## York New Yorking ILL - SMELLING SPOT SHOULD BE FUMIGATED

By R. W. H. KENNON Cisco people are practically of one mind regarding the necessity of a general, far-reaching physical clean-up of the old home town. Despite this unanimity, however, there is still lots of unfinished sani-

tary work. One spot this writer has in mind is the remains of an abandoned building in the rear of the Judia building. It is unoccupied, the roof is gone and only the end walls are standing.

This place is a catch-all for garbage and trash like banana stalks, over-ripe fruit, old paper boxes, crates and pack-

Occasionally this rubbish is burned inside the ruins or adjacent thereto, but more often it is left to rot and decay where it has been dumped by irresponsibles.

Moons ago, before the building fell into decay, it was used as a cold storage plant and contained a wt. The years have gone by, but the vat is still there-half full of stagnant water most of the

The ground which the floor once covered is much lower than the surrounding ground and has no drainage. During rains the water is several inches in depth and remains there until evaporation has its way. Tall weeds and grass have been permitted to flourish here, thus creating an ideal haven for the development of





**Everyone Should Understand** ARTIFICIAL RESPIRATION

KEEP PATIENT WARM

The first thing to do in case of apparent strangling or being overcome by fumes, is to send for a doctor at once. However, the first ten minutes may mean the difference between life and death, and everyone should understand the principles of artificial respiration, and PRACTICE on someone

until you are sure you could use it in an emergency The above position is correct for patient and worker: patient on stomach, head on one arm with mouth and nose free; worker astride patient with shoulders above lower lungs of patient. ARMS STIFF. Slowly bring weight of body down on patient's lower lungs, as shown, taking about two seconds for movement.

Release pressure entirely, allowing about two seconds for the lungs to fill with air.
