Legislature May recess June 12 to June 30

AUSTIN, June 5.—The House today exchanged quipwork with the senate when it adjourned to recess from June 6 to June 30 and spurred 70 to the senate's June 17 adjournment, after pushing to the floor of final passage a senate to remit over \$4,500,000 ad rem taxes to the counties for next five years.

Representative W. C. Montgomery authorized the house resolution, said later: "I have encouragement from a majority of the senate members that would concur in my recess."

Montgomery's plan was voted after the house turned thumbs down on a June 10 sine die adjournment, 72 to 59, and a June 15 recess, 68 to 56.

A session was left with our "friend," Montgomery said, regarding adjournment without a recess to erase Gov. W. Lee Pritchett's blue penciling the appropriation bills.

President Umphrey Lee of Southern Methodist university will deliver the baccalaureate sermon Monday morning, and the cadets will dance again at a final ball Tuesday night.

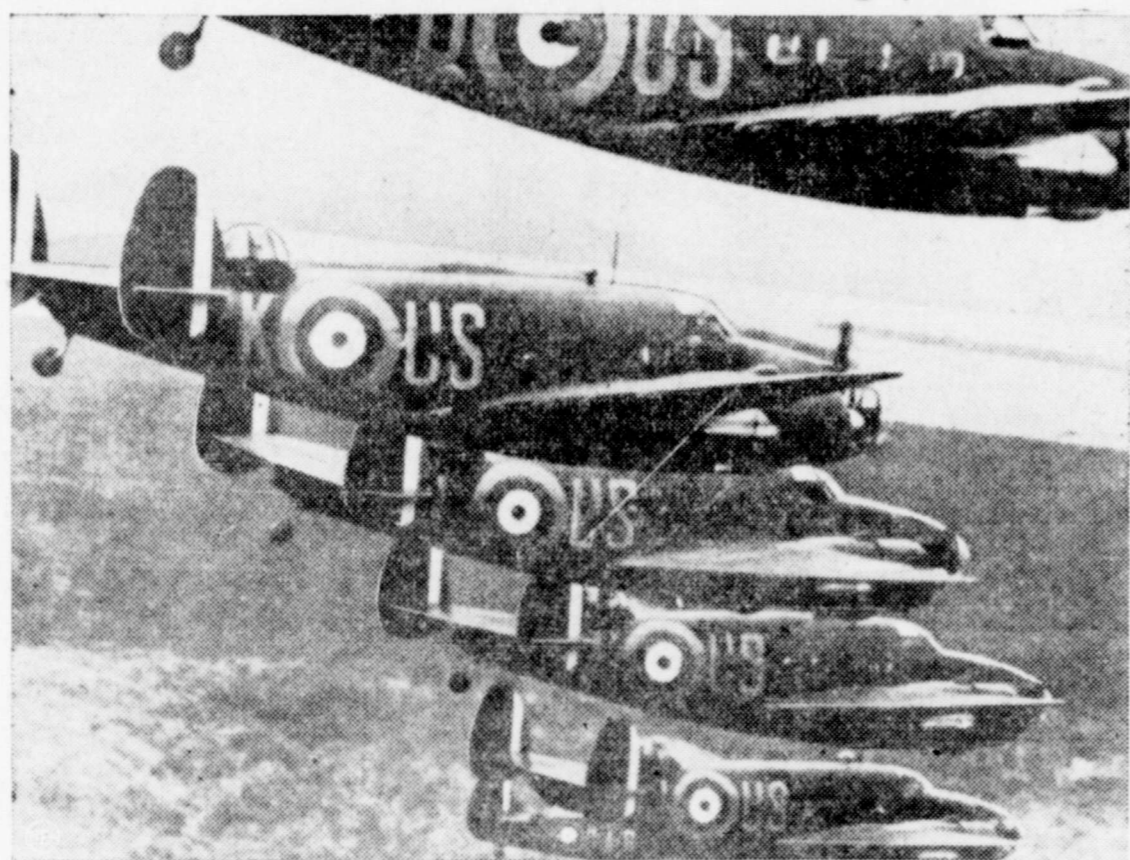

Guest in the J. A. Jensen Home Is an Old Time Cowhand

L. L. Derrick, of Tatum, N. M., is the guest of J. A. Jensen and family, which also includes Mrs. J. M. Howard, who is his mother-in-law as well as the mother of Mrs. Jensen.

Mr. Derrick is an old-time Texas cowboy, having worked on some of the big cattle domains of the west. He says he is probably the oldest cowboy living, "at least I am the oldest who attend the round-ups of the old cow hands," he said. Among his co-workers of the days before barbed wire destroyed the romance of the range, and when cowboys were real men, were Frank Norfleet and other prominent men of the range at that time. He was with the XIT ranch for many years, and still wears an XIT monogram watch chain.

"I assisted in holding the election in Bailey county in the precinct in which I lived, being one of the seven voters of that box. That was in 1890, the year Jim Hogg was elected governor. Others who formed the election board of that box were Frank Norfleet, myself, Bill Meadows, Tom and Bill Scott. L. A. Knight was ranch foreman and our boss, and was running for sheriff. West Texas was God's own country at that time. If I could find another locality like West Texas then, I would give my stuff to some widow and move to it," he said.

Mr. Derrick did not state his age, but he is well preserved, with the bearing of the true frontiersman, though his facial adornments of handle-bar mustache and goatee give him the appearance of the old time French marshal.

Tom Connally Reads Riot Act

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Sen. Tom Connally, Democrat, Texas, says that there has been "too much sitting" and not enough action by defense officials.

Connally yesterday interrupted Stacy May, chief of the OPM's research and statistical bureau, who was telling the senate defense investigating committee that the program for the next two years is "far too low" to cope with the German effort or to match that of Great Britain.

"You say we are not doing all we should do,"

"We are not utilizing our total resources." May replied. "Tremendous amount of machinery, skill and managerial experiment is not being utilized."

"Well, what are you going to do about it?" Connally demanded. "Are you just making a survey?"

"OPM officials have been sitting down constantly with the secretary of war and secretary of the navy discussing the matter," May said.

"Perhaps there has been too much sitting," Connally snapped. "I am tired of all this buck passing to other people. You are a subordinate, but it seems to me that somebody in the OPM should have enough insides to tell the heads what should be done. If they haven't, just tell them down here and tell them. At least I will. I don't want to be a playboy about this. This is mighty serious stuff."

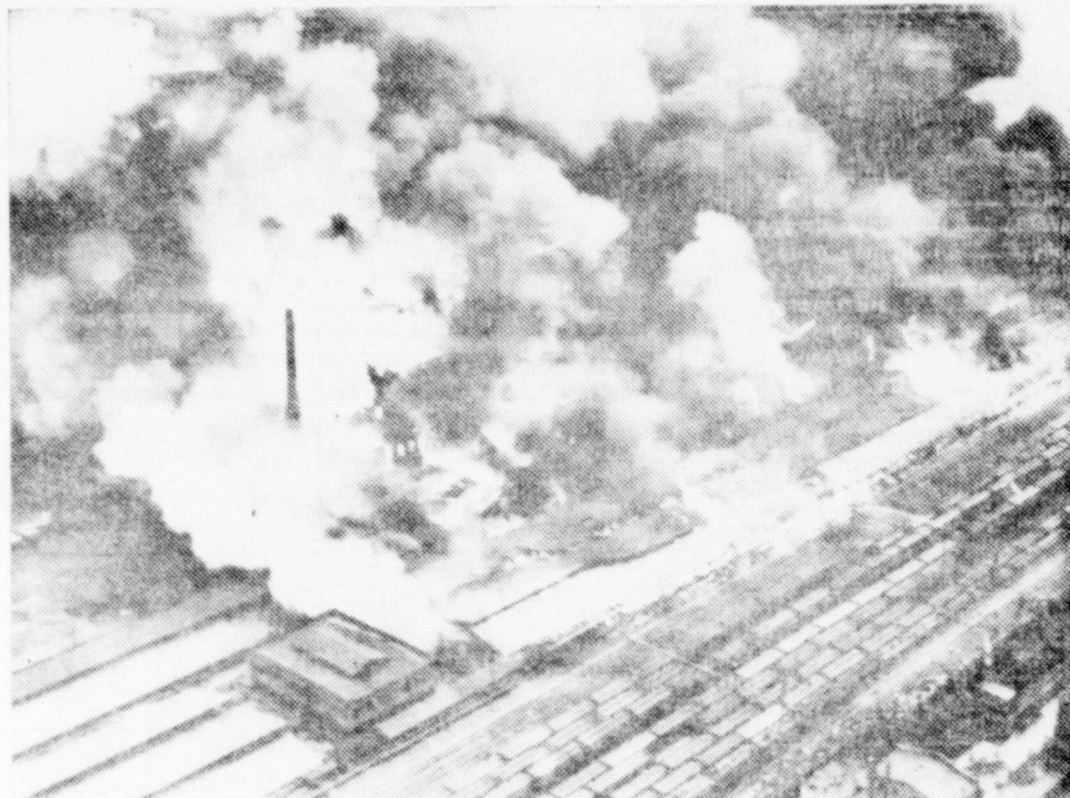

Edelstein Dies After Answering Attack on Jews

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Representative M. Michael Edelstein, New York Democrat, died in the arms of a friend yesterday, a few moments after he dramatically had defended the Jewish people in a speech in the house.

The 53-year-old New Yorker had just replied to remarks by Representative John E. Rankin of Mississippi criticizing international Jewish bankers and was talking with Jacob Wasserman of New York in the corridor outside the house chamber when he collapsed and died of a heart attack.

His death was formally announced by Representative Samuel Dickstein of New York, who solemnly declared:

"You have seen a member begin the long journey right on the floor of the house during a debate in which a man sought to protect his people, his integrity and his Americanism. He died a martyr to a cause."

The exchange which preceded Edelstein's death was precipitated by a speech by Rankin in which he charged that "Wall Street and a little group of our international Jewish brethren still are attempting to harass the president of the United States and the congress of the United States into plunging us into the European war unprepared."

Edelstein retorted that "the meeting which took place on the steps of the subway was entirely controlled by persons other than Jewish bankers."

"I deplore the idea that anytime anything happens, whether it be for a war policy or against a war policy, men in this house and outside this house attempt to use the Jews as their scapegoat."

"I say it is unfair and I say it is in-American. As a member of this house I deplore such allegations, because we are living in a democracy. All men are created equal, regardless of race, creed or color, and whether a man be Jew or Gentile, he may think what he deems fit."

WPA Workers Start Trouble Unnecessarily

DALLAS, June 5.—A flag-saluting ceremony by a group of WPA workers in which they sought to get a fellow worker charged with un-American utterances to salute the flag, resulted in a fight Wednesday evening which called out half dozen police officers and the emergency hospital ambulance and had its ending in police court before Judge Paul Carroll.

B. H. Pickett, 3923 Clarendon, one of the WPA men, was charged with fighting with a naturalized American citizen of German descent who was completing his work with the WPA Wednesday evening.

Pickett and Roy Stegall, who lives in Arcadia Park, testified before Judge McCarroll that the naturalized citizen worker had told them Hitler could run this country better than Roosevelt; that his family remained in Germany so their children could obtain a better education than in this country and that the United States would go down from within, as the "woods are full of people friendly to Germany."

Holland's Tulips Are Victims of Invasion

The tulips of the Netherlands, world famous for almost four centuries, are being crushed by German invasion. The bulbs which have been Holland's pride are going into Nazi ersatz food substitutes and livestock fodder.

Tulips are pictured on the Netherlands semi-postal stamp above, the 1940 "For Children" issue. This series was released a few days before the Lowlands were invaded.

There's little room in Hitler's "new order" for flowers. Netherlands tulip growers report. Tulip bulbs are processed to make a coffee substitute, with real coffee costing \$2.50 a pound. Hyacinths have become cattle feed; narcissus bulbs yield starch. An ersatz flour is being made from various other bulbs.

Before the invasion, Netherlands' tulip acreages were reduced about 50 per cent by defense preparations.

The tulip is not a native of Holland. The first bulbs were brought from Persia in the 16th century. Dutch growers have developed nearly 2000 varieties. Export of bulbs has been a major item of trade with United States.

Spain's Loss Etc.

Judge McCarroll told Pickett he would dismiss the charge against him on a technicality.

"Had you been charged with assault and battery I would probably have found you guilty," Judge McCarroll said. "However, this complaint charges you with fighting with the man, which, from this testimony, did not occur. Case dismissed."

After the trial the naturalized citizen returned to police headquarters and asked officer to come to his home and see a picture on the wall of Wendell Willkie, for whom he voted in the fall election, and a sign "God Bless America."

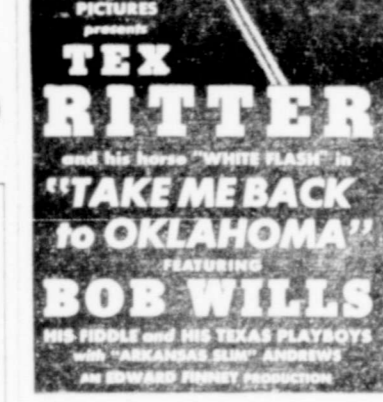

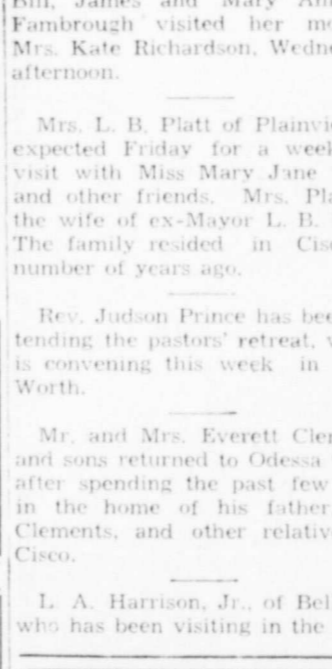
