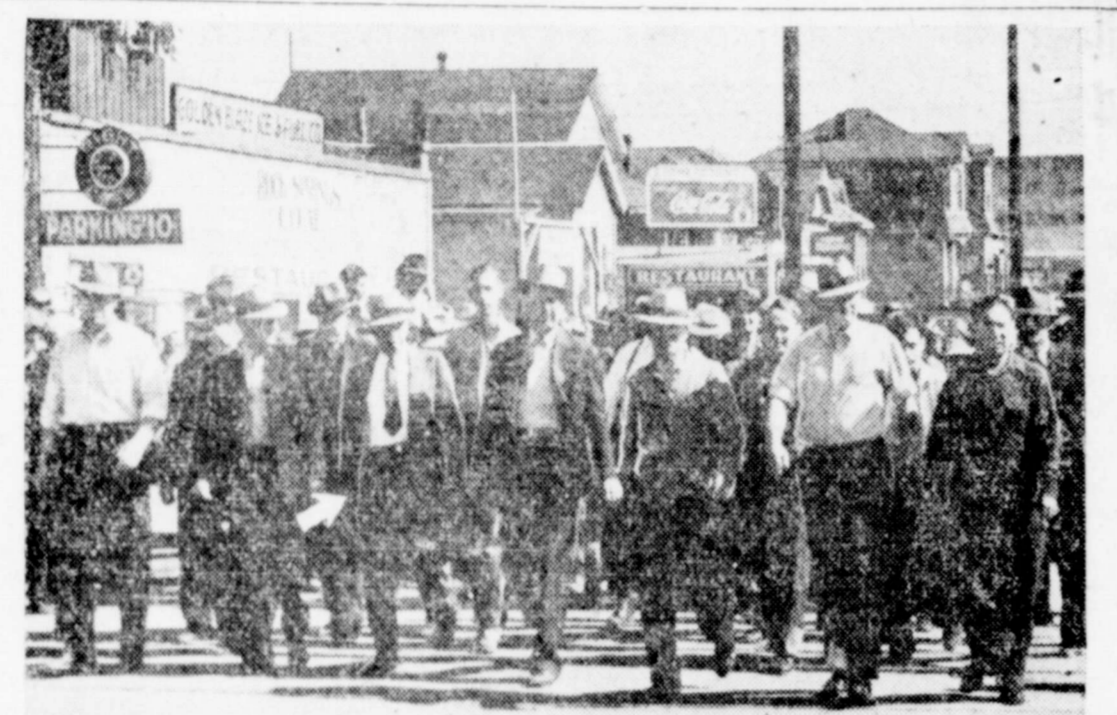

Prefer Home Life If Income Fair

FORT WORTH, May 23.—A husband and an average of 2.4 children within 10 years after graduation is the goal of 98 per cent of the coeds at Texas Christian University, a survey shows.

Slightly more than one-half of the girls placed \$40 weekly as the minimum income per couple on which they would marry. Only 15 girls indicated their willingness to try married life on less than \$25 a week, and there were but 26 who demanded more than \$75 a week income.

Woman's place is in the home, T. C. U. coeds believe, for some 88 per cent said they would not care to work "if happily married and having no trouble in making both ends meet."

It takes \$290, on the average, to dress a coed for one year. The figure varies from 31 who spend less than \$100 annually, to 53 who spend more than \$500 each year.

On other miscellaneous matters, the girls named Clark Gable as their favorite movie actor; Betty Davis as their favorite actress; horseback riding as their favorite sport.

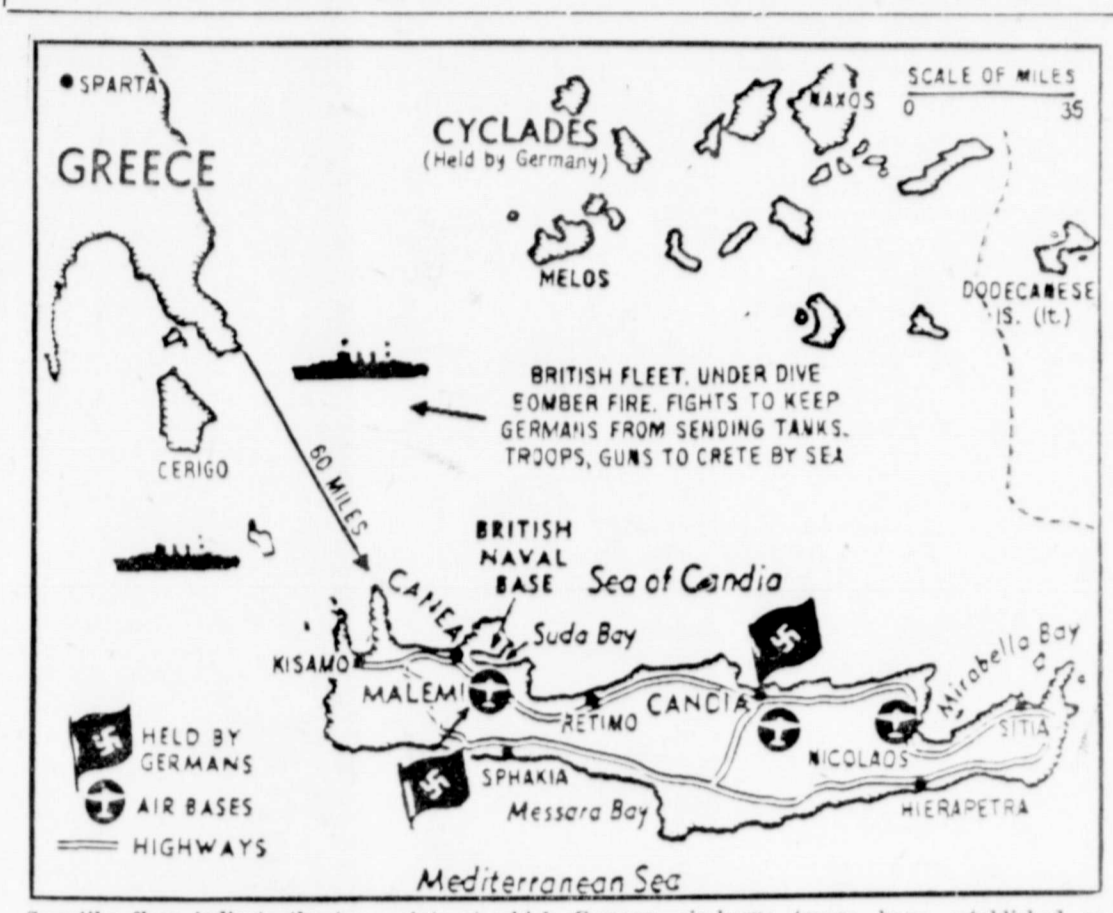
RED CROSS GIVES AID

Racial and Religious Bigotry Looms As Vicious Foe of True Christianity

Text: Acts 11:5-18

"THE story of the conversion of Cornelius," says Dr. Earl L. Douglas, "is the story of how Christianity emerged from a Jewish sect into a world religion."

It is that, but it is also a great deal more. It is the story of the conflict of Christian truth and experience with prejudice, and it is insistent in its emphasis that Christianity is inherently opposed to every form of narrowness and bigotry. The two forms of prejudice that seem to be deepest and most persistent in the world are racial prejudice and religious prejudice. Both were involved in this story.

Cornelius, an officer in a Roman regiment, was a Gentile and a representative of the power that held Palestine in subjection. Nevertheless, he was a devout man, and he saw in a vision a messenger who told him that he should send for Simon Peter, who was then lodging in Joppa at the house of Simon, the tanner.

CORNELIUS, like Paul, was obedient to the heavenly vision, and his messengers came and stood before the tanner's house, but Peter also needed a vision before he was needed at the reception of these visitors and to respond to the call of Cornelius. We are told that Peter went up on the housetop to pray. His prayerful spirit did not prevent his becoming hungry and sleepy, and he fell into a trance.

It was in this trance that he saw a vision of a great sheet being let down by the four corners, in which were all manner of beasts, creeping things, and fowl. There came a voice, saying to him, "Rise, Peter; kill, and eat," but Peter replied, "Not so, Lord; for I have never eaten anything that is common or unclean." Then came the real message of the vision: "What God hath cleansed, that call not thou common."

When this had been repeated three times and Peter was wondering what the vision could mean, the messengers arrived from Cornelius.

THE coincidence was too marked for even Peter, with his strong prejudices, to miss the divine teaching and rebuke. He went to Cornelius, and he found there such evidence of the work of grace that he was ready to baptize Cornelius, saying, "Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons," adding that "in every nation he that feareth him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with him."

Could anything be plainer for Peter's day or for ours in the application of all this to these two prejudices that still afflict mankind? Too often these very prejudices have been bolstered, instead of rebuked, by profession of Christianity. In our own vision we have seen the so-called "Christian Front."

The only real Christian front is a front of love and kindness and good will—a recognition that God is no respecter of persons. Let us oppose evil as evil, wherever and in whom it is found.

Let us recognize men for the goodness that is in them, no matter what their race or color, and no matter how much their outward creed may differ from our own. This is the spirit of Christianity.

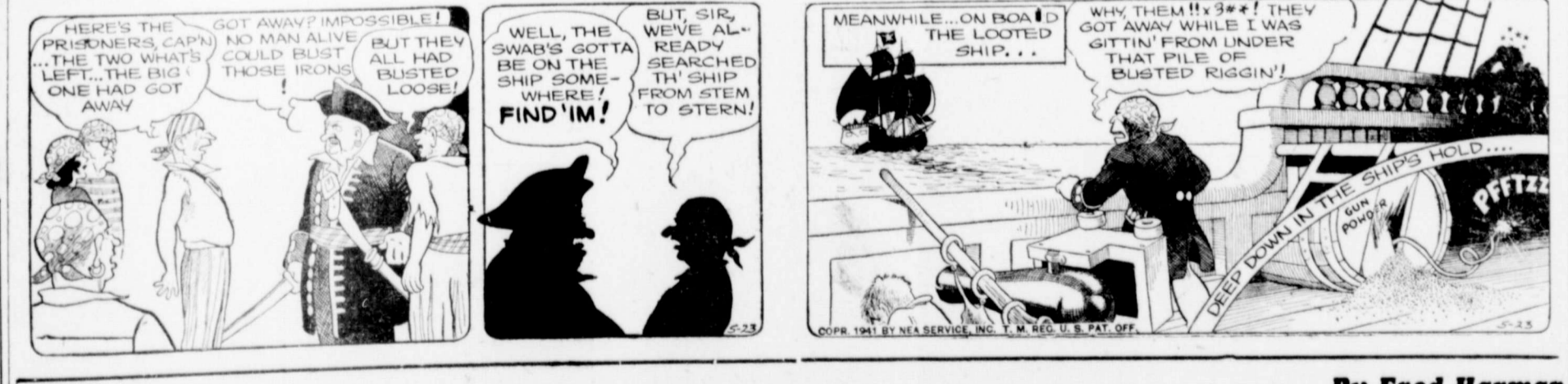

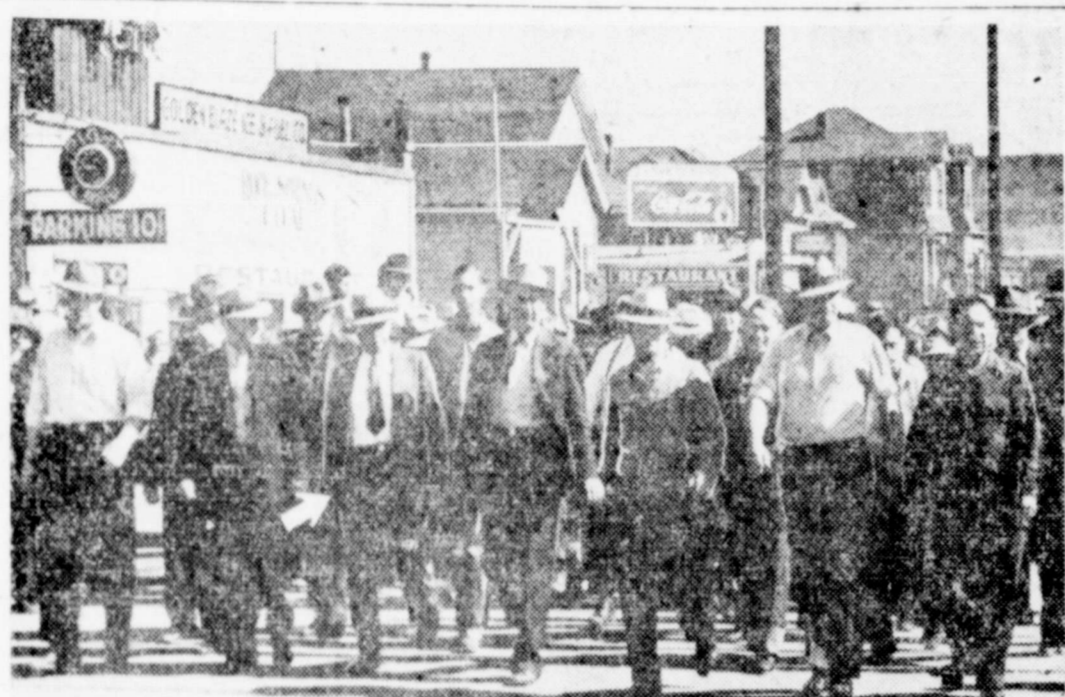

His help was largely responsible for my success in the business. He contributed to many worthy causes and reared several orphan children in addition to his own."
