1952 Bobcats did a one-in-a-million thing - they not only won the state championship, but had an undefeated season.

Probably no one would like to see the 1982 Bobcats match that record more than some of those 1952 team members who are now going

# City postpones action

Claiming to have not heard a word previously about the city's proposed changes in ordinances governing mobile homes in the city, several owners of mobile homes and mobile home parks appeared at the Monday night meeting of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen to request a postponement so that they could proposals and present a few

alternate suggestions. Aldermen pointed out that the proposals have been under consideration for several months, with notices being posted in the News and on the

local radio station. 'This whole process mainly began when notice was sent out in October with tax statements, saying that the City Zoning Commission would begin a series of hearings on mobile homes and their placement," Mayor R. L. Fleming

Mobile home park owner Brenda Andrews replied that she thought the proposals were limited to possible expansion of areas allowing mobile home placement.

On Dec. 13, Zoning Commission Chairman Roger Malone announced that the zoners had received too many protests on further expansion to pursue the matter. He said they felt it would be more beneficial at that time to strengthen existing regulations in the areas already allowing mobile homes before trying to expand those

Interested parties were continually invited to attend the bi-monthly sessions of the Zoning Commission as they carved out the new and amended ordinances that were finally presented to the Board of Aldermen at their Jan. 17 meeting.

Two weeks notice had to be posted and published even before the board could consider the proposals, again at a public hearing.

Four people showed up at that hearing, mainly concerned about how the new ordinances would affect pre-existing structures.

The main impact the proposed ordinance would have on mobile homes or parks already in existence is the requirements for tie-down and skirting. Park owners would also be required to submit a rough-draft sketch of their park's layout, showing the location of all utility pipes and

Remaining provisions of the ordinance would only affect homes moved in or parks established after the ordinance goes into effect.

Mobile home owners will have 60 days to get structures properly tied down and skirted, with an additional 30 day grace period in case of bad weather or other difficul-

Homes moved in after the ordinance is passed, will be allowed 10 days for tie-down and 60 days for skirting.

At Monday's meeting the aldermen considered three amendments to the proposed ordinance, but agreed to postpone further action on the matter until the March 21 meeting of the board. At that suggestions offered, before deciding whether to pass the ordinance.

Mobile park owner Ronald Rickert told the board that he did not read the paper or listen to the radio and so had not heard anything about the proposals.

"I think all these regulations are a violation of my rights as a property holder,' Rickert said. He added that he would not submit a sketch of his property, calling it an invasion of privacy.

Penalties under the ordinance include a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$200 per violation of any part of the ordinance.

Park owner Randall Craig apologized to the board for not knowing about the matter, and asked for a copy of the proposals for the owners to examine and make suggestions for changes.

The final proposals agreed upon at the next meeting of the board of aldermen must be approved on two separate readings, followed by two subsequent publications in the newspaper, at which time they will automatically go into effect.

In the second hearing on proposals for use of city Revenue Sharing funds, the board agreed to distribute \$8,600 to various organizations, and let the remainder of the expected \$106,000 total be used for the seal coating project recommended by city engineers McMorries and Associates.

The Mental Health/Mental Retardation center will be allowed the \$3,600 requested, \$2,500 will go to the Dimmitt Senior Citizens, \$2,000 will go to the Castro County Museum Association and \$500 will go to the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce.

The request from Rhoads Memorial Library, as well as from the various city departments and the fire department, will be handled under the regular city general budget, the board decided.

McMorries and Associates estimated the cost of the needed seal coating at \$121,-

"That should pretty well put the city streets back into good repair," Bill McMorries told the board, adding that additional work would have to be done the following year.

The board agreed to the repairs and authorized Mc-Morries to draw up specifica-

tions and let bids on the project for the April 4 meeting of the board.

Bids on the repair project at the city airport were opened. with the lowest bid submitted by Hi Plains Paving of Plainview with a total bid of \$71,322.05 for seal coating the runway, turn arounds. aprons, and the taxiway ex-30'-wide taxiway will be constructed on the north end of the runway.

Specifications called for rock pre-coated with asphalt to make better adherence, as well as thorough rolling of the

finished surface. Other bids were received from Jake Diel of Hereford for \$71,370.44, Lipham Construction of Asperment for \$89,-691.55, and Ellison Dozer Co. of Aspermont for \$102,200.43.

The bids will be examined by the city engineers to make sure as specifications were met, and they will then be forwarded to the Texas Aeronautics Commission, which is funding 75% of the project, with the city picking up the

The board renewed designation of Dr. B. D. Murphy as the City Health Officer for the current term.

#### Bill pending to help with street repairs

The Texas Municipal League recently released a list showing the amounts that area cities would receive upon passage of a bill, now pending before the state legislature, to establish a state-funded program to help repair local streets.

With the passage of the bill, Castro County cities Dimmitt and Hart would receive \$74,400 and \$26,600, respectively, to help with street repairs.

Veterans should review their insurance policies at least annually to insure that the coverage amount is adequate to meet current needs, advises the Waco Veterans Administration Regional

For example, if a veteran purchased a WWI \$10,000 GI term insurance policy when premium probably ran around \$79 annually. However, if that veteran now is 60 years old, the annual premium probably has increased to about \$308 - which is quite an increase. Due to that veteran's age, he may need only enough coverage to take care of burial expenses. Therefore, that veteran may want to consider converting his \$10,000 term insurance to a \$4,000 ordinary life insurance policy. That would result in a reduced annual premium of about \$240, which wouldn't increase later.

**PROVISION** This area of program participation and compliance has drawn several questions in this office. Under this provision, tenants (operators) or sharecroppers must be afforded the opportunity to participate in the program. A landlord must not unfairly require any tenant to make any lease, contract, agreement or understanding in anticipation of participating in the program that would:

1. Force tenant or share cropper to pay landlord or operator any payment earned by them under the program.

2. Change the status of tenants or sharecroppers so as to deprive them of any payment or right they would otherwise have had.

3. Reduce the size of the tenant or sharecropper's producer unit.

4. Increase the rent to be paid by the tenant or decrease the share of the crop or its proceeds to be received by the

sharecropper.
SIGN-UP DEADLINE

March 11 is not many days away and this will be the last day to get signed into either the twenty percent acreage reduction program or the twenty percent acreage reduction and Payment In Kind (PIK). There will not be an extension of time to sign up beyond March 11. So don't wait until the very last few days to sign up. Yes, there are waiting lines now but it is going to take this to assure that we get everyone signed in by March 11.

PIK - BINDING CONTRACTS

On the PIK contract, all signatures including landowners and other producers must be on the contract by March 17. The contracts are binding and no changes can





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# AUCTION AFS is learning, growing experience

the size of Texas with a population of 24 million, Kim Vercueil says she feels that Dimmitt's greatest charm is its "small town atmosphere."

The 19-year-old AFS exchange student from South Africa is in Dimmitt for a year's study and experience, and is staying with the Robert Benton family.

Although she is attending Dimmitt High School as a senior, Kim had already graduated back home and taken six months of college courses.

"After experiencing the independence of college, it has been hard to re-enter being under authority, but the Bentons are really special in that they have been willing to discuss everything," Kim revealed. "Their honesty and openness in talking things through has really helped a

Kim's native language is Africaans, but she also studied 12 years of English in school, as well as German (five years), French (three years), and Zulu (three

"I think language study makes a more interesting person," she stated, adding that "education should include learning about other parts of the world besides your own."

"Academic standards are more difficult back home, and it took me awhile to adjust to the situation here, until I reminded myself that the main purpose of my stay here is not academic but to learn about others and about myself and to grow," she revealed.

"By encountering a differthat I am very South African, and what that means to me,' Kim said.

In talks she gives to various groups she relates that the Dutch were the first to settle in South Africa, coming there in 1652. She tells that her ancestors were among the earliest settlers.

"My family a little later on were the ones to introduce the Jacaranda tree (a tree with brightly colored flowers) to South Africa. Also, my greatgreat-grandfather. Harry Struben, discovered the first gold on the reef (South Africa's greatest gold-producing area)," Kim said. So her roots go deep.

"A lot of people ask me how come I'm not black since I'm from Africa, but the blacks and whites settled in South Africa at about the same time," Kim said, adding, "I think the relations there between blacks and whites are very good. Wherever you are, there will exist a prejudice against somebody else. As the people get better educated, things get better. South Africa is a great country, and the standards and outlook of the people are really great."

Born in Johannesburg, a city of 1.5 million population, Kim lives in one of its sub-

The family has a large home on a seven-acre estate. A swimming pool and riding facilities are included on their property, along with a three to four-acre formal garden.

They also own an 11,000acre farm on the Zimbabwe border about 350 miles from their home. They grow cotton and sunflowers there. The farm includes seven miles of frontage along the Limpopo

Although Kim classes her family as well-off financially, she says that she was taught the value of money at a young

"We are given a set amount of pocket money each month and it has to see you through, or kids get part-time jobs to earn a little extra," she explained.

She says there was a time when she remembers her family "struggling" financially, but what she remembers most about that period is not having much time with her parents because they were so busy trying to make ends

'Happiness doesn't depend on materialistic possessionsalthough they can be an asset! Kids are happy when they have their parents as a person, when they are close and can give of themselves to each other," she stated.

Her parents have both traveled widely, and her father still does, acting as a sort of consultant. He was in the United States in October for a 10-day business trip, and was able to spend the weekend of Oct. 8-10 here in Dimmitt, meeting and visiting with Kim's American family and friends.

"It's really nice that Daddy has some idea of, and can relate to the things I write home about," Kim said. "He's so pleased that I'm in Dimmitt because small towns reflect the American way of life so much better.'

Kim's American family includes parents, Robert and Marty Benton; an older sister, Beth, who is away at college; a younger sister, Becky, who is a junior in high school; and a younger brother, Ben, who is a freshman.

"We all get along so incredibly well. Becky has come to be just about my closest friend here. You know, we confide in each other and all - she's really the sister I never had," Kim related. clared. "I don't like the local attitude that if you date someone once or twice, everyone thinks you're 'married' to that person, and they all get upset if you date someone else. I think this is the time to get to know lots of different guys to see what type of person you like," Kim said. "But I've tried to go along as much as possible, because I think it's important to remember that I'm the one who must change to fit in. To really be happy here I must do as they do. It's not always easy, especially if I disagree. But I just tell myself that differences are not necessarily wrong, they are just differences, and I must accept some things and learn from them."

One different thing Kim has learned to accept is Mexican food - her favorite of the foods she has encountered here.

"At home, my favorite is seafood and fish. We also have Chinese food, as well as Indian food that has so much curry, it'll make you sweat.

"We grow so many varieties of fresh fruits and vegetables at home and we eat more fish and chicken and much less beef than here. Also, frying is not used as much," she related.

Milk and bread purchased fresh each day from European-type shops are a main-stay of the daily diet. Also, the traditional "tea time" at 4 p.m. brings the entire society to a halt, including the

"I was so surprised to see ancakes and waitles served here as a breakfast food. We serve a smaller version at tea time, especially on Sundays," she noted.

Sunday tea time usually also has another ingredient -

"I don't remember a weekend in our home without company," Kim recounted. "Our socializing is family based, whereas here there are a lot more outside activities, including school activities.

'Our home is always open to people - a lot of them from different backgrounds. I think that has helped me in coming here. I love to meet

people and socialize. I have even short distances. even helped conduct entertainments for my father some-

times for his business." Of celebrations, Kim said that South African students don't celebrate their December graduation from high school, because it takes a couple of months after the state-administered final exams to be notified whether one passed. The exam covers three years of material.

"We have a big party for our twenty-first birthday, and send out lots of invitations and receive gifts comparable to your graduation celebration," she revealed, adding that she plans to invite at least 100 people to her party.

Kim is interested in medical studies, but her aptitudes in science and math may lead her more into speech and hearing therapy or research.

She also has talents and interest in the musical field. She plays the piano and the guitar and has a lilting soprano voice.

'There is one radio station back home that would play country and western songs once in a while - so I had there," Kim said.

"I enjoy the country and western music I have heard here, and the different dances I've learned."

Her other interests include writing poetry and songs, stamp collecting, horseback riding, dancing, meeting people, and participating in sports, including swimming, field hockey, tennis and cross

"I had never played basketball before, but I got to be quite a professional bench warmer," she quipped, adding that, "They only let Isabelle (Progin, AFS student from Switzerland) and me play in games (on the JV team) when we were far ahead in score or hopelessly behind. Really, I had a lot of

Kim also likes to take walks. Back home, she often hiked all day along the river on the farm.

"I like time to myself to sort out my thoughts," she

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"At home I had never gone 'parking,' but I'm making up for it now," she said with a giggle. "At home, we usually just go sit out in the garden. When you're younger, your parents have to take you around everywhere, so there's no chance for it, and you can't get your driver's license until you're 18."

Kim feels that kids here are spoiled to an extent, saying that "Things are given to them so easily, they don't always appreciate the value of them. It is really an affluent

Compared to here, many more women in South Africa work outside the home at least part time, but also, most of them have household help.

'Even so, a lot of responsibility would fall on us kids when Mommy would be gone on speaking tours," Kim ex-



Here, Kim attends the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt along with the Bentons. She says she enjoys it and its traditions, saying it is like a big extended family.

"The Dimmitt people are so willing to get involved and give of themselves," Kim observed. "They are so accepting and warm and open towards me."

"I'm afraid it will be different if I ever come back. I'm afraid I won't have the feeling of belonging as I do now. I don't know yet what all I will get from this experience, but I know what I must give. I have to give of myself. It will cost me everything. I'm open to rejection and so much else. She observed that kids here But I also have much to gain, seem to drive everywhere, and I think it is worth it."


