Unemployment Melts Away

The blanketing unemployment problem, which spread over the whole country for the past 19 years like the glaciers which came down from the north oceans ago, is beginning to melt away as those great glaciers melted under a warmer sun.

The unemployed today are estimated at 6,142,000 by the National Industrial Conference board. A year ago the census found 8,500,000 unemployed.

That would be another 1929. In that boom year there were almost 2,000,000 without work. Three million now would be only in the same proportion to our increased working population.

Once more let it be said that the sun of defense activity which is melting away unemployment does not necessarily mean a permanent change of climate. This sun is a heat wave.

If Britain and its allies win the war, it will certainly take them two years more to do it, perhaps longer. If they lose it, the defense economy will be with us indefinitely, perhaps permanently.

Some day all that will end. Then the United States will be squarely up against the problem of whether it can run a 96,000,000-job economy or whether it must slump suddenly back to a 45,000,000-job economy with 10,000,000 unemployed.

Nobody has the blueprints in simple terms of just how that is to be done. But it will be done. America is getting into a mood in which it believes that what is necessary to be done, it can do, and will do.

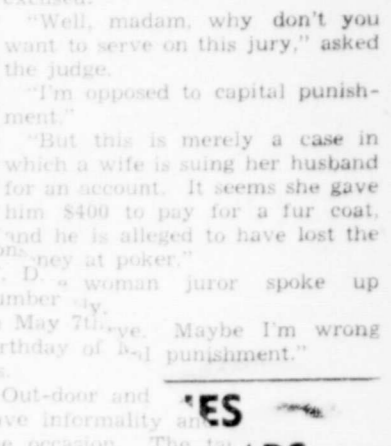

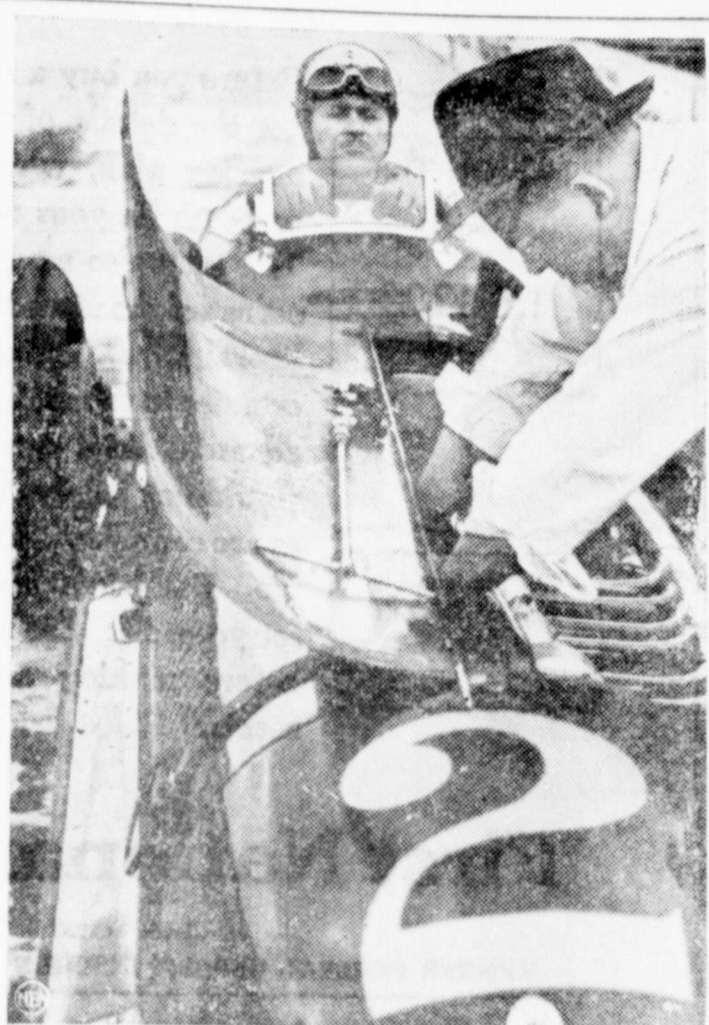

came pelting—roaring—crashing down in an all-consuming bombardment.

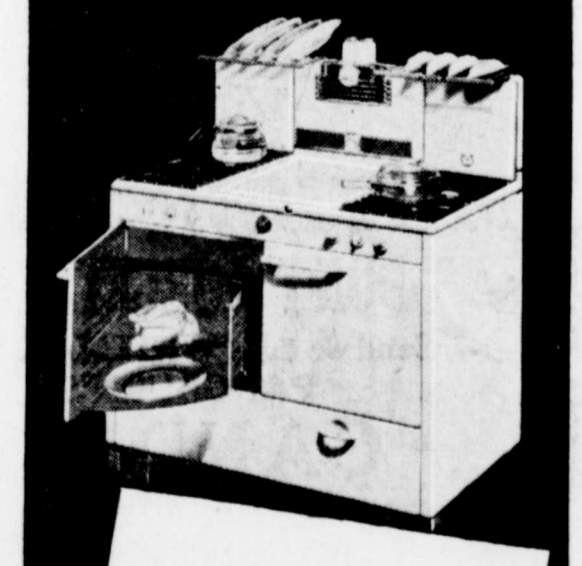

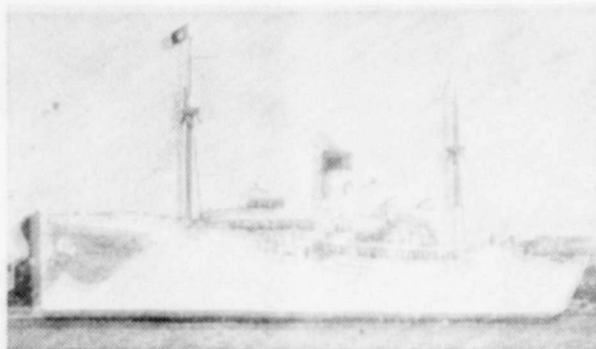
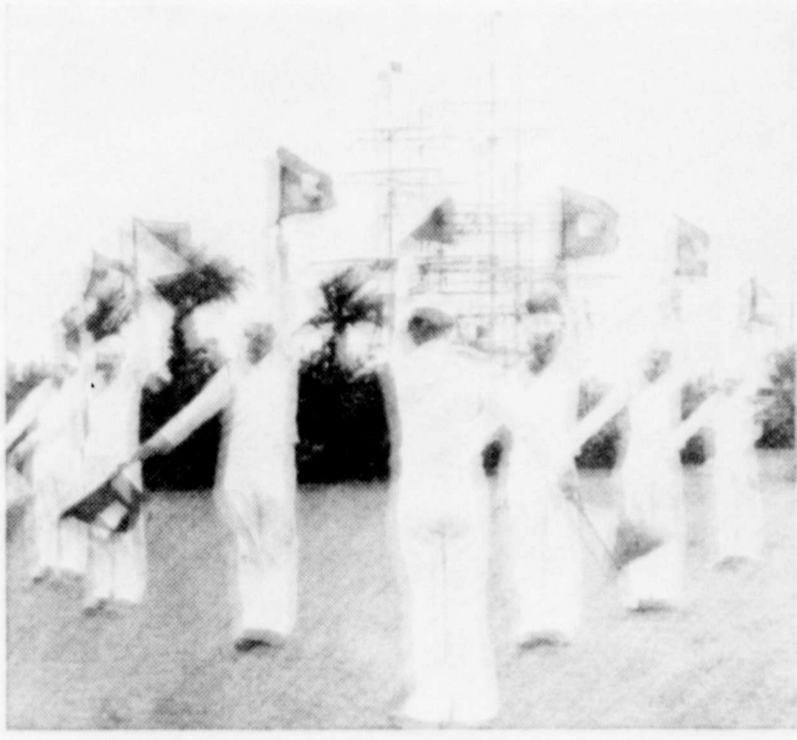

Social Security For Widows and Their Children

ARLINGTON, May 10.—It appears that many people are still unfamiliar regarding the provisions in the amended Social Security Act of 1939 for a new kind of insurance protection for widows and children of insured wage earners who die at any time after 1938. According to W. O. King, manager of the Arlington Social Security Board local office:

"This type of insurance is provided for the survivors of workers without regard to the age at which the insured wage earner dies. Insurance premiums can be made only in cases where the deceased's unexpired dependent children under age sixteen, or under age eighteen if still attending school.

According to King, this type of survivors insurance includes:

- (1) Monthly payments for insured wage earner's widow after age 60, until she remarries or dies.
- (2) Monthly payments for insured wage earner's widow, regardless of her age, while she has in her care dependent's unexpired dependent children under age sixteen, or under age eighteen if still attending school.
- (3) Monthly payments for insured wage earner's unmarried dependent children, under age sixteen, or under eighteen if still attending school.
- (4) Monthly payments for insured wage earner's dependent

Medical Corps Seeks Surgeons and Physicians

All Medical Physicians and Surgeons who are qualified to serve in the Medical Corps of the United States Army are invited to apply for commissions in the Medical Corps.

The war department recently announced several thousand vacancies in the medical corps reserve and full physicians and surgeons commissioned would be given the grade of first lieutenant.

General Page and that thousands have been inducted to see that while no practicing doctors whose services are necessary to the community is inducted for military training, the requirements of the armed forces in physicians and surgeons also must be filled.

In cooperation with the war department in its present program, the army makes it particularly desirable that new and well educated men who have made application for a commission and who qualify as medical officers, and thereby serve both the army and themselves in better advantage. For that reason, we are asking all board boards to communicate with physicians and surgeons among their registrants and encourage them to apply to the corps area surgeon, Eighth Corps Area, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, for necessary commissions in the medical corps.

General Page pointed out that where such registrants do not take advantage of this opportunity to be commissioned, and if they are placed in Class I-A, they will be inducted for military training under the selective service act.
