\$14,000 YEARLY INTEREST WILL PROTECT CITY'S TITLE TO LAKE AND WATERWORKS, SAYS MAYOR

"The Only Way We Can Restore Property Values and Make Cisco Attractive to Citizens and Investors is to Put Our Debt on a Workable Basis."

Early Christian Conference Set Good Example for Modern, Bickering Sects

Text: Acts 15:6-21

EVEN in the realm of religion and the church it is true that success brings its problems and difficulties. As Christianity spread and grew, these problems were two-fold. There was the problem of mingling races in a religion that, like its founder, was no respecter of persons.

types, went about solving their problems. Perhaps the most notable thing is that they went so directly to first principles and to the basic experience of the Gospel. They faced the plain fact that where the Gospel was preached Gentiles as well as Jews benefited from it.

It was not unnatural that these problems should have arisen in the early church because we have the same problems today. In one form or other they came up in the latest of worldwide religious conferences—the meeting of representatives of almost all Protestant groups held at Oxford, England, in 1937, and at the world missionary council held at Madras, India, a year later.

Should these practices be enjoined on the Gentile Christians? The wise leaders among the Jews said that they should not, and wisdom in this conference came particularly from James, the brother of our Lord, who made the influential speech that is recorded in the lesson.

ONE is impressed with the way in which these early Christians, of so many sorts and

problems of worldwide Christianity could be settled today upon so wise and practical a basis and with such courteous consideration for the ideas and rights of all?

that we are now obligated to pay. The \$38,000 less the \$23,000 interest payments leaves approximately \$15,000 to be used for the repurchase of the new bonds. By Mr. Lane's own statement in the paper we are now paying \$27,000 a year, which would enable us under the new set-up to meet the maximum interest requirements and still have \$4,000, approximately, left to buy bonds with.

On the basis of Mr. Lane's figures, in which it is set out that Cisco paid \$27,000 on interest last year, it is plain that Cisco can meet the maximum interest requirements of the new set-up and have money left over with which to purchase its bonds and reduce its principal debt.

However, we have made savings in city operation which increase the amount of money available for debt service. The largest single saving has been in electric power costs.

Other economies in the city affairs, coupled with a more businesslike collection of taxes and fees will, we are confident, enable the city to meet the \$38,000 year set-up to pay BOTH PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST.

Mortgaging the Lake Now, as for Mr. Lane's objection to mortgaging the lake:

If you will refer to the division of the refunded bonds as provided for in the new agreement, you will note that only one-half of the amount is secured by the waterworks. This one-half, or approximately \$175,000, draws interest at 3 per cent, which is a constant rate. Thus it is necessary for the city to pay only approximately \$14,000 a year in interest to protect its title in the lake.

It is generally conceded that between \$200,000 and \$300,000 of the present bonds and lost or will not come in, and these bonds would be outlawed by the court in our settlement, thus reducing the refunded amount by much less than the \$950,000 set up as a maximum.

I wish to say that the agreement we have entered into is only a step toward the solution we seek, and that we are already in contact with a source of financing which we hope will enable us to make an even greater reduction in our debt.

Condition of Waterworks Now, as for the condition of the waterworks, which is Point Number Three advanced by Mr. Lane:

It is part of the program to use the interest we are saving between May 1 and November 1, which, on the basis of present collections and savings, will give us approximately \$15,000—taking Mr. Lane's \$27,000 figure as the basis, plus savings already secured—to be used for this purpose.

If we are to continue to be obligated for the \$48,000 a year in interest as now accrues, how are we to find the money to do these repairs?

If Mr. Lane has a better plan,
