

Cotton Order Payment Stamps Plan Explained

The following announcement regarding the 1941 supplementary program was made this week by Emmett E. Powell, administrative officer of the AAA Eastland:

Under the 1941 supplementary program, recently announced by the secretary of agriculture, cotton order stamp payments will be made at the rates of 10 cents per pound of the 1941 normal yield established for the farm times the acreage of cotton voluntarily reduced. The acreage reduced will be the amount by which the 1941 planted acreage of cotton is below the smaller of the 1941 allotment or the 1940 measured cotton acreage. If a producer had no cotton planted in 1940 he is not eligible to receive the stamps, although a form will have to be signed on the farm if there is a cotton allotment for 1941.

The cotton order stamp payment to be made to any cotton producer on the farm cannot exceed a value of \$25 with respect to any farm (\$50.00 in the case of the operator of a farm operated by two or more tenants or share-

croppers). In no event, however, can a producer's cotton order stamp payments with respect to all farms, wherever located, exceed a total number of cotton order stamps representing a value of \$50. If the acreage reduced is not sufficient to result in a computed farm payment of \$5, no cotton order stamp payment will be made with respect to the farm. Producers eligible to receive cotton order stamp payments will be eligible to receive food and feed production payments. Both the cotton order stamp payments and the food and feed production payments are in addition to, and not in substitution for, any other payments under the program.

"Producers on your farm will not be eligible to participate in cotton order stamp payments and food and feed production payments unless a prescribed form, 'Intention to Participate in the 1941 Supplementary Cotton Program,' is signed by you as operator of the farm and filed in the county office as soon as possible. This form, indicating your intention to participate in the 1941 supplementary cotton program, should be signed at the time committee visit, your community for the purpose of the 1941 farm plan sheet sign-up."

THREE squares and democracy are not the same thing. But the question that demands an answer is this: can democracy exist for long when perhaps a third of the people do not have the squares and the roof? Forty feet of the foundation at one corner of the First National bank building are not the building, but if you removed those forty feet of foundation, the building would no longer be safe.

Economic security, in other words, is not the same thing as democracy, but a democracy which fails consistently to offer conditions in which the vast majority of people have a high degree of economic security is allowing an important corner of its foundations to crumble.

Its foundations and rooms are many—equal political rights, toleration, restricted governmental power, equality of opportunity, no special privileges, freedom of discussion and thought, no permanent class lines, the general underlying feeling deep in every man that he wishes nothing that is not available to other men under the same circumstances. It is greater than merely "three squares a day and a roof." But without those simple elements, it can be ashes in the mouth. That is not because men no longer prize their freedom above mere comfort, but simply because they have come to realize that in our circumstances here in the United States, at least, there is no same reason why they should not have both.

Will In Mass School Event

hundred years of Texas will be dramatically presented by a massed chorus of 1,000 school children in an air spectacle at Chesley field on Saturday, May 2. The program to the schools here, will be in the form of a pageant-musical with costumed groups and chorus singing songs peculiar to a period of the last century. The thread of the story is carried forward by narrators. The spectacle, organized and directed by Miss Vernelle Stinson,

teacher of public school music in the Cisco schools, will be presented as the entertainment for the annual coronation of King Lobo, to whose court will be invited dukes and duchesses representative of various neighboring schools.

Honored guest of the evening, when the program begins at 8 o'clock, will be the author of the pageant-musical, Mrs. Mamie Folsom Wynne of Dallas, chairman of American folk music for the Texas Federation of Music Clubs.

The entertainment will progress from the pre-colonial period, represented by groups of Indian costumes singing songs of these natives, through the colonial, revolutionary, Confederate and periods intervening to the present. The audience will sit in the stands and between them upon the lighted turf of the playing field will be erected the court of the high school king and queen and arranged the theater from which the massed young singers and actors will present their spectacle. Amplifiers will be used, and the arena will be appropriately lighted.

The identity of King Lobo VIII, as the currently reigning monarch will be designated, is yet to be announced. Selection of the youth to receive the honor will be governed by high school faculty members and under the direction of Principal O. L. Stamey.

Invitations are now being sent to schools about Cisco to be represented with dukes and duchesses.

The out-door program, due to be one of the most impressive that has ever been presented under the auspices of the local schools, will be jointly sponsored by the Cisco Lions club.

BAND CONTEST AT ABILENE APRIL 24-26

The band division of the Texas Music Educators association will sponsor the annual band contest for Region Two in Abilene April 24, 25 and 26. It was announced Saturday by Lobo Band Director R. I. Collier.

Region Two, of which Cisco is a part, comprises 38 counties: west to Big Spring, east to Stephenville, north to Crowell and south to Sonora. The bands are classified according to high school enrollment, as follows: Class A, over 750; Class B, 250 to 750; Class C, less than 250; Class D, one year bands; and Class E, junior high school bands. The Cisco band is rated as Class B.

The bands do not play for first, second and third places, but for one, two, three, four and five ratings. In this way there may be more than one band rated in One, and there may not be any. The following terms apply to the ratings: One, superior; two, excellent; three, good; four, fair; and five, poor. For the past four years the Cisco band has been placed in Division I both in playing and marching.

The band this year is composed of 72 members, all of whom are working hard to maintain the high standards set in previous years.

Division I rating, it was pointed out, qualifies a band to enter the national contest in Waco on May 8, 9 and 10, and the members hope to go for the fifth time in as many years.

Plans were made by the band number issued in 1940, the tax assessor-collector said, as only 3,996 paid poll taxes this year, whereas there were more than 7,000 paid last year.

ATC Approves Cisco College as First Class

The Association of Texas Colleges Saturday approved the recommendation of its committee on standards that the Cisco Junior college be classed as a first class junior college.

This is the final step for the college in obtaining full recognition by the senior and junior colleges of Texas. Earlier the school received first class rating from the state department of education.

This recognition means that all credits given by the Cisco college will receive full recognition in all Texas secondary institutions.

Sup. R. N. Cluck attended the meeting of the association when approval was voted Saturday by the entire body. O. L. Stamey, high school principal and dean of the college, and Mr. Cluck, attended the meeting of the committee on standards Friday.

WPA Project Is Approved for Carbon School

A WPA grant of \$31,753 for the construction of a school building for the Carbon Independent school district has been approved. The school district has voted and sold \$37,200 in bonds to pay the district's share of the project cost.

The project calls for the rehabilitation of the existing brick building, construction of additions to the present building, construction of pump houses and installation of water pump, septic tank, disposal field, play grounds, tennis courts, walks, drives, run track and football field, installation of electric, gas, sewer and water lines, grading, sodding and landscaping grounds.

The plant is constructed for a 12-grade school system. The lower floor will accommodate the eight grammar grades to a maximum enrollment of 300 students. The third floor will contain an auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,000.

The firm of Wyatt C. Hedrick, of Fort Worth, has completed the plans for the new school building. Oregon has 60 state parks.

Cisco Youth Writes of Life In U. S. Navy

The following is a letter from W. E. (Billy) Terry, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Terry of Cisco, who for the past year has been enlisted with the United States navy. On enlistment, he trained for a while at the station at San Diego, California, and was later sent to Hawaii. The letter is written from Sydney, Australia.

In previous letters young Terry told his parents that on one watch of the ship, USS Reid, he is fuse-setter on a 5-inch gun, and on another watch he is a machine-gunner. His land gear includes a Browning automatic rifle.

The Australians are surely friendly. They turned out for a three-day holiday when we came. We get to ride street cars free, and everyone you meet wants an autograph and a souvenir. I have given so many autographs that I am beginning to feel important.

The people are all British here and are pretty hard to understand. They pronounce A's like G's, and about every fifth word is "bloody."

We are not going to stay here over two more days. I don't know where we are going or when we'll get there. It's a cinch I can't get any farther away, because I am half way around the world now.

I have surely been seeing the world lately. A lot of sailors stay in the navy 20 years and never cross the equator. I consider myself lucky to have come on this cruise.

Well, I guess I had better close now. I'll write again soon. I hope I am wondering where I'll be when I get a chance to write again.

I have talked to a lot of sailors who have been in battle with the Germans. They can tell some exciting stories.

I don't imagine I'll hear from you for a long time because we don't stay in one place long enough to get mail.

Young Artist Meetings to Be Most Important

With important constitutional changes pending, state and national contests for student and young artist musicians and the prospects of a special train for the members of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs to the bi-annual convention in Los Angeles in June, the state convention of the music federation will probably be the most enthusiastic and interesting convention ever held by that organization. Ford Talks With Mediators in Labor Strike

Gov. Murray D. Van Wageningen said last night at Detroit that he had conferred with Henry Ford and President Roosevelt about the Ford Motor Co. strike and asserted that "all parties are aiming for a quick settlement x x x with a singleness of purpose."

It marked the first time that Ford, founder of the giant company closed last week after a strike of the United Automobile Workers (CIO), had talked with mediators regarding the labor dispute.

"While we did not reach our objective of settling the strike at the Ford Motor company and of setting a date for work to be resumed, I am far from discouraged," the governor announced.

Meanwhile, John H. Steelman, reporting in New York on the soft coal conference, said that operators in the 8-state Appalachian area and the CIO United Mine Workers had reached a sufficient agreement to "assure the country that there will be no danger of a soft coal shortage."

(Continued from Page One) goslav communications and transport were substantially paralyzed, through the capture by the nazis of the strategic middle cities of Skopje and Nis.

Aside from being isolated from the Greeks to the south, and thus faced with the necessity of going on alone, the Yugoslav army was itself split up by the Germans into three sections—one above the westward line of steel thrown by the nazis across the country; a second in the area between Nis and Skopje; the third south of Skopje.

The British and their allies, it seemed clearly apparent, had lost a major part of the Balkan war, although they were by no means finally conquered.

The jubilant axis press publishing the Suez canal, Britain's vital link between east and west, was the next objective, and such a thrust by land eventually would mean a German-Italian attack on Turkey; a British ally still non-belligerent.

Knaudsen Would Favor Gov't Plant Operation

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—Legislation permitting the army and navy to take over strike-bound defense plants after mediation had failed was mildly advocated by William S. Knaudsen, director of the office of production management.

At the same time, the defense production chief opposed legislation to outlaw strikes, and favored the "cooling off period" system of meeting the problem, the latter enforced, if need be, by law. Knaudsen outlined his views to the house military committee after Secretary Perkins had expressed the opinion that jurisdictional strikes were unjustified in defense industries and "most unfortunate at any time."
