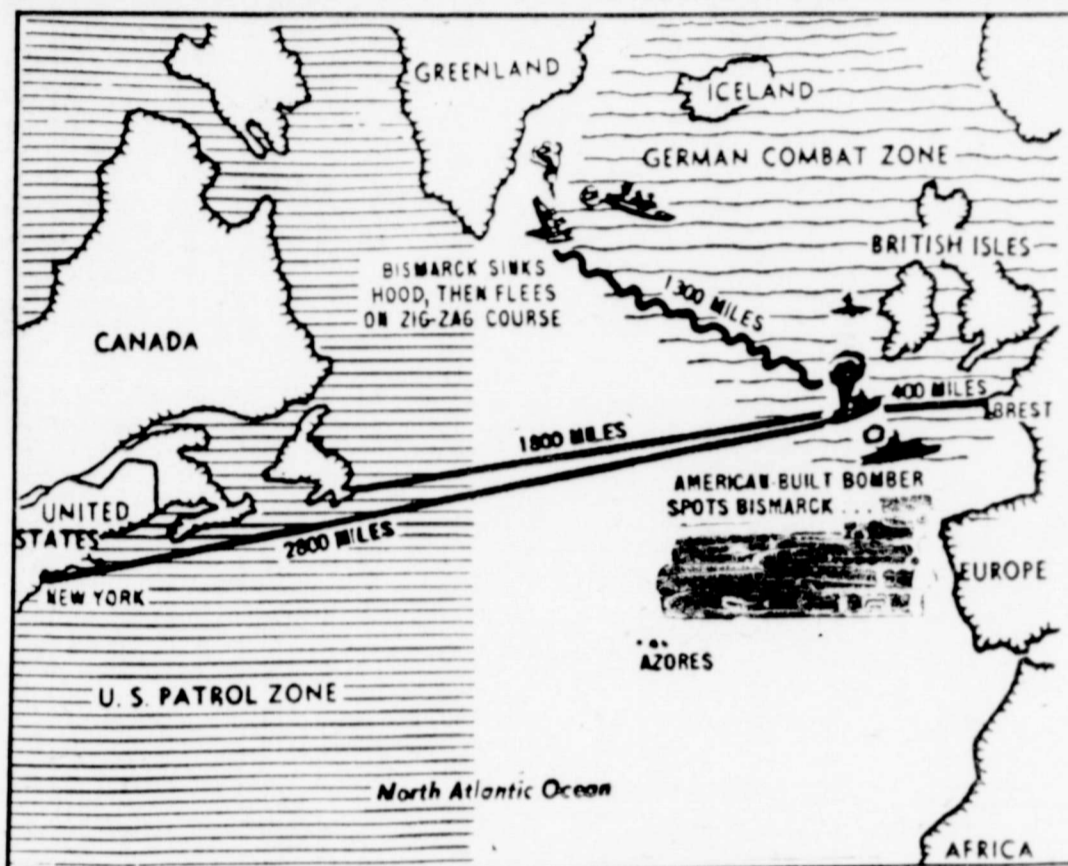

Turkeys Save Crops; Furnish Their Own Feed

Turkeys are my best paying crop, said L. G. Rankin who lives on about 60 acres grass pasture being fenced sheep proof as an ideal pasture for turkeys. It is also a natural feeding place for grasshoppers and other insects.

Rankin said he got the idea a few years ago when he noticed that for the past several years, grasshoppers multiplied the thousands in his pasture, and they completely destroyed crops on more than one occasion during that time.

His pasture rather bends and his farm and hoppers completely destroy crops at the edge. I remembered my mother say often times it were not for the feed turkeys would be a wonder, and then I remembered I would rejoice when it was grasshopper year. So that was my idea. I could kill two with one stone. I could fat-turkeys and at the same time my crops.

was no crop destroyed adjacent to that pasture. Then I decided to get a few more sheep to help pay for fencing the entire pasture and then keep a larger flock of turkeys.

Mr. Rankin said he always keeps his young turkeys confined in a small lot until the dew has dried off from the grass. Little poults, as they are called, are very susceptible to ailments from dampness, and one must be careful not to let them get chilled while young.

Rankin said he has about 1,000 turkeys, all doing nicely on feed and the insects flying about on that pasture land. He has the

crop sold already. It is now just a question of how many he can deliver.

Turkeys and sheep do well. They do not harm each other. Sheep are naturally timid creatures and will not step on the young poults that swarm about the sheep in early mornings or at night when the animals come in to bed down.

"This is a good sheep and cattle country," Mr. Rankin says. "Turkeys seem to fit in with either of them nicely, because turkeys need a wide range. The stock keep the grass and weeds from getting too rank and thus wetting the turkeys with heavy dew. The fenced pasture will allow them plenty

of range and yet keep them from straying too far away from home and perhaps taking up at some distance for a roosting place, and not come home at all. The turkey is not yet far removed from the wild fowl and needs little encouragement to revert to the wild state again.

W. J. Prange Emphasizes Fruit Culture

W. J. Prange came to Cisco from Arkansas back in 1932 and took charge of a farm of 145 acres about 2 miles south, which he immediately set with peaches, plums, apples and pears for an orchard. Then began with berries and grapes, putting out about 3,500 berry plants that are in full bearing and ripening for market this week.

Mr. Prange says he grows these things because he likes to do that kind of farming. And one can tell he likes it because despite the rainy season his orchard and vineyard are about the cleanest we have seen.

We tasted a new berry to us. It is called the Young berry and seems to be a mixture between a Logan berry and a dew berry, but larger, and makes fine preserves. It has a flavor resembling a raspberry. These he has no trouble selling at 45¢ per gallon.

selling his fruit, berries and grapes, Mr. Prange replied that so far he had never had enough to supply the local demand of people who drive out to his farm and gather for themselves.

He sells all his grapes. And it looked as though he might supply the whole country. Berries are loaded and just turning ripe. Peaches will begin to ripen about the middle of June or perhaps a little earlier. He seems to have a good variety and the fruit looks good with the exception of some that looks as if it had been struck by hail, although Mr. Prange says he has had no hail.

Mr. Prange grows a lot of vegetables. Sells some and cans quite a lot for home use. Mrs. Prange raises chickens and turkeys and these seemed to be quite a bunch of little chickens about the place.

Two cisterns provide water. The clean, well-kept yard shows somebody does a lot of work about the place. A new rock house has been built and Mr. Prange expects to do more rock building, he says.

Oats Harvest Starts Here This Week

Oat harvesting got under way this week in the Cisco grainbelt and over the state generally, where enormously large yields are being predicted. From 40 to 100 bushels to the acre are predicted with many farms claiming that 70 bushels will not be too high to expect.

It was generally reported that wind damage might affect the

crop, but all reports available now show that grain has straightened up and will offer no trouble in cutting.

The price of oats appears to be about 25 cents, or less, over the country where a price has been established.

Wheat is not ready for harvesting yet, but seems to promise a good yield. Rust is reported in some sections of the country where fields have not been well drained. This will have a tendency to cut the yield short, if rain should fall before harvest time.

This market seems to be trembling, based on war conditions and shipping.

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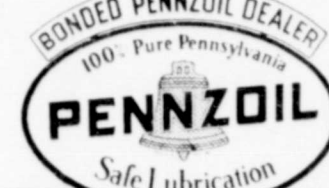
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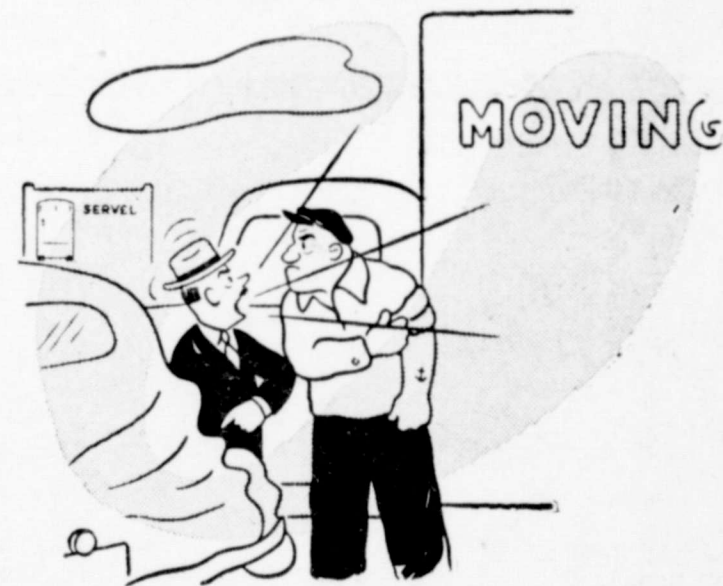


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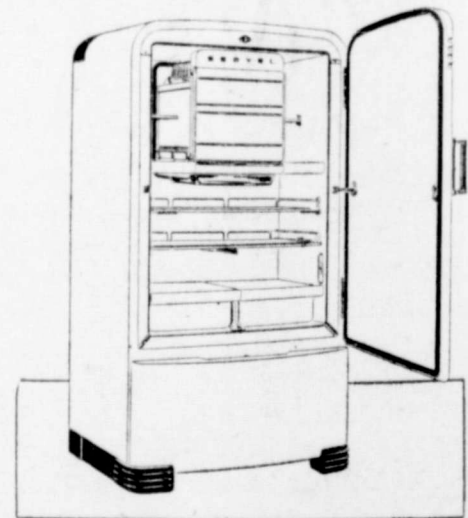
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
